We celebrated a milestone in affordable housing in January. Benson Place, formerly EZ-8 Motel in the Otay Mesa-Nestor community, will provide 82 permanent supportive housing units for individuals experiencing chronic homelessness and individuals with disabilities who experience homelessness.

I commend Father Joe's Villages, the San Diego Housing Commission, and Chelsea Investment Corporation for their continued advocacy which made this project possible. We welcome this much needed project to District 8!

BUDGET PRIORITY MEMO



On January 10, 2020, I issued a memo detailing my Budget Priorities for the Fiscal Year 2021 City Budget. This is the first step in the development of the Mayor's Budget Proposal that will be released in April.

FUNDING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING



My priorities include:

- 15 new District 8 infrastructure projects, such as parks and facility upgrades.

- Road improvements, including the expansion of La Media Road in Otay Mesa.

- Enhanced City services such as library programming and recreation center activities.

Increased public safety and code enforcement staffing.

- Ensuring the City stays on track to meet its goals laid out in the Climate Action Plan.

- Repurposing of the old San Ysidro Library facility into a teen center.

Project Description: The project, located at Bever Boulevard and Enright Drive, consists of t Project Description: The project, located at Beyer Boulevard and Enright Drive, consists of design and construction of Beyer Park and is working towards approval of the General Development Plan with a target of going to the Park and Rec Board for approval in Fall 2019. The project is currently in the environmental review process and are working with the Development Pervices Department towards preparation a draft CEQA document. The design phase will be completed in Fall 2020. Construction could begin in Fall 2020 if funding is cated in FY21. Full construction of the project requires \$17 millio

Last week, as a member of the City Council's Environment Committee, I voted in favor of declaring a climate emergency in the City of San Diego.

Sending a strong and consistent message to the public that the City is 100% committed to fighting climate change through implementing our Climate Action Plan is very important. It is our responsibility to do all we can to reverse course on the atmospheric warming which will intensify drought, wildfires, and sea level rise. I wholeheartedly supported this resolution and look forward to it coming before the Council.

On January 14, 2020, the City Council began the process of including a housing bond measure for the 2020 November ballot. The measure is not finalized and further discussion will occur, but the intent is to secure significant funding through a general obligation bond, that will go directly towards affordable and permanent housing in the City of San Diego.

It is important that we have local funding sources available for affordable housing projects, because it allows projects in the City to be more competitive to receive State and Federal funding. I look forward to seeing the full and final measure before the City Council later this year.

HISTORIC VILLA MONTEZUMA



Mr. Shepard was born in England but raised in Illinois. The High Brothers, prominent San Diego businessmen and Spiritualists, convinced the famous world-traveling musician Mr. Shepard to relocate to San Diego by sponsoring not just a home but a "Palace of the Arts" that he would design with the best architects of the day.

Mr. Shepard was an interesting character: a virtuoso musician and later a prolific writer, he believed that the spirits of classical composers could communicate to him when he sat at the piano which he would channel for his close friends.



The Villa Montezuma is a Victorian Queen Anne mansion build in 1887 by the famous pianist, Spiritualist, and writer Jesse Shepard (also known by his pen name, "Francis Grierson"). Located in the Sherman Heights Historic District at the corner of 20th and K Streets, the Villa is known for its magnificent Victorian architecture with its romantic colors, unique turrets, rooftop gargoyles, and fish-scale shingles. This iconic home has been part of the San Diego community for over a century, and it has a rich and interesting history.



For two years Mr. Shepard performed concerts and sang with the major churches in San Diego. After the Victorian boom went bust in 1889, he decided to professionally pursue writing as a career. Mr. Shepard sold Villa Montezuma in 1889 and moved to Paris to publish his first book.

After the sale, the beautiful Villa went through the hands of a number of different owners including a Mr. Edward Campbell, who was convinced that Mr. Shepard had buried treasure in the house (Campbell failed to find any treasure). In 1969, members of the San Diego Historical Society purchased the Villa Montezuma with the intent of turning it into a museum. The purchase price: \$25,000! The Historical Society recruited Councilmember Leon Williams, who agreed that our district needed this extraordinary site as a museum.

The City bought the Villa Montezuma and the San Diego Historical Society undertook a complete restoration. In 1970, the Villa became a City of San Diego Historical Site, in 1971 it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and in 1972 the Villa Montezuma Museum opened to the public.



In 2015, the City-owned Villa Montezuma Museum was again available to the public, with tours given by the FOVN four times a year. However, renovations for this treasured palace are still necessary.

In December, Mayor Kevin Faulconer and I received a tour guided by FOVM Chair, Louise Torio. Together we will work towards securing additional funding for the needed repairs.

For 34 years the Friends of the Villa Montezuma provided tours and educational programs in art, music, and literature at the museum. One challenge came in 1986 when a fire burned through the second floor, prompting emergency renovations to prepare the Villa for its 100th anniversary in 1987. In 2006, during the "Great Recession," the Historical Society closed the museum. The Friends of the Villa Montezuma (FOVM) became their own nonprofit organization and successfully worked with the City for grant opportunities to make essential repairs.



TIJUANA RIVER VALLEY COMMUNITY GARDEN

SHERMAN HEIGHTS COMMUNITY CENTER

Late last year, I toured the Tijuana River Valley Community Garden and the adjacent Wild Willow Farm and Education Center. This is the largest community garden in San Diego County and is managed by the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County.

The garden features 210 garden plots, seven quarter-acre plots for education and demonstration, a native pollinator hedgerow, and a diversity of wildlife. It is open to the public from dusk to dawn and surrounded by a multiple walking trails.

the Pacific Flyway at the park's BIRD AND BUTTERLY GARDEN.

The adjacent Wild Willow Farm and Education Center provides opportunities for students of all ages to learn about farming in a way that respects people, wildlife, and the planet. Students are invited to participate through their field trip program, while workshops and courses are available for anyone who wants to learn practices that grow soil, food, and community.

The garden and education center is located at the corner of Hollister Street and Sunset Avenue in the southernmost portion of San Diego. More information can be found here: https://rcdsandiego.org/programs/community-garden/
