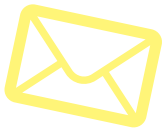

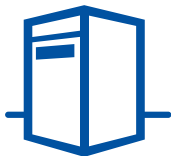
Every active registered voter will automatically receive a ballot in the mail the week of **May 4** for the upcoming election.

You can expect to receive your ballot that same week, and some voters may receive theirs as early as the weekend before.



MAIL IT.

You can complete your ballot in the comfort of your home. Sign and date your return envelope, seal your completed ballot inside, and return it through the U.S. Postal Service.



DROP IT.

Starting May 5, you may choose to return your mail ballot to any of the Registrar's official ballot drop boxes.

VISIT.

Or vote in-person.

Starting Saturday, May 23, select vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Starting Saturday, May 30, all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., until the final day of voting, **Tuesday, June 2**, when voting hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Dates to Remember!

Ballots will be mailed to registered voters the week of **May 4**, with some receiving theirs as early as the weekend before.

Early voting at the Registrar of Voters office will begin on **Monday, May 4**, and will be available from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Starting **Saturday, May 23**, select vote centers, including the Registrar of Voters office, will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., until **Saturday, May 30**, when all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

On the final day of voting, **June 2**, hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The Hassle-Free Voting Experience: A Practical Guide.

Every active registered voter will automatically receive a ballot in the mail nearly a month before Election Day. You choose **when, where, and how you vote!**

Elections are no longer a one-day event and there is no need to wait until Election Day to vote. You can vote in the comfort of your home or visit a vote center near you. **The choice is yours!**

Here are a few strategies to help make the voting process a more convenient experience for all:

VERIFY YOUR VOTER REGISTRATION

Have you moved or changed your name? Whether you are new to San Diego County or just moved down the street, you need to re-register to vote. You can do this by completing a new voter registration form.

Verify your residence address and, if different, your mailing address. You can verify your voter information, register or re-register to vote at sdvote.com.

YOUR VOTING OPTIONS

MAIL IT. DROP IT. VISIT.

Ballots begin going out in the mail the week of May 4. If you have kept your voter information up to date you should expect to receive your ballot that same week. Some may receive theirs as early as the weekend before.

VOTE BY MAIL

Sign and date your return envelope, seal your ballot inside, and return it through the U.S. Postal Service. Remember to sign your return envelope! **Your signature is required for your mail ballot to count.**

BALLOT DROP BOX

Sign and date your return envelope, seal your ballot inside, and return it to any of the Registrar of Voters official ballot drop boxes.

YOUR VOTING OPTIONS

VOTE CENTER

Vote in person or drop off your voted mail ballot at any vote center in San Diego County.

Starting **Saturday, May 23**, select vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. until **Saturday, May 30**, when all vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. through June 1.

All vote centers will be open on the final day of voting, **Tuesday, June 2**, when hours change to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **If you choose to vote on Election Day, be prepared for long lines.**

Vote centers offer a full-service voting experience:

- Vote in-person or drop off an already voted mail ballot (sealed inside its return envelope). **Your signature is required for your mail ballot to count.**
- Accessible curbside voting is available for voters who cannot leave their vehicle. Call the phone number posted outside the vote center and a poll worker will assist you.
- Use a touchscreen ballot marking device to mark your selections and print out your official ballot. All ballot marking devices are fully accessible allowing voters with disabilities to vote independently and privately.
- Carry in the official ballot you receive in the mail, check-in at the vote center, sign the electronic roster, and cast your official ballot free of its return envelope.
- If you made a mistake or lost your mail ballot, you can instead vote in person using a ballot marking device at any vote center.
- Receive voting assistance, including assistance in multiple languages.
- Register to vote or update your registration and vote on the same day.

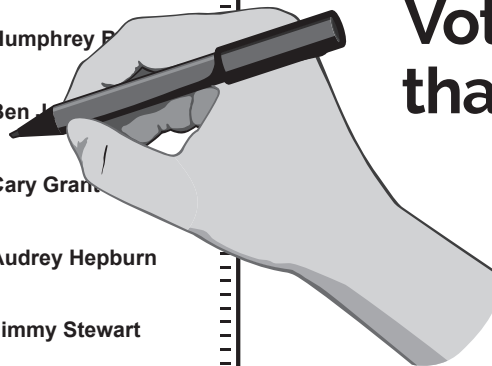

Learn More About San Diego County's Voting System

All voter centers will have a full deployment of accessible touchscreen ballot marking devices. These devices can bring up every ballot type in one of five languages and produce a readable paper ballot. Because of this device, voters can vote in person at any vote center in the county.



This device does not store, tabulate, or count any votes, and does not store voter information.



After the voter confirms their selections on the device, the voter will print their ballot in the voting booth with the attached printer. The system prints a readable paper ballot showing the voter's selections along with a secure barcode. The barcode does not store voter information, it is used to tabulate results at the Registrar of Voter's office.

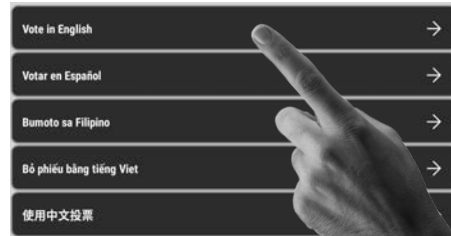
Voters can review their ballot, place it in a secrecy sleeve, and give it to the poll worker to place it in the ballot box to be counted at the Registrar's office. Once placed inside the ballot box, your ballot is officially cast!

Ballot Marking Device (BMD) Voting Instructions



1. Start Voting Session

Poll worker inserts activation card to start voting session. Poll worker will remove the card and allow you to make selections in private.



2. Language Selection

TAP the LANGUAGE of your choice to continue.

3. Adjust Settings

You can ADJUST text size, contrast, audio, and language any time during the ballot marking session.

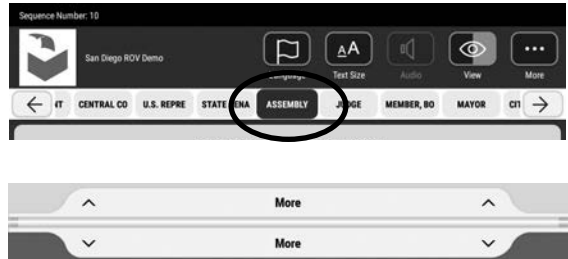


4. Navigate Ballot

Use contest tabs at TOP of screen or the navigation buttons at BOTTOM of screen.



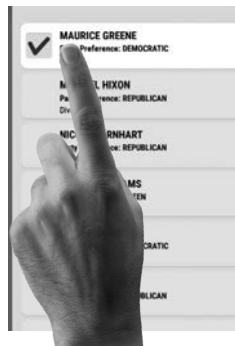
Tap the **MORE** arrows at the top and bottom of the screen to scroll up and down the screen to see all available candidates for contests with multiple candidates.



5. Make Your Selections

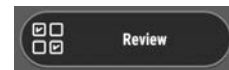
Tap box next to your selection(s) for each contest to vote for that choice. You can tap again to deselect.

Note: For contests with multiple candidates, tap the **MORE** arrows at the top and bottom of the screen to scroll up and down the screen to see all available candidates.

