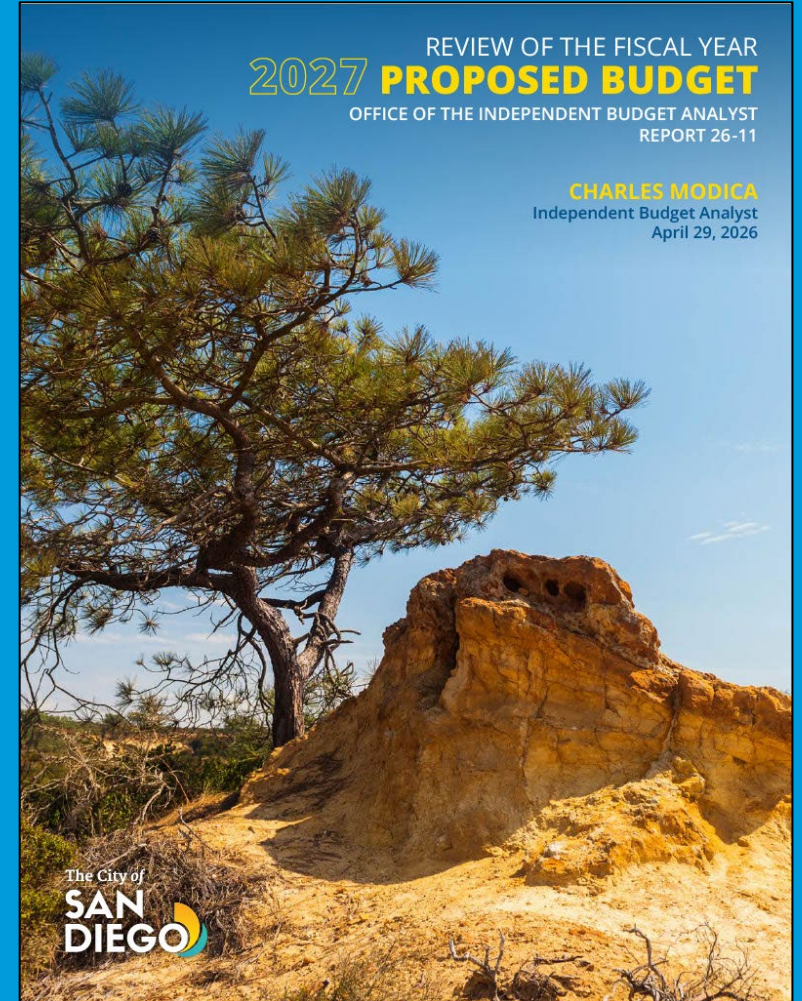

Why is the City's Budget Important?

