POLICY CORNER

The month of May is when the San Diego City Council meets in formal session as the Budget Review Committee. Mayor Todd Gloria presented his proposed FY2024 Budget to the Council on April 24th. The City of San Diego's Budget Review Committee met, and the public was invited to share their priorities for the FY24 Budget. Mayor Gloria's May Revision for the FY24 Budget was presented on May 18th. The City Council's revised budget memos were submitted to the Office of the Independent Budget Analyst (IBA) on May 26th. The revisions will reflect the priorities and needs of the communities. The IBA will issue his review of the modifications on June 7th, the Council will vote on June 12th, and Mayor Gloria will sign the FY24 Budget by June 30th, 2023.

A Few Highlights from the May Council Meetings:

- The City Council voted to direct the City Attorney's office to pursue a lawsuit against SeaWorld San Diego for back rent which they have refused to pay for the past year and a half. The theme park owes the City of San Diego about \$12 million in back rent and fees that were not paid during the COVID-19 emergency. The City had provided special arrangements for all the Mission Bay area leaseholders during the emergency, and everyone paid their rent except SeaWorld.
- On May 15, the Council voted to approve the continuation of the \$38.00 Sidewalk Vending Ordinance Permit Fee. The low fee, significantly lower than neighboring jurisdictions, will allow San Diego Street vendors to continue their small businesses while entering the City's formal economy and following the health and safety regulations the Council and

California Coastal Commission approved last year.

 On May 23, the Council voted to align the City's "Spaces as Places" ordinance with changes directed by the California Coastal Commission to ensure outdoor dining businesses in the beach communities obtain permits and secure additional parking spaces to replace any they may have used to extend their outdoor dining. Let us always remember our responsibility as Americans to stand up for the rights of all our citizens and that our nation is stronger because of our diversity.

DISTRICT 2 COMMUNITY CLEANUP

Thank you to the City's Environmental Services Department for working hard to keep San Diego clean through the Community Cleanup this past March. Community Cleanups are designed to help San Diegans properly dispose of bulky items that are not permitted in the City's curbside refuse collections. More than 50 events are held annually throughout the City to serve as many residents as possible. The events collect tons of trash, preventing recyclables from going into the landfill, and discarded items from being illegally dumped on streets and alleyways. Here is the breakdown for clean-ups done within the District 2 communities:

District 2 Communities breakdown:

- · Bay Park Disposal: Total Tonnage: 6.02
- · Loma Portal Disposal: Total Tonnage: 6.93
- · Clairemont Disposal: Total Tonnage: 26.61
- · Ocean Beach Disposal: Total Tonnage: 3.75
- · Mission Beach Disposal: Total Tonnage: 2.91

Summer typically attracts large crowds to San Diego's popular beach areas. To keep Mission Bay and Mission Beach clean, additional street sweeping in the alleyways will help prevent pollution from reaching the ocean. The twice-aweek trash pick-up and sweeping schedule will reduce the nuisance of insects during the summer months and improve the community's vector control efforts. The new summer street sweeping schedule started May 24th and will run through September; the additional sweeping will happen every Wednesday.