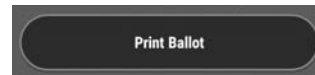


6. Review Your Selections

After voting, tap the REVIEW button at the bottom of the screen.



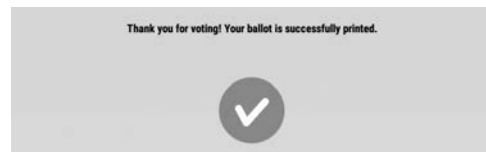
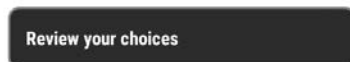
During review, you may make changes to any contest by tapping on the contest. When complete, tap PRINT BALLOT.



7. Print Your Ballot

Tap PRINT YOUR BALLOT or tap REVIEW YOUR CHOICES to return to previous screen.

When complete, tap PRINT.



8. Retrieve Your Paper Ballot from Printer

Confirm your selections, place your ballot in secrecy sleeve or envelope provided by the poll worker. Return to poll worker to place in ballot box. **Get your "I Voted" sticker.**

Accessible Voting

The Registrar of Voters is committed to providing voters with disabilities a secure, independent and private voting experience. Every effort has been made to ensure all vote centers meet usable accessibility standards. Vote centers will feature:

- Accessible ballot marking devices
- Curbside voting
- Additional assistance upon request

Voters that are unable to mark a ballot may bring up to two individuals to assist in voting (§ 14282 (b)).

Ballot Marking Device

Ballot marking devices will be available at every vote center. Each ballot marking device is equipped with a headset and a handheld controller for audio-based voting and is also available in Chinese, Filipino, Spanish and Vietnamese.

Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail (RAVBM) System

The RAVBM system allows a voter with a disability to download a ballot on a personal computer and mark it privately and independently using their own assistive technology. After marking the ballot, the voter will print and return their ballot using the printable envelope template included in the RAVBM instructions. Just like any mail ballot, RAVBM ballots must be sealed inside an envelope, signed, and returned by mail, at any vote center, or official ballot drop box.

To request a RAVBM ballot you can complete the postcard with pre-paid postage located on the back of this pamphlet.

Voters who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech-disabled may use the California Relay Service (CRS) by dialing 711 to use the telephone system via a text telephone (TTY) or other devices to call the Registrar's Toll-Free Voter Phone Line. CRS supports the following modes of communication: TTY, VCO, 2LVCO, HCO, STS, VASTS, ASCII, or Voice.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

Under the California Voter's Choice Act, each eligible voter in San Diego County will receive a ballot in the mail nearly a month before Election Day. Voters may return their ballot by mail, at an official ballot drop box, or at any vote center. They may also choose to vote in-person at any vote center in the county.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, voters may request a vote by mail ballot in Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, or Chinese. For select precincts, voters may request a facsimile copy of the ballot in Arabic, Hindi, Hmong, Indonesian, Japanese, Khmer, Korean, Laotian, Persian, Somali or Thai.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, voters may request a remote accessible vote by mail ballot. This allows a voter with a disability to download a ballot onto a personal computer and mark it privately and independently using their own assistive technology.

To request a vote by mail ballot, facsimile ballot, or remote accessible vote by mail ballot, contact the Registrar of Voters at (858) 565-5800, toll free at (800) 696-0136, or at rovmail@sdcountry.ca.gov.

Conforme la Ley de Opciones para el Votante de California, cada votante elegible en el Condado de San Diego recibirá por correo una boleta electoral alrededor de un mes antes del Día de la Elección. Los votantes pueden devolver su boleta por correo postal, depositarla en un buzón oficial para entrega de boletas o llevarla a cualquier centro de votación. También pueden optar por votar en persona en cualquier centro de votación del condado.

Al menos siete días antes del día de la elección, los votantes pueden solicitar una boleta de voto-por-correo en español, filipino, vietnamita o chino. En algunos distritos electorales, los votantes pueden solicitar una copia facsímil de la boleta electoral en árabe, hindi, hmong, indonesio, japonés, jamer, coreano, laosiano, persa, somalí o tailandés.

Al menos siete días antes del día de la elección, los votantes pueden solicitar una boleta electoral de voto-por-correo de acceso remoto. Esto le permite a un votante con discapacidad descargar una boleta electoral en una computadora personal y marcarla de forma privada e independiente utilizando su propia tecnología de asistencia.

Sa ilalim ng Voter's Choice Act ng California, ang bawat karapat-dapat na botante sa County ng San Diego ay tatanggap ng balota sa koreo ng halos isang buwan bago ang Araw ng Eleksyon. Maaaring ibalik ng mga botante ang kanilang balota sa pamamagitan ng koreo, sa isang opisyal na ballot drop box, o sa anumang vote center. Maaari rin nilang piliing bumoto nang personal sa anumang vote center sa county.

Sa hindi lalampas ng pitong araw bago ang araw ng eleksyon, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng balota ng pagboto sa pamamagitan ng koreo sa wikang Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, o Chinese. Para sa mga piling presinto, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng facsimile na kopya ng balota sa Arabic, Hindi, Hmong, Indonesian, Japanese, Khmer, Korean, Laotian, Persian, Somali o Thai.

Sa hindi lalampas ng pitong araw bago ang araw ng eleksyon, maaaring humiling ang mga botante ng remote na accessible na balota ng pagboto sa pamamagitan ng koreo. Nagpapahintulot ito sa botanteng may kapansanan na i-download ang balota sa isang personal na computer at markahan ito nang pribado at nakapag-iisa gamit ang sarili niyang pantulong na teknolohiya.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

Theo Đạo Luật Quyền Lựa Chọn Của Cử Tri (Voter's Choice Act) California, mỗi cử tri hợp lệ tại Quận San Diego sẽ nhận được một lá phiếu bầu qua đường bưu điện gần một tháng trước Ngày Bầu Cử. Các cử tri có thể gửi lại lá phiếu bầu qua thư, tại thùng thu nhận phiếu bầu chính thức hoặc tại bất kỳ trung tâm bỏ phiếu nào. Họ cũng có thể chọn bỏ phiếu trực tiếp tại bất kỳ trung tâm bỏ phiếu nào trong quận.

Không trễ hơn bảy ngày trước ngày bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu lá phiếu bầu bằng thư bằng tiếng Tây Ban Nha, Phi Luật Tân, Việt Nam, hay Trung Hoa. Đối với một số khu bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu bản sao lá phiếu bằng tiếng Ả Rập, tiếng Hindi, tiếng Hmong, tiếng Indonesia, tiếng Nhật Bản, tiếng Khmer, tiếng Đại Hàn, tiếng Lào, tiếng Ba Tư, tiếng Somali hoặc tiếng Thái Lan.

Không trễ hơn bảy ngày trước ngày bầu cử, các cử tri có thể yêu cầu được bầu bằng thư truy cập từ xa. Điều này cho phép cử tri bị khuyết tật tải lá phiếu xuống máy tính cá nhân và đánh dấu một cách riêng tư và độc lập bằng cách sử dụng công nghệ hỗ trợ của mình.

