Seniors access social-service case management; dental, mental-health, healthcare and legal services; and care management with health issues, homeless services, and affordable permanent housing (Potiker Family Senior Residence and Potiker City Heights). Nearly 600,000 meals are served each year. Its mission: "Helping seniors in poverty live healthy and fulfilling lives."

Kitchen backsplashes and fire-safety improvements were made to Potiker City Heights, where seniors reside in 150 affordable studios and one-bedroom apartments. Each unit (350-500 square feet) has a full kitchen, central air and heating and secure underground parking.

To prepare and inspire youth for the future of innovation, the Valencia Park/Malcolm X Library offers programming and resources that emphasize the STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) curriculum in a safe, modern place for local students to gather, learn and explore.

Enhancing the library's curb appeal and safety, Phase 1 of the project involved exterior painting and the addition of upgraded security cameras. Phase 2 created the state-of-the-art Legler Benbough Teen IDEA Lab, a multimedia center equipped with 3D printers, a laser printer and a vinyl cutter; a sound-recording studio; an interactive video wall; a video gaming center with Xbox and PlayStation; and more than 30 computers, including iMacs.

The Legler Benbough Teen IDEA Lab at the Valencia Park/Malcolm X/Library held its grand opening in January 2017, welcoming the youth of the Diamond neighborhood -- a low- to moderate-income community -- through its doors.
