I am returning herewith application No. 233 signed by Mr. James H. KENNEDY for a dine and dance license at 4693 University Avenue, known as the HACIENDA.

It is our recommendation that this application be denied on the same grounds that previous applications have been denied. I do not feel that the location is desirable for a dine and dance establishment, because of its close proximity to residential area. Our past experience with patrons of this establishment causing disturbances in the neighborhood after they leave the premises, indicates to me that the same condition would exist to a greater degree, due to the fact that a dine and dance license would undoubtedly attract more people who intended to spend a full evening and remain until the establishment closed.

The fact that an arrest was made for violation of existing ordinances at this location after the management and Mr. KENNEDY had been warned about the violation indicates to me that the establishment would then need considerable supervision.