Để yêu cầu lá phiếu bầu qua thư, lá phiếu bầu qua fax hoặc lá phiếu bầu bằng thư truy cập từ xa, liên lạc Văn Phòng Bầu Cử theo số (858) 565-5800, số điện thoại miễn phí (800) 696-0136, hoặc tại rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

《加州選民選擇法案》規定，San Diego 縣每名符合資格的選民將於選舉日前一個月左右收到郵寄的選票。選民可以通過郵寄、官方選票投遞箱或者任何投票中心交回其選票。他們也可以選擇到縣內任何投票中心進行親身投票。

選民可以要求西班牙文、菲律賓文、越南文或中文版郵寄選票，但不得晚於選舉日前 7 天。在特別選定的選區，選民可以索要阿拉伯文、印地文、苗文、印尼文、日文、高棉文、韓文、寮文、波斯文、索馬里文或泰文版選票的傳真副本。

選民可以要求遠端無障礙郵寄選票，但不得晚於選舉日前 7 天。這允許身障選民將選票下載至個人電腦，並使用自己的輔助科技工具，有隱私並獨立地標記選票。

بموجب قانون اختيار الناخبين في كاليفورنيا، سيحصل كل ناخب مؤهل في مقاطعة سان دييغو على بطاقة اقتراع عبر البريد قبل شهر تقريبًا من يوم الانتخابات. يجوز للناخبين إعادة اقتراعهم عن طريق إرسال الاقتراع بالبريد، أو في موقع صندوق إيداع الاقتراع الرسمي، أو في أي مركز تصويت. ويجوز لهم أيضًا اختيار التصويت حضوريًا في أي مركز تصويت في المقاطعة.

في موعد لا يتجاوز سبعة أيام قبل يوم الانتخابات، يجوز للناخبين طلب التصويت عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد باللغة الإسبانية أو الفلبينية أو الفيتنامية أو الصينية. بالنسبة لدوائر انتخابية محددة، يجوز أن يطلب الناخبون نسخة طبق الأصل من بطاقة الاقتراع باللغة العربية أو الهندية أو الهونجية أو الإندونيسية أو اليابانية أو الخميرية أو الكورية أو اللاوسية أو الفارسية أو الصومالية أو التايلاندية.

في موعد لا يتجاوز سبعة أيام قبل يوم الانتخابات، يجوز أن يطلب الناخبون التصويت عن بعد عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد. يتيح ذلك للناخب من ذوي الإعاقة تنزيل بطاقة اقتراع على جهاز كمبيوتر شخصي ووضع علامة عليها بشكل خاص ومستقل باستخدام التكنولوجيا المساعدة الخاصة به.

لطلب التصويت عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد، أو الاقتراع بالفاكس، أو التصويت الذي يمكن الوصول إليه عن بعد عن طريق الاقتراع بالبريد، اتصل بمسجل الناخبين على (858) 565-5800، الرقم المجاني على (800) 696-0136، أو على rovmail@sdcounty.ca.gov.

Language Access and Voter Assistance

California वोटर् चॉइस एक्ट के तहत, San Diego काउंटी में प्रत्येक योग्य मतदाता को चुनाव के दिन से लगभग एक महीने पहले मेल में मतपत्र प्राप्त होगा। मतदाता अपना मतपत्र मेल के माध्यम से, किसी आधिकारिक मतपत्र ड्रॉप बॉक्स में या किसी भी वोट केंद्र पर वापस कर सकते हैं। वे काउंटी के किसी भी वोट केंद्र पर व्यक्तिगत रूप से मतदान करने का विकल्प भी चुन सकते हैं।

चुनाव के दिन से कम से कम सात दिन पहले, मतदाता स्पेनिश, फिलिपिनो, विएतनामी या चीनी भाषा में मेल द्वारा मतदान करने के लिए बैलेट का अनुरोध कर सकते हैं। कुछ चयनित मतदान क्षेत्रों के लिए, मतदाता अरबी, हिंदी, हमोंग, इंडोनेशियाई, जापानी, खमेर, कोरियाई, लाओटियन, फ़ारसी, सोमाली या थाई में बैलेट की फैक्स प्रति का अनुरोध कर सकते हैं।

निर्वाचन के दिन से कम से कम सात दिन पहले, मतदाता दूरस्थ पहुँच योग्य मतपत्र के लिए अनुरोध कर सकते हैं। यह एक विकलांग मतदाता को व्यक्तिगत कंप्यूटर पर मतपत्र डाउनलोड करने और अपनी सहायक प्रौद्योगिकी का उपयोग करके इसे निजी और स्वतंत्र रूप से चिह्नित करने की अनुमति देता है।

Language Access and Voter Assistance

Berdasarkan Undang-undang Pilihan Pemilih California, setiap pemilih yang memenuhi syarat di Wilayah San Diego akan mendapatkan surat suara melalui pos paling lambat satu bulan sebelum Hari Pemilihan. Para pemilih dapat mengembalikan surat suara mereka melalui pos di kotak jempukan surat suara resmi atau di pusat pemungutan suara mana pun.

Para pemilih juga dapat memilih untuk memberikan suara mereka secara langsung di pusat pemungutan suara mana pun di wilayah tersebut. VIOLATIONS SUBJECT TO FINE AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT commit or attempt to commit election fraud.
- DO NOT provide any sort of compensation or bribery to, in any fashion or by any means induce or attempt to induce, a person to vote or refrain from voting.
- DO NOT illegally vote.
- DO NOT attempt to vote or aid another to vote when not entitled to vote.
- DO NOT engage in electioneering; photograph or record a voter entering or exiting a polling place; or obstruct ingress, egress, or parking.
- DO NOT challenge a person's right to vote or prevent voters from voting; delay the process of voting; or fraudulently advise any person that he or she is not eligible to vote or is not registered to vote.
- DO NOT attempt to ascertain how a voter voted their ballot.
- DO NOT possess or arrange for someone to possess a firearm in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT appear or arrange for someone to appear in the uniform of a peace officer, guard, or security personnel in the immediate vicinity of a polling place, with some exceptions.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with any component of a voting system.
- DO NOT forge, counterfeit, or tamper with the returns of an election.
- DO NOT alter the returns of an election.
- DO NOT tamper with, destroy, or alter any polling list, official ballot, or ballot container.
- DO NOT display any unofficial ballot collection container that may deceive a voter into believing it is an official collection box.
- DO NOT tamper or interfere with copy of the results of votes cast.
- DO NOT coerce or deceive a person who cannot read or an elder into voting for or against a candidate or measure contrary to their intent.
- DO NOT act as an election officer when you are not one.

EMPLOYERS cannot require or ask their employee to bring their vote by mail ballot to work or ask their employee to vote their ballot at work. At the time of payment of salary or wages, employers cannot enclose materials that attempt to influence the political opinions or actions of their employee.

PRECINCT BOARD MEMBERS cannot attempt to determine how a voter voted their ballot or, if that information is discovered, disclose how a voter voted their ballot.

The prohibitions on activity related to corruption of the voting process summarized above are set forth in Chapter 6 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.

WARNING: ELECTIONEERING PROHIBITED!

VIOLATIONS CAN LEAD TO FINES AND/OR IMPRISONMENT.

