23		Complaint") brought by Petitioner against
24	Respondents. In accordance with SDMC section 26.0437, the ALJ issued a Proposed	
25	Administrative Enforcement Order ("Proposed	Order") dated March 15, 2016. The Proposed
26	Order was received by the Ethics Commission	n's Executive Director on March 17, 2016, and
27	emailed to Respondents on March 24, 2016. Thereafter, in accordance with SDMC section	
28	26.0437 (e), on April 7, 2016, Petitioner and Respondents each submitted a brief in response to	
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1 the Proposed Order. In accordance with SDMC sections 26.0437 and 26.0438, the Ethics 2 Commission deliberated in open session on April 14, 2016.

3 The Administrative Complaint alleges that Respondents Advantage Towing Company, 4 Inc. ("Advantage Towing") and Ayman Arekat (hereinafter collectively referred to as 5 "Respondents") violated the Election Campaign Control Ordinance ("ECCO") in connection with contributions made to three candidates in the 2012 Mayoral election. After deliberating 6 7 pursuant to SDMC section 26.0438 with regard to each violation alleged by Petitioner in the 8 Administrative Complaint, and based on findings of fact, conclusions of law, and the entire 9 record of the proceedings, the Ethics Commission found by the concurring votes of at least four (4) Commissioners as set forth in the Ethics Commission Resolution dated April 14, 2016, that 10 Petitioner established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondents violated ECCO as 11 set forth below. 12

Further, for each finding of a violation of ECCO, the Ethics Commission voted on the 13 penalty to be imposed in consideration of all of the relevant circumstances, including, but not 14 limited to: (1) the severity of the violation; (2) the presence or absence of any intention to 15 conceal, deceive, or mislead; (3) whether the violation was deliberate, negligent, or inadvertent; 16 (4) whether the Respondents demonstrated good faith by consulting the Commission staff for 17 written advice that does not constitute a complete defense; (5) whether the violation was an 18 isolated incident or part of a pattern, and whether the violator has a prior record of violations of 19 governmental ethics laws; (6) the existence of any mitigating information; and (7) the degree to 20 which the Respondents cooperated with Commission staff by providing full disclosure, 21 remedying a violation, or assisting with the investigation. SDMC §26.0438(f). Based on the 22 concurring votes of at least five (5) Commissioners as set forth in the Ethics Commission 23 Resolution dated April 14, 2016, the Ethics Commission imposed on Respondents the penalties 24 set forth below for their violations of ECCO. 25

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Counts 1 through 15 - Violations of SDMC section 27.2943

SDMC section 27.2943 prohibits any person from making a contribution in the name

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of another person, a practice commonly known as "campaign money laundering." 28

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Respondents violated SDMC section 27.2943 by making six (6) campaign
 contributions of \$500 each in December of 2011 to the Fletcher for Mayor 2012 committee
 ("Fletcher Mayoral Committee") in the names of the following Advantage Towing employees
 while concealing Advantage Towing as the true source of the contributions:

Respondents also violated SDMC section 27.2943 by making eight (8) campaign
contributions of \$500 each between January and March of 2012 in the names of the following
Advantage employees and their spouses to the Bonnie Dumanis for Mayor 2012 committee
("Dumanis Mayoral Committee"), while concealing Advantage Towing as the true source of
the contributions:

5	Counts 16 through 30 - Violations of SDMC section 27.2950		
6	SDMC section 27.2950 prohibits contributions from organizations (other than political		
7	parties).		
8	Respondents violated SDMC section 27.2950 by making fifteen (15) campaign		
9	contributions from an organization (Advantage Towing) to a City candidate, as described		
10	above in Counts 1 through 15.		
11	Counts 31 and 32 - Violation of SDMC section 27.2935		
12	SDMC section 27.2935 imposes a limit on the amount that any individual may		
13	contribute for any single election for the office for Mayor.		
14	Respondents violated SDMC section 27.2935 by making six (6) contributions totaling		
15	\$3,000 to the Fletcher Mayoral Committee, an amount far in excess of the \$500 contribution		
16	limit in effect at the time.		
17	Respondents also violated SDMC section 27.2935 by making eight (8) contributions		
18	totaling \$4,000 to the Dumanis Mayoral Committee, an amount far in excess of the \$500		
19	contribution limit in effect at the time.		
20	Based on the findings set forth above and pursuant to SDMC section 26.0439, the Ethics		
21	Commission orders that:		
22	(1) Respondents pay a monetary penalty in the amount of \$128,000 (equivalent to		
23	\$4,000 per violation) to the General Fund of the City of San Diego in accordance		
24	with the provisions of SDMC sections 26.0439(b)(3) and 26.0440 within 12		
25	months of the date this Order is served on Respondents;		
26	(2) Respondents cease and desist from violating the laws regulating to campaign		
27	contributions, specifically San Diego Municipal Code sections 27.2935, 27.2943		
28	and 27.2950; and		
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1	(3) This Administrative Enforcement Order constitutes a public reprimand against	
2	Respondents.