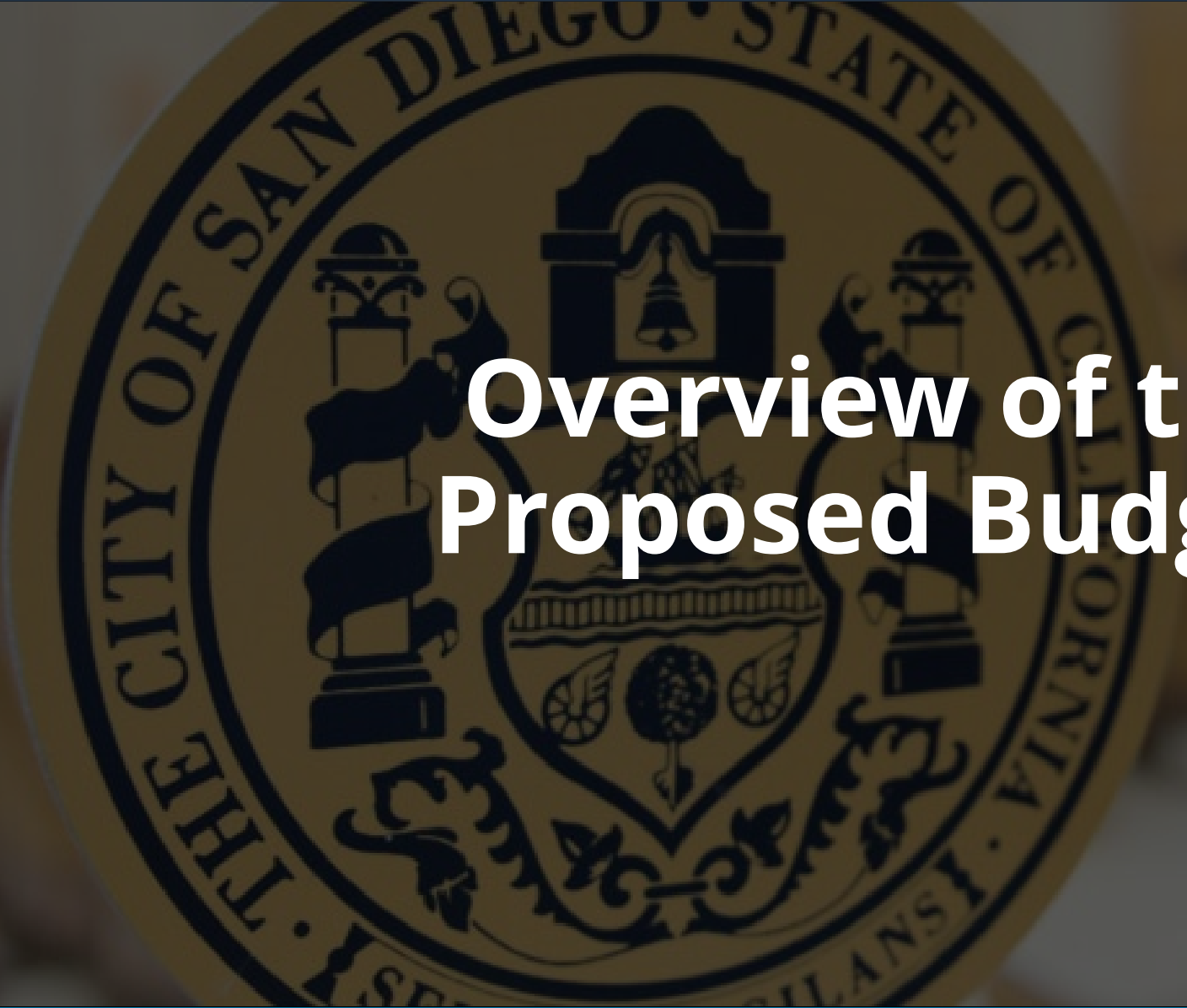

Overview

Key Findings

- City has operated with a structural deficit for years
 - Decisions in 2010s to defer infrastructure maintenance and suppress employee compensation had short-term savings but long-term costs
 - More recent budgets relied on one-time resources to fund ongoing programs
- No significant new revenue sources are available to balance FY 2027 Budget
- City's finances are in a precarious state:
 - Fund balances, reduced cash-on-hand, below-target reserve levels, maximized debt capacity, infrastructure backlog
- Critical to align ongoing expenses with ongoing revenues to provide stability and build public trust

