IN THE COMMUNITY



On July 1, I attended the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signing ceremony between the United States and Mexico for the new Otay Mesa East Port of Entry scheduled to open in 2024.

The MOU is an agreement to ensure the completion of the state-of-the-art border crossing in Otay Mesa, that will connect directly to State Route 11 and have a 20-minute average border crossing time. The project is currently in phase 2 which includes the construction of a four-lane highway from Enrico Fermi Drive to the location of the new Port of Entry.



During the months of April & May, my office helped host several vaccination events throughout District 8, including at San Ysidro Middle School.

I would like to thank each and every volunteer for committing your time to this effort. These events were hosted in partnership with Family Health Centers of San Diego, San Ysidro Health, Latino Equity Council, Generosity Water, Urban Plates and local school districts.

FISCAL YEAR 2022



On June 14, 2021, the City Council unanimously approved the City of San Diego's budget for Fiscal Year 2022 (July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022). During my over 10 years working for the City, I can say with certainty that this is the best budget for District 8. We have included some highlights on the next few pages.

BOSTON AVENUE LINEAR PARK

The FY22 budget included a \$500,000 funding allocation for the creation of the Boston Avenue Linear Park Project. These resources will allow the City's Parks and Recreation Department to move forward with the design phase and finalize a General Development Plan for the park.

My advocacy for this project is based on the community's vision to create a vibrant, half-mile long linear park between the 2900 and 3200 blocks of Boston Avenue in Barrio Logan's residential zone.



BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

BARRIO LOGAN TRUCK ROUTE



\$100,000 was allocated to install street-calming infrastructure on Beardsley Street, from Logan Avenue to Harbor Drive, and on Boston Avenue, from 28th Street to 32nd Street.

This project will help divert toxic air away from Barrio Logan and increase enforcement of the Barrio Logan Truck Route, which has been a priority for the community and my office.

UNIMPROVED STREETS FUNDING

In February, my unimproved streets ordinance was unanimously approved by the City Council. The City of San Diego currently has over 60 miles of unimproved dirt streets and alleys with a vast majority located in Council Districts 4 & 8, two of the most diverse and low-income districts. This policy change amended an antiquated City law that prevented these dirt streets and alleys from being improved, which is critical in advancing social equity across the City.

With the enactment of my proposal, my office was successful in advocating for \$250,000 that will go directly towards improving South Bancroft Street located in the Stockton community of District 8. This road will now be elevated to City standards.

FISCAL YEAR 2022

TRAFFIC SIGNALS ON 31ST STREET



\$900,000 was allocated to install two traffic signals at the intersection of Market Street & 31st Street, and National Avenue & 31st Street to help improve public safety.

These intersections are frequently used by children attending school at both King Chavez Primary Academy and Rodriguez Elementary which is why my office made these a priority.

UTILITY UNDERGROUNDING

City crews are expected to complete undergrounding of the utility poles and wires on Coronado Avenue, 25th Street, 31st Street and 32nd Street by the end of this calendar year.

In Fiscal Year 2021, over 17 miles of overhead utility lines were relocated to underground and I am excited to see more projects this upcoming year. Each completed undergrounding project helps improve neighborhood safety and aesthetics.



NEW FIRE STATION IN OTAY MESA



I am delighted to announce that the City's FY22 Budget included \$9.5 million of funding to the Otay Mesa Facilities Assessment Fund.

These resources have been allocated to support several projects in the Otay Mesa Community, including a new Fire Station (#49) that will be located at the intersection of Ocean View Hills Parkway and Sea Fire Point in the Ocean View Hills Neighborhood.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

SOUTHWEST PARK



The FY22 Budget includes \$1 million to finalize the design and preparation of construction documents. In February, the City's Parks and Recreation Board approved the General Development Plan for Southwest Park, which will be located at the intersection of Grove Avenue and 25th Street in Otay Mesa.

The proposed design features large turf fields, a children's play area, picnic spaces, basketball court, dog park, drinking fountains and restrooms. HIDDEN TRAILS PARK

Hidden Trails Neighborhood Park will be located east of Parsons Landing and north of Westport View Drive in the Ocean View Hills community in Otay Mesa.

The General Development Plan was approved in January and includes park features such as children's play equipment, half-court basketball, fitness equipment, restrooms and shade structures with picnic tables. The \$480,000 funding allocation included in the FY22 budget will facilitate design completion and the preparation of construction documents.

FISCAL YEAR 2022

BEYER PARK



The General Development Plan for the 8 acre state-of-the-art Beyer Park was approved by the City's Parks and Recreation Board in September 2020. The FY22 budget allocated \$1 million to finalize construction documents for this project. Beyer Park's current design includes large multi-purpose turf fields, a children's play area, dog park, skate park, picnic spaces, walking trails and restrooms.

Total project cost is estimated at \$19.5 million, split into two phases. The City has also applied for Prop 68 statewide grants to finalize construction of Beyer Park. Award announcements are expected this summer.

RIVIERA DEL SOL NEIGHBORHOOD PARK

The Riviera Del Sol Neighborhood Park will be a 4.9-acre park located near Del Sol Boulevard and Riviera Shores Street in Otay Mesa. The General Development Plan was first approved in 2012 but has been on hold since due to lack of funding.