WHERE: Within the immediate vicinity of a person in line to cast their ballot or within 100 feet of the entrance of a polling place, curbside voting or drop box the following activities are prohibited.

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE PROHIBITED:

- DO NOT ask a person to vote for or against any candidate or ballot measure.
- DO NOT display a candidate's name, image, or logo.
- DO NOT block access to or loiter near any ballot drop boxes.
- DO NOT provide any material or audible information for or against any candidate or ballot measure near any polling place, vote center, or ballot drop box.
- DO NOT circulate any petitions, including for initiatives, referenda, recall, or candidate nominations.
- DO NOT distribute, display, or wear any clothing (hats, shirts, signs, buttons, stickers) that include a candidate's name, image, logo, and/or support or oppose any candidate or ballot measure.
- DO NOT display information or speak to a voter about the voter's eligibility to vote.

The electioneering prohibitions summarized above are set forth in Article 7 of Chapter 4 of Division 18 of the California Elections Code.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR VOTERS

Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act: Proposition 14, passed by voters in 2010, changed the way primary elections are conducted in California. All "partisan" offices, except for President and party central committee, are "voter-nominated" offices.

- You may choose any candidate running for a voter-nominated office, regardless of the party you or the candidate prefers.
- For this election, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner, State Board of Equalization, District 4, United States Representative, State Senate, and State Assembly are voter-nominated offices.

MEASURE A

NON-PRIMARY HOMES TAX.

Shall a measure to preserve homes for San Diego residents, by taxing non-primary homes (residential properties vacant more than 182 days per year), excluding owner-occupied primary residences and long-term rentals, at \$8,000 in 2027 and \$10,000 in subsequent years with annual inflation adjustments, with higher rates for corporate-owned properties, generating up to \$24 million annually for city services, with annual independent audits, until ended by voters, be adopted?

This measure requires approval of a Simple Majority (50%+1) of those voting on the measure.

OFFICIAL TITLE AND BALLOT SUMMARY

BALLOT TITLE

City of San Diego Non-Primary Homes Tax.

BALLOT SUMMARY

This measure would amend the San Diego Municipal Code by amending Chapter 3, Article 2, by adding Division 1, sections 32.0101 through 32.0123 relating to a Non-Primary Homes Tax that will impose a new tax of \$8,000 in the first year and starting at \$10,000 in subsequent years on all non-primary residences left vacant for more than 182 days per calendar year (Non-Primary Homes), plus an additional charge of \$4,000 in the first year and starting at \$5,000 in subsequent years for all Non-Primary Homes owned by a corporate entity. The tax amount and additional charge will be subject to annual increases based upon Consumer Price Index: All Urban Consumers for the San Diego - Carlsbad Area for All Items beginning in calendar year 2029. The tax will not apply to owner-occupied primary residences, long-term residential leases, and other Non-Primary Homes under certain exemptions, such as during periods of military service, certain natural disasters, and after an owner's death.

The Non-Primary Homes Tax is intended to discourage extended vacancies and housing speculation and encourage long-term leases and property sales, increasing the housing available for occupancy. The new tax is also intended to raise funds for municipal services to be deposited into the City's General Fund, which can be used for general City services.

The Council of the City of San Diego (City Council) placed the measure on the ballot, and it will pass if it is approved by a majority vote of those qualified voters who vote on the measure. The amendments would take effect after the results of the election are certified by a resolution of the City Council. If adopted, collection of the tax is expected to commence January 1, 2027.

CITY ATTORNEY IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

The City of San Diego (City) placed Measure A on the ballot for the voters to decide whether to amend the San Diego Municipal Code (Municipal Code) to add a tax of \$8,000 in the first year and starting at \$10,000 in subsequent years on all non-primary residences left vacant for more than 182 days per calendar year (Non-Primary Homes), plus an additional charge of \$4,000 in the first year and starting at \$5,000 in subsequent years for all Non-Primary Homes owned by a corporate entity. The tax amount and additional charge will be subject to annual increases based upon Consumer Price Index: All Urban Consumers for the San Diego - Carlsbad Area for All Items beginning in calendar year 2029.

The tax will not apply to owner-occupied primary residences, long-term residential leases, and other Non-Primary Homes under certain exemptions, such as during periods of military service, certain natural disasters, and after an owner's death. The City does not currently charge a tax on Non-Primary Homes.

Estimates show that there are approximately 5,140 homes in the City that are potentially subject to the tax proposed by this measure. This is a "general tax," not a "special tax," because this measure does not legally restrict the use of tax revenue to any specific purposes. The proceeds may be used for general municipal services and all lawful public purposes.

If approved by a majority of the voters at the June 2, 2026, election, as authorized by California law, the City will begin charging the new tax on January 1, 2027. The tax would be due no later than April 1 for the previous calendar year and collected annually. Proceeds from the tax would be deposited into the City's General Fund. A report containing the amount of monies collected from the Non-Primary Homes Tax, number of homes subject to the tax, and qualified exemptions and exclusions will be submitted annually to the City Council, by September 15 of each year. All proceeds generated by the Non-Primary Homes Tax shall be included in the annual audit of the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report conducted by the City's outside independent auditor.

A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of the tax. A "No" vote is a vote against the tax. Measure A will be approved if it receives a simple majority of "Yes" votes. This measure was proposed by Councilmember Sean Elo-Rivera, and the City Council voted to place it on the ballot. If approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting on the measure, the Municipal Code would be amended after the election results are certified by a resolution of the City Council. If adopted, the collection of the new tax is expected to begin on January 1, 2027, and the measure will remain in effect until amended or repealed by the voters.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT FOR CITY MEASURE A ON JUNE 2, 2026 BALLOT: EMPTY HOMES TAX ORDINANCE

This measure would create a new tax on owners of vacant, residential homes who keep those properties vacant for 183 or more days in a calendar year. Certain exemptions would be provided, including but not limited to primary residences, properties leased to a tenant(s) or occupied by family, and owners unable to occupy or rent a property for specified reasons. If approved, the new tax would become effective January 1, 2027. Vacant properties in calendar year 2027 would be taxed at a rate of \$8,000, which would increase to \$10,000 in calendar year 2028. Corporate owned vacant properties would be taxed an additional \$4,000 in calendar year 2027, which would increase to \$5,000 in calendar year 2028. Thereafter, tax rates would be annually adjusted by regional inflation.

If this measure passes, the City would receive estimated additional net revenue ranging between \$9.2 million (conservative) to \$21.4 million (optimistic) in the first year of implementation, which could increase to \$10.5 million (conservative) to \$24.3 million (optimistic) in the second year. This new revenue range varies based on assumptions about the number of taxable vacant properties. Based on currently available data, it is estimated that there are 5,140 properties potentially eligible for this tax. A notable share of these properties (between 45% to 70%) are assumed to be excluded from the tax in the first year, due to exemptions or properties becoming occupied. Should more properties be exempted, occupied, or otherwise untaxed, revenue would likely fall below the estimated range. Additionally, should this measure have the intended effect of reducing the number of vacant properties as more properties are occupied over time, tax revenue from this measure in future years will also decline.

