POLICY AND FUNDING COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

Recommend that the City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture (Commission) recommend to staff to proceed with the Pilot Cycle of the Impact Funding Category.

BACKGROUND

In July 2021 City Council unanimously adopted changes to Council Policy 100-03, which allowed for the creation of two new grant categories: Individual Artist and Impact.

The City Council adopted FY24/25 budget includes \$500,000 for an Impact category pilot program – a new funding opportunity for arts/culture organizations and artists doing work based in, reflective of, and relevant to San Diego-designated Communities of Concern or San Diego Promise Zone.

Applications and guidelines will be available this October. For Impact's inaugural cycle, the City will award up to 10 collaborations with phased funding of approximately \$100,000. Applicants should demonstrate a commitment and capacity to work with a community(ies) to innovate in one or more of the three focus areas:

- Arts + Heritage: Your project works to sustain and innovate living traditional or folk-art practices and cultural knowledge to ensure they remain vibrant and visible parts of community life
- Arts + Sustainability: Your project promotes courageous experimentation while contributing to the sustainability of the arts sector by proposing new ways of working, new outcomes for communities, and supportive outcomes for artists (i.e., financial, beyond financial)
- Arts + Just City: Your project builds innovative arts or cultural pathways toward a more just city, with focus on local expertise and testing new ideas to address local community opportunities or challenges

In the Fiscal Years 2024–2025 (January 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025), the City, through Impact, will support organizations and artists working with communities to help turn new ideas into impacts. Impact also includes peer learning support and professional development opportunities. Impact pilot cycle doesn't support: creative artistic works with the principal purpose of putting them before an audience; permanent and temporary public art projects, or training activities with sole purpose of helping individuals develop artistic skills.

Funded collaborations are expected to produce a project that inspires others locally, regionally, nationally, and bi-national region. An important outcome of Impact is that learnings and results can be shared with the communities centered in the project as well as with the arts, cultural, and creative sectors. Funding recipients will be expected to document and share appropriate learnings and results with the City.

NEXT STEPS

Following Policy & Funding Committee's recommendation, the Commission will vote to recommend to

proceed with the Pilot Cycle of the Impact Funding Category. Guidelines and applications will then be available to the community in October.

PUBLIC ART COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend the following panelists for the San Carlos Branch Library Public Art Project: 1) Francisco Eme, with Eun Jung Park as an alternate; and 2) Amy Sanchez Arteaga for the seat of the Visual Art/Design Professional with recommended alternates, in no particular order, to serve as two of the five ad hoc artist selection panelists.

SUMMARY:

City of San Diego (City) staff will administer the artist selection process related to the upcoming public art project for the San Carlos Branch Library. The artist selected for the project through the competitive process will work with the City and the design team to create a permanent, site-specific artwork for the new Library. Artwork can be incorporated into the construction project in many ways and there are a variety of possible approaches to art-making. The anticipated artist budget for the public art project is approximately \$380,000. The public art project is funded by the City as set forth in City Council Policy 900-11 - Inclusion of Public Art in Selected Capital Improvements program Projects.

The artist selection panel will be composed of five voting members: one member of the Commission's Public Art Committee, a visual art/design professional, a community member, a client department representative and the City's design consultant. City staff members will attend the panel meetings as non-voting advisors. The Public Art Committee is authorized to make recommendations for the appointment of two of the five panel seats for the public art project. On July 20, 2023, the Public Art Committee voted (6,0,1) to recommend Francisco Eme for the seat of the Public Art Committee Member, with Eun Jung Park as an alternate, and Amy Sanchez Arteaga for the seat of the visual art/design professional with recommended alternates, in no particular order, to serve as two of the five ad hoc artist ad hoc artist selection panelists.

Panel Seat 2

Amy Sanchez Arteaga, artist, writer, and educator

Amy Sanchez Arteaga is an artist, educator, and writer based in San Diego and Tijuana. She is currently a lecturer in Art History at San Diego State University and writes about living as a transborder subject between the Californias. Since 2010 she has collaborated with Misael Diaz as Cognate Collective, a binational research and art collective that explores how cultural and economic exchange between transnational communities can be mobilized to build networks of solidarity that defy solidifying (geo)political boundaries. Cognate Collective has exhibited broadly nationally and internationally, including Organ Kritischer Kunst in Berlin, Germany, FLACSO Arte Actual in Quito, Ecuador, The Mexicali Biennial, and at the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego. Amy holds an MFA in Art from UC Irvine with an emphasis in Critical and Curatorial Studies.