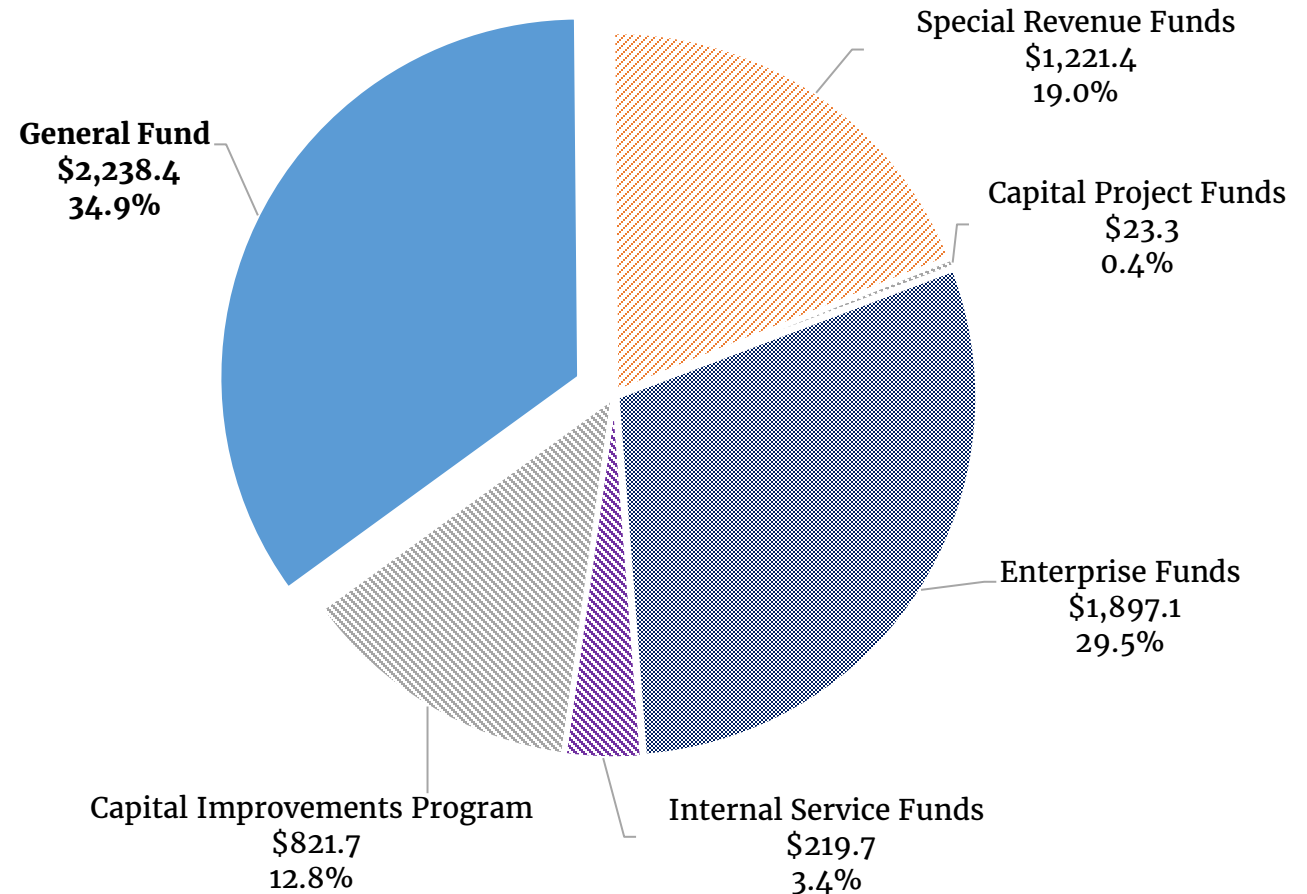

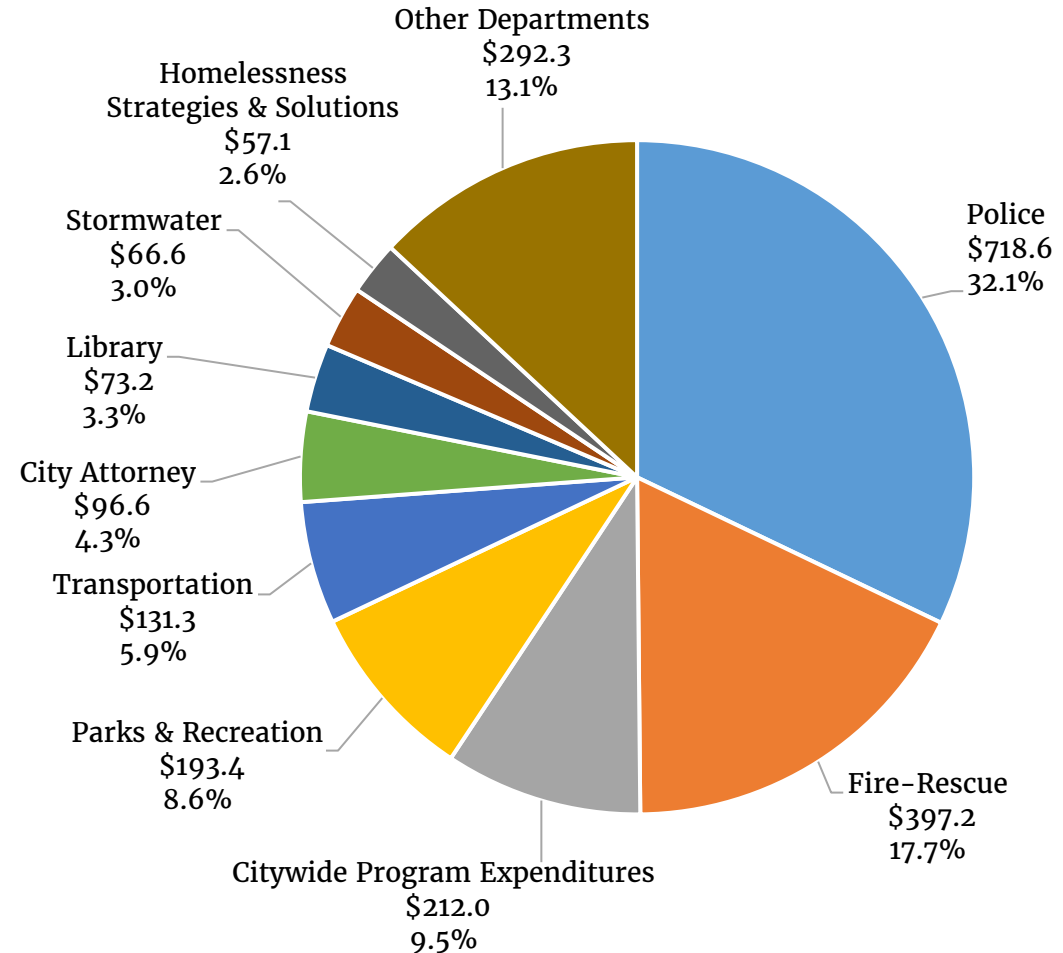
**General Fund Revenues
increase by \$67.3 million
over FY 2026**

- \$40.3 million increase in Major Revenues
 - 2.7% over FY 2026 Budget
- \$27.0 million increase in Other Revenues
 - 4.0% over FY 2026 Budget
 - Reflects transfers to General Fund, not necessarily new revenue to City

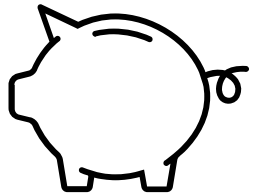
General Fund Expenditures by Department

Equity Highlights

IBA's Division of Race & Equity (DRE)

- DRE analyzed equity-related implications of budget adjustments
 - DRE considered progress of achieving target performance levels, actions needed to close disparities, gaps, and deficiencies, as well as community impacts
- Equity implications categories:
 1. Employee Workforce Impacts
 2. Public Liability Claims
 3. Mobility & Infrastructure
 4. Neighborhood Services & Enrichment
 5. Public Safety
 6. Policy and Practice Implications
 7. High Priority Equity-Focused Programs
- Districts with higher poverty rates generally require more support
 - Citywide Low-to-Moderate Income (LMI) Rate: 47.9%
 - D4 LMI Rate: 58.3%

Key Budget Issues

Classified and Unclassified Positions

- Proportion of classified to unclassified positions citywide is 13.9 to 1
- Proportion of position cuts higher among unclassified ranks than classified

FTEs	Citywide (All Funds)	Citywide <u>Net</u> Reductions	General Fund	GF <u>Net</u> Reductions
Classified	11,616.50	(68.00)	7,022.66	(157.50)
Unclassified and Unrepresented	833.00	(40.00)	550.09	(24.47)
Total	12,449.50	(108.00)	7,572.75	(181.97)
% Classified	93.3%	63.0%	92.7%	86.6%
% Unclassified	6.7%	37.0%	7.3%	13.4%

Note: This table does not include unclassified Deputy City Attorneys represented by the DCAA. The Proposed Budget adds 3.00 DCAA FTEs, for a total of 179.00, all within the General Fund.