Moving forward with the development of this park has been one of my highest priorities, so I am pleased to see the FY22 Budget includes \$600,000 to proceed with construction. The start date for construction is tentatively scheduled for 2022 with a total cost of \$9.5 million.



BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

CYPRESS DRIVE CULTURAL CORRIDOR



The Cypress Drive Cultural Corridor will be located in the historic center of San Ysidro, spanning through Cypress Drive from West San Ysidro Boulevard to the trolley tracks. The project will feature a safe walkway for community members and visitors with historical and cultural displays along Cypress Drive.

The FY22 Budget includes \$800,000 for this project to move forward with the design phase, and my office is committed to help facilitate that process in tandem with the community.

HOWARD AVE SIDEWALK

Following input from community members in San Ysidro, a new sidewalk will be installed on Howard Avenue, from Iris Avenue to Village Pine Drive. Students attending Nicoloff Elementary use Howard Avenue to walk to and from school, and the new sidewalk will improve public safety.

This project also includes installation of a new retaining wall, curb ramps, traffic signal relocation and other associated improvements for the new sidewalk. The FY22 budget includes \$600,000 for the Howard Avenue sidewalk.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

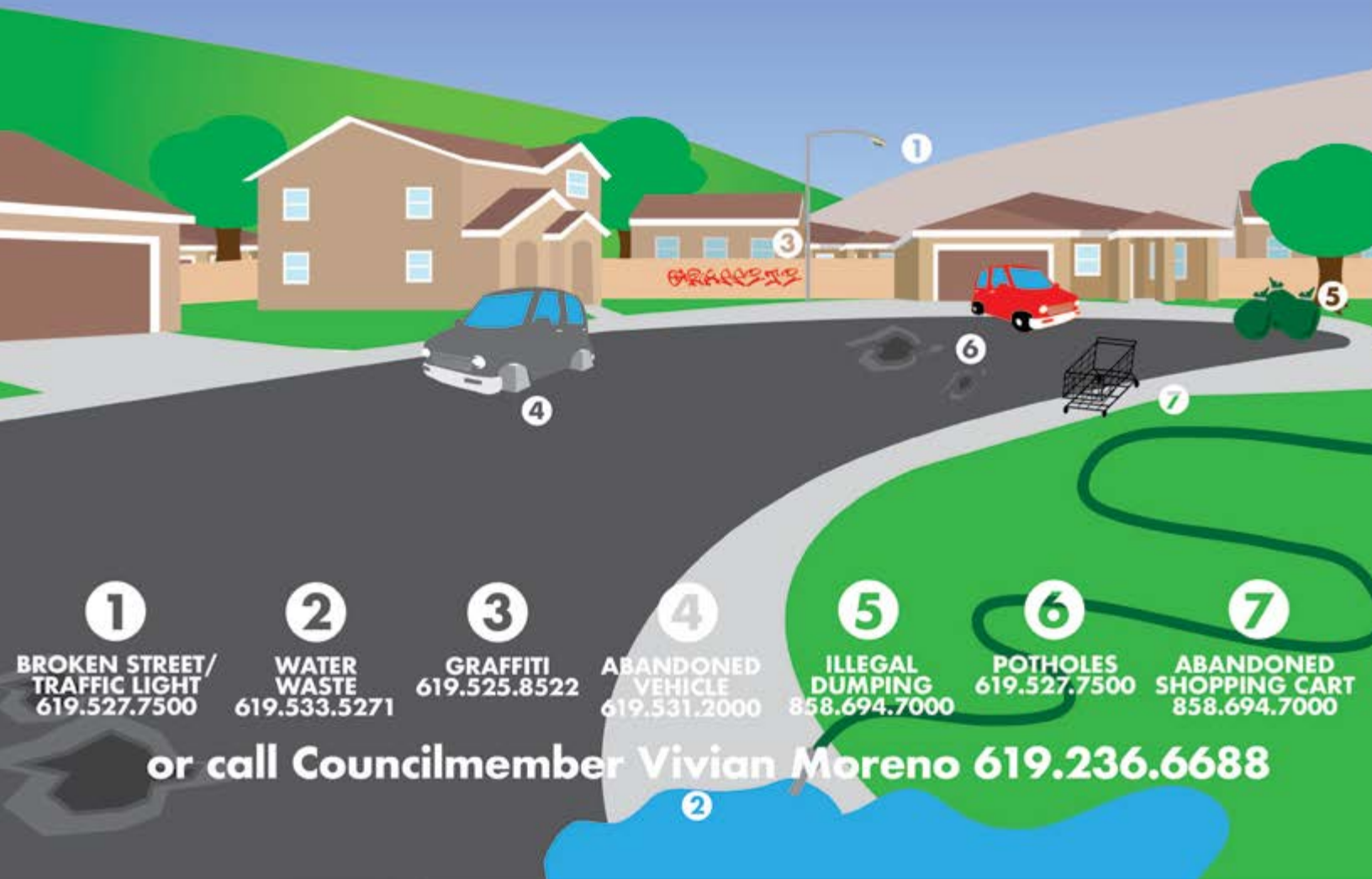