All revenue collected under this measure would be unrestricted and deposited into the City's General Fund. Revenue from this measure could

be used to support rental assistance, affordable housing development, and infrastructure, but would not be restricted to those purposes and could also be used to support other City services including but not limited to neighborhood services (such as libraries and parks), public safety (such as police, fire, and 9-1-1 response services), and general infrastructure (such as streets, sidewalks, streetlights, and flood prevention).

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE A

THE PROBLEM: HOUSING COSTS ARE CRUSHING SAN DIEGO FAMILIES.

Renting or buying a home in San Diego is unaffordable for young professionals and working families. More than 5,100 homes sit vacant for most of the year — held by corporations, out-of-state investors, and absentee owners — while everyday San Diegans compete for too few homes, driving up rents and prices for everyone.

THE SOLUTION: MEASURE A — THE EMPTY HOMES TAX

Measure A discourages corporations, out-of-state investors, and absentee owners from keeping homes vacant during a housing shortage and encourages vacant homes to be used as homes again. Those who make their homes available for San Diego families to rent or buy pay nothing. Those who keep homes empty pay a tax, with the revenue funding services that benefit all San Diegans.

Measure A protects everyday homeowners:

- 99% of San Diego residents pay nothing
- All primary residences are exempt

We've carefully reviewed Measure A. We strongly urge you to VOTE NO! It's bad for you and our city.

- The new tax money won't go to a housing fund, but into the **black hole** of the City's General Fund. The City is desperate for money due to **bad decision-making**. City leaders should spend our money wisely *before* asking us for new taxes.
- The measure **does not require a single new unit** of housing to be built. The City's own analysis said that similar measures in other cities had **almost no effect on housing construction or lowering rents**.
- A **whole new unit** will be established to enforce and collect the tax. They'll have to track the occupancy of over 500,000 homes. No one can say for sure how big this unit will be. We call it the **"occupancy bureaucracy"** and it will **consume a significant portion of the taxes it collects**.
- In other cities with similar taxes, enforcement has gotten **very aggressive** and been invasive into **people's privacy**.

CHAPTER 3:

BUSINESS REGULATIONS, BUSINESS TAXES, PERMITS AND LICENSES

ARTICLE 2

SALES TAX

DIVISION 1

EMPTY HOMES TAX

§32.0101 Title

This Division shall be known as the Empty Homes Tax Ordinance and shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

§32.0102 Purpose and Intent

The People of the City of San Diego find and declare as follows:

- (a) The use of residential property for purposes other than long-term housing for San Diegans is an ongoing concern.
- (b) Approximately 5,140 residences are currently not claimed as primary residences or rental properties and are used as vacation homes or second homes. These 5,140 residences are not available for San Diegans to live in. Taxing the owners of these properties to provide revenue for the City or returning these residences to the housing market is a key strategy for ensuring long-term housing affordability.
- (c) The City of San Diego is in a housing crisis. While the City is on track to meet its Regional Housing Needs Assessment goals for those earning above 120 percent Area Median Income, the City may not be able to build sufficient housing for moderate, low, or very low-income San Diego residents.
- (d) Empty homes restrict the supply of available housing, often resulting in housing speculation, which runs counter to the City's housing objectives. Prolonged vacancies can also decrease economic activity in neighborhoods and lead to nuisance and blight.
- (e) The housing affordability crisis has created an urgent need for the City to pay for additional services such as rental assistance, construction of new affordable housing, the acquisition and rehabilitation of multi-unit buildings for affordable housing, and the continued operation of these buildings to remain affordable to households of a variety of income levels.
- (f) The City is also working to ensure that all public funds available from the City, San Diego County, state, and federal governments are being maximized. Despite these resources, the current available housing stock is not sufficient to house all the City's residents.
- (g) The increased costs of meeting the challenges of the housing crisis have impacted the City's General Fund and the City's ability to pay for municipal services. The Empty Homes Tax is intended to disincentivize prolonged vacancies and housing speculation, thereby increasing the number of residential units available for occupancy, while also raising funds for municipal services, such as rental assistance and constructing, acquiring, and rehabilitating affordable housing.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

- (h) In 2024, the City of San Diego permitted 8,782 new housing units, including 1,061 deed-restricted affordable housing units. This is less than the City's annual need for construction of 13,500 new housing units as determined by the Regional Housing Needs Assessment for the period 2021 to 2029. The Empty Homes Tax is one way to bridge the significant gap between the housing needs of residents and the availability of housing.
- (i) Members of the armed forces, whether active duty, reserve, or National Guard, can face unpredictable deployments, mobilizations, or relocations resulting from their military service and as a result may own an empty home. An exclusion period for owners who are service members allows for the flexibility to use their property as an empty home without placing an undue burden on them.
- (j) Empty homes owned by corporate investors place an additional burden on San Diego's housing crisis by removing otherwise available housing for San Diego families from the market. Currently, 24 percent of homes in San Diego County are owned by institutional or business investors, making it harder for San Diegans to become homeowners.

§32.0103

Definitions

For purposes of this Division, defined terms appear in italics. The following definitions apply in this Division:

Corporate ownership means when any owner is not a natural person (e.g., a limited liability company, partnership, limited partnership, corporation, real estate investment trust). For purposes of this Division, corporate ownership does not include revocable trusts such as living trusts, family trusts, inter vivos trusts, grantor trusts, and similar instruments.

Disaster period means the two-year period following the date that a residential unit was rendered uninhabitable or unusable due to fire, natural disaster, or other catastrophic event, except when a negligent, reckless, or willful act or omission by any owner, related person, or agent thereof contributed to or caused the residential unit to become uninhabitable or unusable due to fire, natural disaster, or other catastrophic event.

Empty home means a residential unit that is not an owner's primary residence and is vacant for more than 182 days per calendar year. For purposes of this Division, an empty home does not include a residential unit with a current Tier Three or Tier Four license, as defined in San Diego Municipal Code section 510.0102.

Empty home exclusion period means the disaster period, family-in-residence period, homeowner period, lease period, legacy owner hardship period, newly built housing period, non-ownership period, owner death period, owner-in-care period, or qualifying military service period.

Family-in-residence period means the period during which a residential unit is occupied by a related person of any owner who occupies that residential unit as their primary residence and the annual rent paid by the related person for use of the residential unit is less than the owner's expenses related to the residential unit for the same period.

Homeowner period means the period during which a residential unit is the principal place of residence of any owner and for which such owner has, according to the San Diego County Tax Assessor's records, validly claimed the homeowners' property tax exemption under section 218 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, or the disabled

veterans' exemption under section 205.5 of that Code, as those sections may be amended.

Lease period means the period during which any owner leases their residential unit to one or more tenants under a bona fide lease for occupancy.

Legacy owner hardship period means the period during which the owner experiences a qualifying financial hardship that affects the owner's ability to remit the Empty Homes Tax following an owner death period. Only an owner whose income is 200 percent or less of the current United States Department of Health and Human Services poverty guidelines or who receives federal, state, or City public benefits from qualified programs is eligible for the legacy owner hardship period.

Newly built housing period means the period during which a builder's newly constructed residential unit remains vacant while being actively offered for sale, provided that such period shall not exceed two years from the date that the residential unit was first issued a certificate of occupancy.

Non-ownership period means the period during which a person was not the owner of the empty home.

