Rent and Utility Assistance Application Open

City of San Diego residents can currently apply for COVID-19 rental and utility assistance through the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) Housing Stability Assistance Program.

ORANGE You Glad to Enter the Orange Tier?

On April 7, San Diego County moved into the Orange Tier of the State's COVID-19 prevention framework, further easing restrictions and allowing more indoor activities.

Here are some of the activities now allowed under the Orange Tier:

- Restaurants: Indoor seating increases to 50% capacity or 200 people maximum with the 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. curfew ending.
- Gyms and Fitness Centers: 25% capacity indoors; indoor pools can open.
- Wineries and Breweries: 25% or 100 people indoors maximum.
- Movie Theaters: 50% or 200 people maximum.
- Museums, Zoos and Aquariums: 50% capacity for indoor activities.
- Places of Worship: 50% capacity indoor activities.
- Bars with no food service: Open outdoors with modifications.
- · All retail: No capacity limits.

Envisioning a California Post Color-Coded COVID Tiers

On June 15, California will fully open its economy if two criteria are met:

- Vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians 16 years and older who wish to be inoculated; and,
- Hospitalization rates are stable and low.

Everyday activities will be allowed and businesses can open with common-sense risk reduction measures such as continued vaccination efforts, mask mandates, and contact tracing and testing.

The State will monitor hospitalization rates, vaccine access, and vaccine efficacy against variants with the option to revisit the June 15 date if needed. The entire state will move into this new phase as a whole.

News from City Hall

Short-Term Vacation Rental Ordinance Signed into Law

The Short-Term Vacation Rental Ordinance approved by City Council was signed into law by Mayor Gloria today, April 14, 2021. The City will take a year to fashion the administrative regulations which implement the ordinance, and this is where the rubber meets the road.

I was proud to be the singular vote in opposition as the Council did not accept my common sense amendments to include limited-term licenses, lock number of whole-home rentals (Tier 3), platform accountability and enforcement, and an affordable housing preservation fee. My years long fight on STVRs will now pivot to ensuring that every promise offered by the city, platforms, and hosts is delivered.

<u>City of San Diego Announces Public Safety Priorities,</u> Reforms to Police Practices

Public safety reform is a priority - everyone deserves to feel safe in their own neighborhood.

On April 9, Mayor Gloria announced a <u>package of policy priorities and procedure reforms</u> aimed at addressing disparities in policing through increased accountability to the community, transparency in decision-making and a commitment to explore solutions to complex issues.

Some of these policies included:

- Appropriately funding, and faithfully implementing, the independent Commission on Police Practices;
- Eliminating existing civil gang injunctions Implementing controls for the procurement and use of military-grade weapons;
- Strengthening additional "unconscious" or "implicit bias" training for all officers;
- Reviewing police hiring practices to ensure we attract the best candidates;
- Adopting and implementing the Surveillance and Privacy Advisory Board ordinances;

- Removing the Office of Homeland Security as a program of the San Diego Police Department;
- Exploring policies that would limit the use of pretextual stops and consent searches;
- Exploring alternatives to arrest for low-level offenses with nonpolice responses;
- Exploring options that would limit the use of tear gas and other specialty munitions;
- Reviewing the types and categories of calls dispatched to the San Diego Police Department.

Get It Done with the Improved Get It Done App

Want the City to fill a pothole? Repair a streetlight? Report an encampment? Do so with ease on the updated <u>Get It Done app.</u>

Rolled out on March 30, users now have access to:

- Spanish Language Support If a customer's mobile device is set to Spanish, the
 new mobile app will automatically display in Spanish. Translation links are available
 on all automatic email responses from the City to our customers. Reports
 submitted in Spanish will be automatically translated by an electronic translation
 service to help internal staff interpret details of the report;
- New Home Screen The new home screen features a sleek design with more
 user-friendly options and displays articles with City news and information. For firsttime app users, new onboarding screens will appear to help walk customers
 through the reporting process;
- Enhanced Category Selection Based on customer-provided descriptions and photos, the app will suggest the appropriate category for a new report. More accurate category tags will ensure the right team receives the report and help the City resolve issues more quickly;

- Uploading Multiple Photos The enhanced app will allow customers to upload
 multiple photos. The previous app version limited uploads to one photo. This will
 help field crews to better understand the problem reported;
- Confirmation Page This update includes a new confirmation page for users to review the details of a report before submitting. The page gives users a chance to modify any components of their report prior to sending it to the City. Users will continue to receive confirmation and status update emails after reports are submitted:
- **Submitted Reports** Enhanced mapping means that customers will be able to view more reports from around their neighborhood.

District 1 Gets it Done!

This past month, the District 1 community reps have been busy meeting with residents to learn about local improvements, and working with staff to complete those requests. Here are some constituent 'wins' from two of our District 1 communities – University City (UC) and Carmel Valley (CV) – this past month.

Thank you to Kaitlyn and Ricky, the UC and CV representatives respectfully, for working diligently on these requests, and for our residents for alerting us to their community experience.

University City (UC)

- Removed Tree Encroachment from Private Property After receiving an email from a constituent, Kaitlyn visited the property and assessed that there was vegetation encroachment. She then worked with the City's Ground Maintenance Worker to arrange for a trim, and the City's Tree Crew to provide additional maintenance.
- Improved Bike Safety and Painted a New Red Curb Along Regents Rd.
 Upon hearing of a dangerous road situation along Regents Road going south from UCSD, Kaitlyn worked with staff to add a new red curb to the road. This new curb prevents parking along that area, widening the available mobile area, and alleviating some space between cars and bikes along the heavily-trafficked path.



Carmel Valley (CV)

• **Vegetation Abatement** – In less than a week after filing a Get It Done report on behalf of a resident, Ricky was able to work with City staff to get overgrown vegetation removed from a fire path behind a local residence.