Pension

- Pension costs make up 17.7% of General Fund expenditures
- Most significant increase due to higher salaries than assumed in FY 2024

Key Budget Issues

Structural Budget Deficit

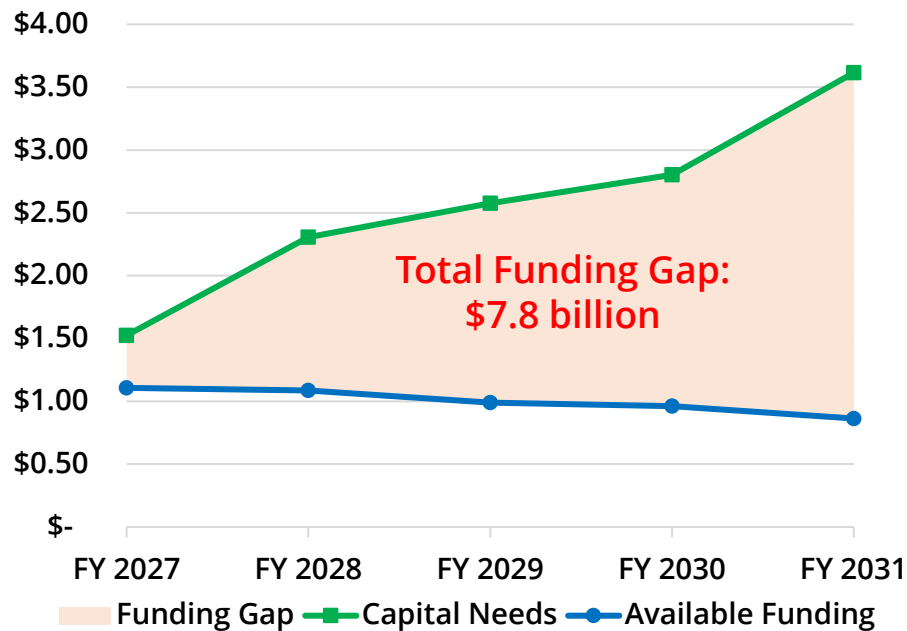
- Ongoing expenses have grown faster than ongoing revenues
- Structural deficit decades in the making; structural imbalance significant in more recent years
- Progress towards structural balance must be made

Key Budget Issues

Infrastructure needs far exceed funding available

FY 2027 – FY 2031 Projected Capital Needs Funding
(\$ in billions)



- CIP Outlook projects \$7.8B five-year gap
 - Stormwater is a major driver; heavy reliance on emergency projects
 - Establishing an ongoing funding source for stormwater is critical
- Insufficient maintenance funding compounds issue
 - New facilities opening, while maintenance is being cut
- Funding restrictions limit progress toward broader priorities

