CONSOLIDATED PLAN ADVISORY BOARD (CPAB) MEETING ACCESS AND PUBLIC COMMENT DURING COVID-19:

Until further notice, meetings of the Consolidated Plan Advisory Board (CPAB) will be conducted pursuant to the provisions of California Government Code section 54953(e), added by Assembly Bill 361, which allows the CPAB to use teleconferencing and to provide the public an opportunity to address the CPAB via a call-in option or an internet-based service option during a proclaimed state of emergency. The San Diego City Council declared an existing proclaimed state of emergency and that their finding applies to all boards, commissions, and committees of the City of San Diego.

During the proclaimed state of emergency related to the COVID-19 pandemic and in the interest of public health and safety, some, if not all, CPAB members may be participating in the CPAB meeting via a virtual teleconference platform.

Members of the public in attendance via internet-service option, using the <u>meeting link</u>, please click the button to raise your hand during the portion of the meeting you wish to comment on to indicate that you would like to speak and staff will prompt you to unmute yourself and enable you to speak. When staff calls your name, please state it for the record, and you will have three minutes (or a time that is allotted by the Chair) to provide comment. You will be placed on mute once your time to comment ends.

Via Call-In Option:

Members of the public in attendance via call-in option and wishing to address the CPAB, press star 9 to raise your hand during the portion of the meeting you wish to comment on to indicate that you would like to speak. Staff will call on you by the last four digits of your phone number. When staff calls on you, press star 6 to unmute yourself and proceed with providing comment during your allotted time.

The CPAB will select a new Vice-Chair for Fiscal Year 2023 (July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023).

b. HOME American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) Allocation Plan

CDD staff will present the draft HOME-ARP Allocation Plan. The City of San Diego was awarded \$20 million through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) HOME Program. To receive the HOME-ARP funds, the City must develop a HOME-ARP Allocation Plan for HUD's approval. The HOME-ARP Allocation Plan includes a summary of the consultation and public participation process, needs assessment, gap analysis, planned activities and housing production/preservation goals. In addition to the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan, the City must also submit a Substantial Amendment to the FY 2022 Annual Action Plan to include the HOME-ARP Allocation Plan.

Public comments regarding the draft HOME-ARP Allocation Plan and the 1st Substantial Amendment to the FY 2022 Annual Action Plan will be received and the Board will be asked to recommend Council approval of both documents.

7. Discussion Item(s):

a. <u>Draft FY 2022 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report</u> (CAPER)

CDD staff will present an informational item regarding the draft FY 2022 CAPER. The CAPER is prepared on an annual basis for submittal to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). It is a requirement of the annual entitlement grant funding for the following federal programs: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME); Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program;



and the CARES Act-related funded (CDBG-CV and ESG-CV). The CAPER provides an assessment of the City's progress toward its 5-year consolidated plan goals and how funds were spent during the FY 2022 (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022) reporting period.

Public comments regarding the draft FY 2022 CAPER will be received and incorporated into the final version of the FY 2022 CAPER prior to submission to HUD.

b. FY 2024 Annual Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) Tentative Timeline

CDD staff will provide a preliminary timeline and update regarding the upcoming FY 2022 CDBG NOFA process.

Background

- Congress appropriated \$5 billion to HOME-ARP
- > Part of American Rescue Plan
- > Administered through HUD's HOME Investment Partnership Program
- > HOME Participating Jurisdiction (PJ) awarded HOME-ARP funding
- > Allocation Plan must be submitted and approved by HUD
- Program expires September 30, 2030

Qualifying Populations (QPs)

 - Other families requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness

 - 1,369 units of supportive housing
 - 181 for rapid re-housing rent assistance and services
 - 44 for low-income housing rental assistance
- > Tenant-Based Rental Assistance
 - 130,094 applicants on the tenant-based rental assistance waiting list
 - Waiting period for assistance approximately 12 years
 - 73,254 applications on the project-based voucher waiting list

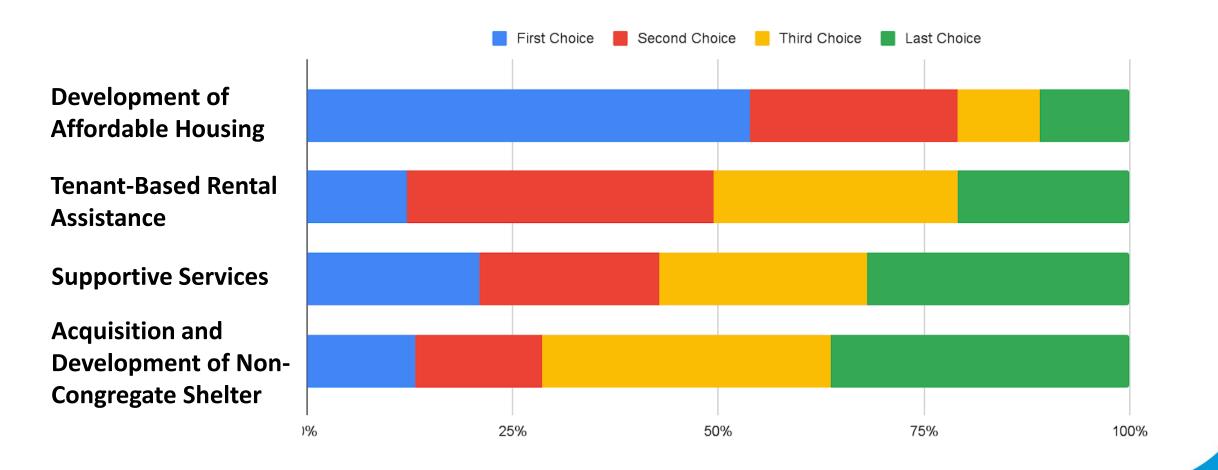

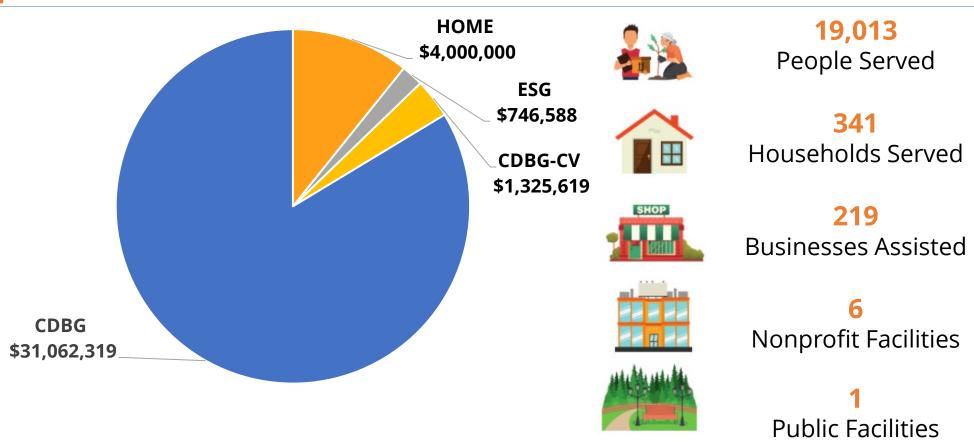
