FORMAL OBJECTION TO CABARET LICENSE APPLICATION

Project No. PRJ-1139084

I submit this written objection to the proposed cabaret license associated with Project No. PRJ-1139084. I live at Village Walk Condominiums, directly across the street from the proposed establishment. I respectfully ask the City to deny the application.

Little Italy has many successful restaurants that serve food and beverages while remaining compatible with the surrounding residential community. A cabaret license would authorize a materially different use: late-night amplified music, dancing, and club-style activity. This location is within a neighborhood where people live, dine, entertain guests, and expect the reasonable quiet enjoyment of their homes. It is not situated in a downtown entertainment district designed to absorb nightclub operations.

The prior operation at this location, Fishers, demonstrated the nuisance conditions that can arise even without expanded cabaret privileges. Recorded music on the outdoor terrace was repeatedly played at a volume loud enough to penetrate neighboring concrete-and-glass residences. It interfered with ordinary evening life at the precise hours when residents were attempting to relax, watch television, listen to music, share meals with friends and family, or sleep. Based on that firsthand history, nearby residents have no reasonable assurance that more extensive entertainment privileges would be managed responsibly.

The previous operation also generated recurring disturbances outside the premises. Residents observed public urination in nearby landscaping and against walls adjacent to the venue. Late-night crowds brought shouting, loitering, rideshare congestion, smoking, and other disorder immediately outside residential buildings. People also congregated near our entrances, solicited money, and sometimes remained overnight on doorsteps. These concerns are based on conditions residents actually experienced, not on speculation about what might occur.

Granting a cabaret license would foreseeably intensify those conditions by extending operating hours and drawing patrons specifically for music, dancing, and nightlife. Even when amplified entertainment takes place indoors, the resulting crowd noise and activity do not remain inside the premises. They spill onto the sidewalk, surrounding streets, residential entrances, and adjacent property after closing.

The resulting burden falls on the people who live here. Persistent bass, crowd noise, public disorder, and late-night congregation interfere with residents' peaceful enjoyment of their homes. They also make neighboring residences less desirable to prospective owners and tenants. A condominium directly across from a late-night cabaret or club venue is materially less attractive than one located near ordinary restaurants operating at responsible noise levels. The likely adverse effect on residential desirability and property values is therefore a serious and legitimate concern for the owners in our building.

This is not an objection to restaurant use, responsible hospitality businesses, or the commercial vitality of Little Italy. It is an objection to converting this particular location into a late-night entertainment venue whose operation is incompatible with its immediate residential surroundings. The prior history at the site provides the City with concrete evidence of the risks.

For these reasons, I respectfully request that the City deny the cabaret license application associated with Project No. PRJ-1139084.