Owner means the person that holds legal title to the empty home in a given calendar year when the tax is due.

Owner death period means the period during which a residential unit is vacant because of the death of any owner or related person who occupied that residential unit as their principal residence immediately prior to that person's death, provided that such period shall not exceed two years or the period during which the residential unit is subject to the authority of a probate court, whichever is longer.

Owner-in-care period means the period during which a residential unit is vacant because a person who formerly occupied that residential unit as their principal residence is residing in a hospital, long-term or supportive care facility, medical care or treatment facility, or other similar facility.

Person has the same meaning as in San Diego Municipal Code section 11.0210.

Qualifying military service period means any period during which an owner or related person, who occupied that residential unit as their principal residence and who is a member of the United States Armed Forces, whether Active Duty, Reserve, or National Guard, is deployed, mobilized, or temporarily relocated pursuant to military orders, including reassignment to another duty station, regardless of location.

Related person means a spouse, legal domestic partner, child, parent, or sibling of an owner.

Residential unit means all single dwelling units, as defined in San Diego Municipal Code section 113.0103, which for purposes of this Division does not include residential care facilities as detailed in San Diego Municipal Code section 141.0312 or transitional housing as detailed in San Diego Municipal Code section 141.0313, multiple dwelling units, as defined in San Diego Municipal Code section 113.0103, which for purposes of this Division does not include continuing care retirement communities as detailed in San Diego Municipal Code section 141.0303, and accessory dwelling units and junior accessory dwelling units as defined in San Diego Municipal Code section 113.0103.

Service or serve means that notices, including notices of an assessment, hearing, determination, or decision, shall be personal or provided by email to the email address of the

designated person on file with the City, or by depositing the notice in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to that designated person at the address on file with the City. Service is effective either at the time of personal service, at the time the email notice is sent, or at the time the notice is deposited into the United States mail. The provisions of California Code of Civil Procedure section 1013 do not apply.

§32.0104

Empty Homes Tax Imposed

- (a) Except as otherwise provided in this Division, an owner is subject to and shall pay an annual tax on the operation of an empty home, known as the Empty Homes Tax.
- (b) The City shall assess an Empty Homes Tax every year on January 1 for the preceding calendar year as follows:
 - (1) For the calendar year beginning January 1, 2027, there shall be a tax on the operation of an empty home in the amount of \$8,000.
 - (2) For the calendar year beginning January 1, 2028, and each calendar year thereafter, there shall be a tax on the operation of an empty home in the amount of \$10,000.
 - (3) In addition to the amount set forth in section 32.0104(b)(1), there shall be an additional charge of \$4,000 for the operation of each empty home that is under corporate ownership.
 - (4) In addition to the amount set forth in section 32.0104(b)(2), there shall be an additional charge of \$5,000 for the operation of each empty home that is under corporate ownership.
- (c) The rates set forth in section 32.0104(b) shall be adjusted annually in accordance with the increase in the Consumer Price Index: All Urban Consumers for the San Diego - Carlsbad Area for All Items as reported by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, or any successor to that index, as of December 31st of the preceding year, beginning with the 2029 calendar year.
- (d) The owner of the empty home shall pay the Empty Homes Tax each calendar year. If an empty home has more than one owner, each owner shall be jointly and severally liable for the Empty Homes Tax, which shall be the highest amount of the tax payable for that empty home for that calendar year.
- (e) The City shall disregard any fraudulent action taken by an owner that has the principal purpose of avoiding or evading all or a portion of the Empty Homes Tax for purposes of determining the amount of the Empty Homes Tax and whether the Empty Homes Tax is due.
- (f) The Empty Homes Tax shall take effect on January 1, 2027, and continue until repealed by the voters.
- (g) The City Council may, by a majority vote of the members elected to the City Council, amend this Division in furtherance of its purposes or to correct ambiguities or errors in language.

§32.0105

Time and Manner of Payment

- (a) The owner of an empty home shall pay the Empty Homes Tax or substantiate either a valid exemption under section 32.0106 or a valid empty home exclusion period under section 32.0107 in the form and manner

prescribed by the City Manager, or designee, as follows:

- (1) no later than April 1 for the previous calendar year; and
 - (2) any tax due pursuant to this Division shall be delinquent if not paid, or if the owner fails to demonstrate a valid exemption under section 32.0106 or application of a valid empty home exclusion period under section 32.0107, within the dates specified in section 32.0105(a)(1).
- (b) The documentation required to substantiate a valid exemption under section 32.0106 or application of a valid empty home exclusion period under section 32.0107 is contained in the guidelines authorized by section 32.0108.

§32.0106

Exemptions

- (a) For only so long as and to the extent that the City is prohibited by any law or order of the State of California or of the United States from imposing the Empty Homes Tax on any person, that person shall be exempt from the Empty Homes Tax.
- (b) The City, the State of California, and any county, municipal corporation, district, or other political subdivision of the State of California shall be subject to the Empty Homes Tax unless otherwise immune or exempt.
- (c) An owner of a property composed of four or fewer separate residential units where the owner occupies one of the residential units as their principal residence shall be exempt from the Empty Homes Tax for that property.
- (d) An owner of an empty home that had a bona fide lease or leases for occupancy for that specific residential unit for more than 182 days in the calendar year prior to its becoming an empty home shall be exempt from the Empty Homes Tax.
- (e) An owner seeking an exemption under section 32.0106 shall be required to demonstrate their entitlement to the exemption annually by submitting supporting documentation to the City Manager, or designee, in the form, manner, and at the time established in regulations or guidelines hereafter promulgated by the City.

§32.0107

Empty Home Exclusion Period

- (a) An owner that substantiates a valid empty home exclusion period of more than 182 days in a calendar year shall not be subject to the Empty Homes Tax for that calendar year.
- (b) Any owner seeking an empty home exclusion period under section 32.0107 shall be required to demonstrate their entitlement to the exemption annually by submitting supporting documentation to the City Manager, or designee, in the form, manner, and at the time established in regulations or guidelines hereafter promulgated by the City.

§32.0108

Administration

The City Manager, or designee, shall enforce the provisions of this Division and may promulgate reasonable rules, regulations, interpretations, and guidelines to implement and enforce the provisions of this Division.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

§32.0109 Penalties

- (a) An owner shall pay a penalty of 10 percent of the amount of tax owed when the tax required to be paid by this Division is delinquent. This penalty is in addition to the amount of the tax owed.
- (b) In each year the Empty Homes Tax is owed to the City, any owner determined to have engaged in one or more fraudulent actions with the principal purpose of avoiding or evading all or a portion of the Empty Homes Tax shall be liable for the Empty Homes Tax plus a penalty in an amount equal to the Empty Homes Tax.

§32.0110 Assessments

If an owner fails to or refuses to remit any Empty Homes Tax or any portion thereof, as required by this Division, the City Manager, or designee, may, using any information available to them, assess against the owner an amount equal to the Empty Homes Tax and penalties provided by this Division for the unremitted tax. In making an assessment, the City Manager, or designee, may estimate the amount of any unremitted Empty Homes Tax, which is entitled to a rebuttable presumption of correctness. The assessment shall be served on the owner in the manner required by section 32.0103 and is due and payable 30 calendar days after service of the assessment unless a timely appeal is submitted under section 32.0111.

