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Homelessness Action Week Marks Progress

The San Diego City Council proclaimed January 25-30, 2016 Homelessness Action Week. Councilmember Todd Gloria presented at the City Council meeting to Dolores Diaz from the Regional Task Force on the Homeless and Rick Gentry from the San Diego Housing Commission, who accepted the recognition and shared brief remarks.

Councilmember Gloria, who chairs the Regional Continuum of Care Council, brought forward the proclamation to bring attention to the ongoing countywide collaborative efforts to address homelessness, and to highlight two critical annual events that were scheduled for the last week of January.

Project Homeless Connect took place Wednesday, January 27 and provided a number of services at Golden Hall to approximately 1,215 homeless San Diegans. WeALLCount, the annual Point in Time Count of homeless individuals in the region mandated by the federal government for funding eligibility, took place at 4:00 a.m. on Friday, January 29. Councilmember Gloria joined more than 1,700 volunteers to survey the homeless population in various communities throughout the County.

"The Point in Time Count is perhaps the most critical component on the path to ending homelessness: being aware of the scope of our homelessness problem here in San Diego and learning what challenges these individuals face," said Councilmember Gloria. "Results translate into millions of dollars in federal

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Be Prepared for the Next Storm

After a few showers that were forecast to be far worse, San Diego finally saw in January what El Nino can bring: strong and prolonged rains, winds, and floods.

As a region known for its nice weather, San Diego got a wake up call from those major storms. Before any more hit, take the time and prepare.

Protect your property from flooding with sandbags. Unfilled sandbags (limit 10) are available at local fire stations. Please note: sand may not be removed from local beaches to fill the bags. Call 619-235-1000 or submit an online form at sandiego.gov/el-nino to report blocked storm drains.

When trash and debris clog the storm drains, rainwater and run off have no place to go, and flash floods can occur. Prior to the initial El Nino storm earlier this year, City staff cleaned out flood channels and storm drains, which prevented damage from being worse in many locations.

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SANDAG Calling for Input on Community Priorities

The 18 cities in the region and the County – working together as the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) – are considering placing a measure on the November ballot to fund infrastructure throughout the region by raising the regional sales tax by up to one-half cent. SANDAG is gathering ideas from the public on what should be included in the measure if one does get placed on the ballot.

SANDAG has been doing these types of projects and programs for decades. Since 1988, SANDAG has administered TransNet, the voter-approved half-cent sales tax for transportation. These funds have supported completion of more than 650 highway, transit, bike and pedestrian, habitat conservation, local street repair, and grant projects and programs that have kept San Diego moving forward. TransNet also provides direct funding for local communities, including ours, to help pay for important projects and programs, including fixing potholes and building light rail lines and bikeways.

A ballot measure could raise billions of dollars to fund these types of needed improvements throughout the region. You can help SANDAG by sharing your priorities and suggesting new ideas for regional transportation and infrastructure and other important needs at sandag.org/priorities.

Be mindful that 9-1-1 should only be called for an emergency. The City's first responders are especially busy during such difficult storm conditions, so be mindful about where you report your concerns.

Extreme flooding and fallen trees blocking roadways should be reported to the City's emergency dispatch center, 619-527-7500. Gas emergencies and downed electrical lines should be reported to SDG&E, 1 (800) 611-7343 If your property is in a flood zone, have critical items (medications, etc.) ready before a storm hits and leave early if flooding is forecast. If you cannot see the pavement because of pooling water on a road, do not attempt to drive through it.

Stay updated on road closures and flooded areas by following 2-1-1 San Diego on social media, or call 2-1-1 for non-emergency storm assistance options.

With the El Nino winter upon San Diego, the decision has been made to expand the availability of empty sandbags to every fire station and select lifeguard stations. In addition, the Fire-Rescue Department increased its reserve of empty sandbags to restock these facilities.

If you need sandbags to help protect your property from flooding and other storm damage, visit your local fire station. Keep in mind that it is illegal to remove sand from San Diego beaches for this use, so plan to fill them elsewhere.

Strengthening Public Safety

- Maintenance was done to clear the Washington Street channel of all brush and foliage.

funding for local agencies like the City of San Diego and the Regional Continuum of Care Council, who can work to provide targeted services based upon need."

Further, before the City Council meeting, Councilmember Gloria spoke at the County Board of Supervisors meeting and advocated for increased funding for the Behavioral Health Services Division of the Health and Human Services Agency. The County approved an increase of \$5.5 million for homeless outreach, engagement, and treatment.

"The City and County have strengthened our collaborative efforts to address homelessness throughout our region. The additional funding approved by the County today will help connect more homeless individuals to the services they need, and I know our continued partnership will bring more progress in the months and years ahead," said Councilmember Gloria.

Councilmember Todd Gloria applauded the San Diego County Board of Supervisors for taking action to provide intensive services to all severely mentally ill homeless individuals through a new initiative called "Project One for All." The initiative aims to provide intensive wraparound services for homeless individuals with serious mental illness who are eligible for supportive housing.

"The County's commitment is a significant and critical step toward ending homelessness throughout the region," said Councilmember Gloria. "Connecting these individuals to the services they need will improve their lives and give them the greatest opportunity to end the cycle of homelessness that many have endured for decades. The reasons that lead to homelessness are varied, which can make ending it exceptionally difficult. Combined with our implementation of Housing First, focusing on the needs of individual populations as the County is doing with the severely mentally ill and as the Mayor and I am doing with veterans, will make a tremendous difference for the individuals directly impacted and for the region as a whole."
