TO THE HEALTH AND MORALS COMMITTEE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Gentlemen:-

We wish to protest against the granting of a license to the Andersons at 2nd. and H. Sts. for the reason that three of the endorsers of the application seem to us to be disqualified for signing, as follows:

While C.S.Hardy has a stable and blacksmith shop nearby, we understand they are in connection with his private business. He is not running a livery+stable nor doing custom work as a blacksmith and so is not qualified to sign the application.

Ed Cromley, or Crowley works for Mr.Hardy in the stables above referred to, so we are informed. Surely a common laborer is not "doing business" in the meaning of the ordinance.

G. Anderson resides and does business at or near the corner of B. and State Sts., ten blocks distant.

We, therefore, ask you to recommend that the license be refused because the application does not meet the conditions of the ordinance.