§32.0111 Appeals

- (a) An owner against whom a notice of assessment under section 32.0110 has been served may, within 30 calendar days after the date of service of the notice, submit a written request to the City Manager, or designee, for a hearing on the assessment. If a timely request for a hearing on the assessment is not made, the assessment is final, due, and payable 30 calendar days after service of the notice of assessment. Following receipt of a timely written request for a hearing on the assessment, the City Manager, or designee, shall schedule a hearing and serve the owner with written notice of the hearing, including its time and location, at least 10 calendar days before the hearing. At the hearing, the owner may appear in person and be represented by legal counsel, present evidence, call witnesses, and present argument to the City Manager, or designee, as to why the assessment, including any penalties, should be modified or withdrawn. The City Manager, or designee, may continue the hearing as needed. Within 30 calendar days after the conclusion of the hearing, the City Manager, or designee, shall serve the owner with a written decision affirming, modifying, or withdrawing the assessment. In preparing the written decision, the City Manager, or designee, shall consider all evidence produced and determine the proper assessment, including penalties, if applicable. If the assessment being appealed is less than the jurisdictional amount for unlimited civil cases, not including penalties, the City Manager's, or designee's, decision shall be final, constitute the exhaustion of the owner's administrative remedies, and the assessment shall be due and payable 30 calendar days after service of the notice of decision. If the assessment being appealed is greater than or equal to the jurisdictional amount for unlimited civil cases, not including penalties, the City Manager's, or designee's, decision is final, due, and payable 30 calendar days after service of the notice of decision, unless a timely appeal for a hearing before a hearing officer is submitted under section 32.0111(b).

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

- (b) An owner whose assessment is greater than or equal to the jurisdictional amount for unlimited civil cases, not including penalties, may appeal the City Manager's, or designee's, decision under section 32.0111(b) by submitting a written notice of appeal with the City Manager, or designee, for a hearing before a hearing officer within 30 calendar days after service of the City Manager's, or designee's, decision. Only the principal of an assessment may be appealed. Penalties cannot be appealed unless their application is unlawful or improperly calculated.
- (c) The hearing officer shall schedule the appeal hearing within 30 calendar days following the City Manager's, or designee's, receipt of the written notice of appeal. At the appeal hearing before the hearing officer, the owner and the City Manager, or designee, both have the right to appear in person and be represented by legal counsel, present evidence, call and cross-examine witnesses under oath, and present argument. The hearing officer has the power to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of documents by subpoena in accordance with applicable state laws. The formal rules of evidence will not apply to the hearing and any relevant evidence may be considered. Hearsay evidence may be considered by the hearing officer, but no findings may be based solely on hearsay evidence unless supported or corroborated by other relevant and competent evidence, or if the hearsay is subject to a formal exception to the hearsay rule. The hearing officer is authorized to rule upon issues of law or fact and to determine the amount of the assessment in accordance with this Division. The hearing officer has no authority to waive, mitigate, or suspend the collection of any assessment, including penalties, found to be duly imposed and properly calculated. The hearing officer shall meet all the following requirements:
 - (1) be appointed by the City Manager, or designee;
 - (2) be an active member of the California State Bar;
 - (3) not be a City employee; and
 - (4) be compensated by the City for the time spent on the appeal.
- (d) The hearing officer's decision shall be issued in writing and served on the City Manager, or designee, and owner via United States mail no more than 30 calendar days after the conclusion of the hearing. The decision is the final administrative remedy of the owner. Any amounts due are immediately payable to the City Manager, or designee.
- (e) The City Manager, or designee, may promulgate supplemental rules and procedures for the conduct of hearings, the forms of notice and proceedings, and the preparation and submission of the record, so long as the supplemental rules and procedures are consistent with this Division and other laws.

§32.0112

Judicial Review

- (a) A final decision of a hearing officer under section 32.0111(d) or a final decision of the City Manager, or designee, under section 32.0111(a) is subject to judicial review by filing a petition for writ of administrative mandate under California Code of Civil Procedure sections 1094.5 and 1094.6, as those sections may be amended, in the appropriate court within 90 calendar days of service of the hearing officer's final decision.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

- (b) Any assessment, including any penalties, due under a hearing officer's final decision for which judicial review is sought shall be paid to the City as a precondition to filing a writ petition challenging the decision. Notwithstanding section 32.0115(c), a claim for a refund under section 32.0115 is not required to be submitted before filing a writ petition under section 32.0112. If the court finds that the petitioner has paid more taxes than legally required, including penalties, and if the amount of the overpayment can be ascertained from the administrative record, the court may order a refund of the excess payments or remittances as part of its judgment.
- (c) The City or any owner directly interested in a decision described in section 32.0111(d) may seek judicial review under section 32.0112.

§32.0113

Audits

- (a) The City Manager, or designee, may conduct an audit of any owner of an empty home to ensure compliance with this Division. The City Manager, or designee, shall serve written notice on the owner being audited of the initiation of the audit and time period subject to the audit. The City Manager, or designee, has the power to compel the production of documents by subpoena in accordance with the applicable state laws.
- (b) Notice of initiation of an audit shall be served on an owner within ten years of the date that payment of the Empty Homes Tax was made, should have been made, or either an exemption under section 32.0106 or an application for an empty home exclusion period under section 32.0107 was submitted.
- (c) Upon completion of an audit, the City Manager, or designee, may make an assessment under section 32.0110 of any taxes not remitted during the audit period. The City Manager, or designee, shall serve the owner with notice of the assessment and any penalty due under section 32.0109. If an owner subject to audit is unable or unwilling to provide the necessary records to enable the City Manager, or designee, to verify compliance with this Division, the City Manager, or designee, may base the assessment on any documents previously submitted to the City.
- (d) Audit requirements are further contained in the guidelines authorized by section 32.0108.
- (e) If the City Manager, or designee, determines from an audit that the owner has not complied with any provision of this section 32.0113 or the City Manager's, or designee's, administrative guidelines regarding audit requirements, the owner shall reimburse the City for the cost of the audit.

§32.0114

Records

- (a) Every owner required to remit to the City any Empty Homes Tax imposed by this Division shall retain, for a period of ten years following the due date of remittance, all records necessary to determine the amount of Empty Homes Tax for which the owner is liable. In the exercise of duties imposed by this Division, the City Manager, or designee, has the right to inspect records at all reasonable times and to apply auditing procedures necessary to determine the amount of Empty Homes Tax due to the City. It is unlawful for an owner to refuse to allow an inspection by the City Manager, or designee.
- (b) The records of an owner shall be retained within the geographic boundaries of the City accessible to the City Manager, or designee, and shall be provided for

inspection within 30 calendar days following service of a notice of audit.

- (c) Records requirements are contained in the guidelines authorized by section 32.0108.
- (d) If an owner has not complied with any provision of section 32.0114 or the City Manager's, or designee's, administrative guidelines regarding records requirements, the operator shall reimburse the City for the cost of the audit.