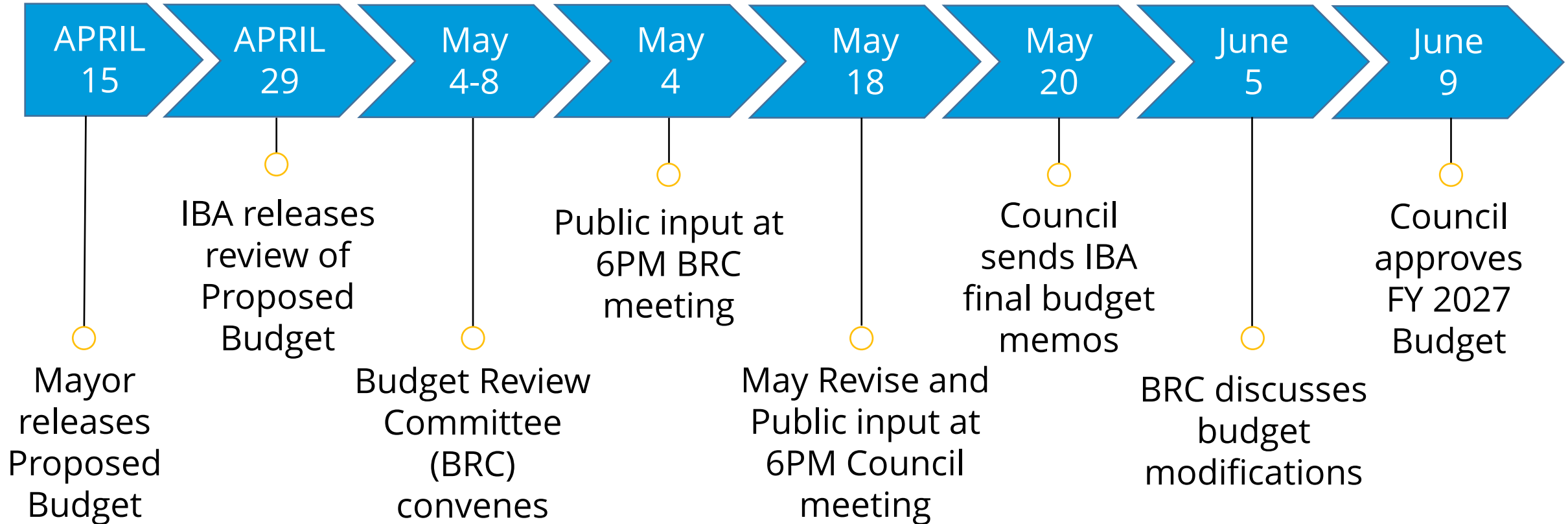


- Street Resurfacing (\$5.2M)
- Utility Undergrounding (\$4.2M)
- College-Meridian to Judy McCarty Sidewalk (\$4.0M)
- Sidewalk Replacements (\$2.6M)
- Oak Park Library (\$1.0M)
- Fire Station 51 Facility Improvements (\$500K)
- Streamview Drive Green Infrastructure (\$450K)

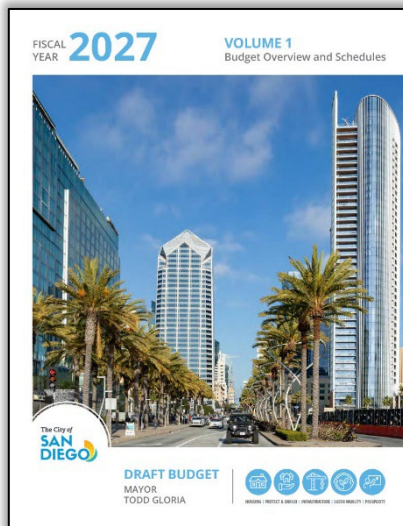

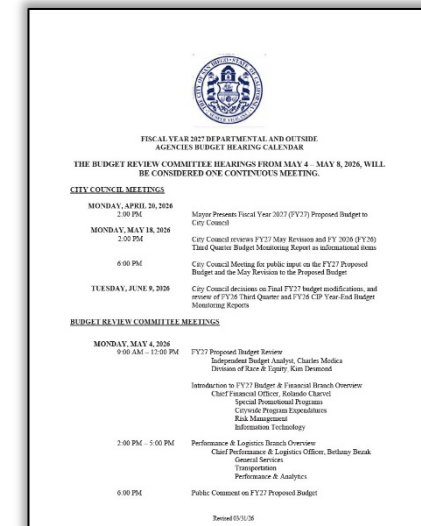