§32.0115

Refunds

- (a) An owner may request a refund from the City in any manner specified in section 32.0115 of any Empty Homes Tax or penalty paid to the City that was overpaid, including when the tax or penalty was erroneously paid more than once or was erroneously or unlawfully collected or received by the City. The owner shall submit to the City Manager, or designee, a written claim for a refund on forms available from the City Manager, or designee, stating under penalty of perjury the specific grounds upon which the claim is based. The owner shall submit the written claim for a refund within one year of the date of payment or within one year of the entry of judgment in a decision on a writ petition filed under section 32.0112(a).
- (b) No refund shall be paid under the provisions of section 32.0115 unless the claimant establishes the claimant's right to a refund through written records.
- (c) A lawsuit seeking a refund may not be filed until a claim for a refund has been submitted under section 32.0115 and denied by the City, except for a writ petition under section 32.0112.

§32.0116

Actions to Collect Taxes and Enforcement of Liens

- (a) Any amount required to be paid under this Division is a debt owed to the City.
- (b) The City may bring an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to collect any moneys owed, including penalties, under this Division. All penalties become part of the principal and total assessed tax owed by the owner. The action shall be commenced within three years of:
- (1) the due date stated on the notice of assessment under section 32.0110 for which a timely application for a hearing is not made under section 32.0111(a);
 - (2) the due date stated on the notice of decision by the City Manager, or designee, under section 32.0111(a) that is not timely appealed under section 32.0111(b);
 - (3) the due date stated on the notice of decision by a hearing officer under section 32.0111(d) that imposes an assessment and for which judicial review is not sought under section 32.0112; or
 - (4) the entry date of a final judgment following judicial review under section 32.0112.
- (c) Without initiating litigation, the City Manager, or designee, may, after serving the owner by certified mail with 20 calendar days' prior notice of the intent to record a certificate of lien, record in the Office of the San Diego County Recorder, or with any other County Recorder in

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

California, a certificate of lien that states the following: the amount of tax due, including penalties, collection referral fees, and costs; the name and address of the owner liable for the payment; that the City Manager, or designee, has complied with all provisions of this Division in the determination of the amount required to be paid; and a short legal description of the real property or properties owned by the owner, if known. The certificate of lien may be recorded under any of the following circumstances:

- (1) the City Manager, or designee, has made an assessment against an owner under section 32.0110, of which the owner has been provided notice, for which a timely application for a hearing is not made under section 32.0111(a);
 - (2) the City Manager, or designee, has rendered a decision against an owner under section 32.0111(a), of which the owner has been provided notice, that is not timely appealed under section 32.0111(b);
 - (3) a decision is rendered against an owner by a hearing officer under section 32.0111(d), of which the owner has been provided notice, for which timely judicial review is not sought under section 32.0112; or
 - (4) a final judgment following judicial review under section 32.0112 is issued against an owner, of which the owner has been provided notice, and the amounts owing are not paid when due.
- (d) From the time of the recording of the certificate of lien in San Diego or any other County in California, the amount required to be paid, inclusive of tax, penalties, collection referral fees, and costs, constitutes a lien upon all real property in the County owned by the owner or thereafter acquired before the lien expires. The lien has the force, effect, and priority of a tax lien and continues until released or otherwise discharged prior to that date. The lien may be extended for subsequent periods of 10 years by filing a notice that is acceptable to the County Recorder.
- (e) Upon the concurrence of the City Attorney and the City Manager, the City Manager, or designee, is authorized to compromise the collection of an amount due, to establish a schedule of payment for an amount due, to discontinue the collection of any claim that is determined to be uncollectable, or to discontinue the collection of any amount for which the cost of collection is likely to exceed the amount to be collected.

§32.0117

Violations and Criminal Proceedings

- (a) An owner who violates any requirement of this Division shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, including:
- (1) engaging in any fraudulent transactions with the principal purpose of avoiding or evading all or a portion of the tax owed under this Division;
 - (2) willfully failing or refusing to remit or cause to be remitted any tax owed;
 - (3) willfully refusing to allow an audit to be conducted; or
 - (4) willfully refusing to provide records in accordance with section 32.0114.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE A (CONTINUED)

- (b) The commencement of criminal proceedings shall neither preclude nor abate administrative or civil actions to collect taxes due under this Division.
- (c) Violations under section 32.0117 are continuing violations and each day the violation continues constitutes a separate misdemeanor.
- (d) It is not a defense to a violation of this Division that an owner forwarded the tax due by this Division to its principal or corporate headquarters, or that any failure to submit the taxes was based on the direction or inaction of the principal or corporate headquarters.

§32.0118

Use of Funds for General Municipal Purposes

The Council may deposit any portion of the proceeds generated by the Empty Homes Tax into the City's General Fund to fund any general municipal services designated by the City Council, including rental assistance, constructing, acquiring, and rehabilitating affordable housing and infrastructure.

§32.0119

Annual Reports

The City Manager, or designee, shall file annually with the City Council, by September 15 of each year, a report containing the amount of monies collected from the Empty Homes Tax during the prior calendar year, the number of empty homes, the number of qualified exemptions and empty home exclusion periods, and the number of delinquencies. The first report shall be filed no later than September 15, 2028, covering the calendar year ending December 31, 2027.

§32.0120

Authorization and Limitation on Issuance of Bonds

The City is authorized to pledge revenues generated by the Empty Homes Tax to the repayment of limited tax bonds or other forms of indebtedness authorized under this section 32.0120. The City Council shall by ordinance or resolution, as applicable, establish the terms of any limited tax bonds or other forms of indebtedness authorized hereby, including the amount of the issue, date, covenants, denominations, interest rate or rates, maturity or maturities, redemption rights, tax status, manner of sale, and such other particulars as are necessary or desirable.

§32.0121

Effect of Invalidity; Severability

If any section, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or other portion of this Division is, for any reason, declared unconstitutional or invalid, in whole or in part, by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed severable, and such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Division, which shall continue in full force and effect.

§32.0122

Savings Clause

No section, clause, part, or provision of this Division shall be construed as requiring the payment of any tax that would be in violation of the Constitution or laws of the United States or of the Constitution or laws of the State of California.

§32.0123

Liberal Construction

This Division shall be liberally construed to effectuate its purpose.

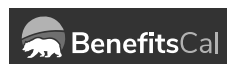

SAVE OUR CITRUS!

A new plant disease called Huanglongbing (HLB) that kills citrus trees has been found throughout Southern California including San Diego County in backyard citrus. Early detection is key to protect our citrus trees.

WHAT IS HUANGLONGBING?

Huanglongbing, also called citrus greening, is a fatal citrus disease spread by a pest called the Asian Citrus Psyllid. The fruits of an infected tree remain small and green with bitter juice and drop early.

The leaves have asymmetrical discoloration, and the tree loses leaves. An infected tree eventually becomes unproductive and dies.

WHAT YOU CAN DO:

- Inspect your citrus trees monthly for disease symptoms and Asian Citrus Psyllid.
- Do not move citrus plants and fruit with stems and leaves out of quarantine areas or across state or international borders.
- Plant new trees that come from reputable, licensed nurseries.
- Cooperate with agricultural officials.
- Report suspected HLB infected trees to the California Department of Food and Agriculture Pest Hotline: 1-800-491-1899.
