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San Diego's Year Round Homeless Shelter Opens

When I helped open Connections Housing on March 11, 2013, it was among my proudest days in public service.

Connections Housing, located at 1250 Sixth Avenue, is San Diego's new year round homeless services and housing center designed to reduce homelessness in our Downtown neighborhoods by helping people living on the streets move into permanent housing. Connections Housing provides 223 housing units, a health center, and supportive services all conveniently located in one building.

Connections Housing features the following onsite resources:

- 73 permanent supportive housing apartments, with a community room;
- 150 interim housing beds and food service program;
- · 36 service agencies in the PATH Depot; and a
- · Health center

Connections Housing and PATH are a game changer in how we address homelessness in San

Diego. As positive impacts are seen Downtown, we next must work to replicate successful programs elsewhere in our City and the region to ensure all of our neediest neighbors have the opportunity to break the cycle of homelessness.

As someone with a keen interest in solving homelessness and improving housing opportunities, I believe it's important to understand the terms used in this field.

Permanent supportive housing provides eligible tenants with an affordable studio apartment unit coupled with supportive services. These apartments are subsidized with housing vouchers from the San Diego Housing Commission, with case management provided by PATH San Diego. Living in Connections Housing's permanent apartments will be individuals who are chronically homeless and disabled, prioritizing those who are considered vulnerable on the streets and who are frequent users of public systems, like emergency rooms.

Solving Uptown Parking Challenges with Creativity

Hillcrest and surrounding neighborhoods have plenty to attract residents and visitors: amazing restaurants, fun nightlife, unique shopping, important community centers. The shortage of parking has been a challenge alluding a workable solution for far too long.

The March 14 unveiling of ParkHillcrest.com marked a creative change to the neighborhood's approach to the parking dilemma. Instead of focusing all energy on building a parking garage (elusive due to funding and land needs), the Uptown Community Parking District's ParkHillcrest.com is a multi-faceted, realistic, and workable parking management tool that includes a free trolley service, a list and map of parking options, a validation program with local merchants, and information about bicycle facilities for times when your car isn't necessary.

The Hillcrest Trolley is a free trolley service operating Thursday through Saturday nights from 6:00 p.m. –10:00 p.m. Its route

includes the area roughly bordered by Normal Street, University Avenue, First Avenue, and Washington Street. Council President Gloria participated in the inaugural ride with neighbors, and believes it will help support local businesses by alleviating the parking challenges many consider when choosing a neighborhood to patronize.

Mission Valley. The project also included installation of lighting in the well-traveled corridor.

"Texas Street is a primary link between District Three and Mission Valley, and the new sidewalk and other amenities improve safety and access," said Council President Gloria.

Improvements were also completed in Normal Heights, where the Ward Canyon Park basketball courts were resurfaced. Council President Gloria used savings from his office budget to help pay for the repairs and upgrades.

"District Three suffers from a lack of adequate park space and recreation facilities, so keeping these assets well maintained is critical." said **Council President** Gloria, who demonstrated his athletic prowess by successfully shooting some baskets on the court.



The Latest on Bicycle Improvements

As part of the City of San Diego's ongoing efforts to improve bike-ability of the neighborhoods, the City Council recently approved a resolution declaring the City's support for prioritizing citywide bicycle infrastructure improvements which enhance rider safety, provide transportation options, and benefit the greater public as the region progresses. The resolution also focused on taking steps to reduce bicycle-related collisions on public roadways by exploring all methods, including the recommendations from the 2011 update to the 2002 City of San Diego Bicycle Master Plan, to minimize the public safety risk to bicyclists and drivers.

Further, the Council repealed the bicycle license requirement from the Municipal Code. Bicycle licenses were required in order to ensure that all bicycles had an identification number inscribed upon them. However, since 1977, bicycle manufacturers have been required to provide each bicycle with an identifying serial number. This made the Municipal Code bicycle licensing requirement redundant. Removal of the Municipal Code's bicycle licensing requirement will not affect the mandatory reporting of second-hand bike sales to the police.

Strengthening Public Safety

- A deteriorated sidewalk was patched with asphalt to prevent tripping hazards in the 2000 block of University Avenue.
- The Homeless Outreach Team provided services and cleared an encampment from the 4200 block of Arizona Street.
- A homeless encampment was cleared from the 500 block of Beech Street.
- A trip hazard was repaired on a sidewalk near State Street and Date Street.
- Tree stumps that were impeding the walkway and damaging a sidewalk were ground down for a resident on 34th Street.

Infrastructure Investments

- Construction should soon begin on the Juniper Dip sidewalk project.
- Council District Three staff worked with the Water Department to delay a maintenance shut off from 8:00 p.m.

Interim housing is a 30 to 90 day program, operated by Alpha Project and PATH, that provides temporary beds for people experiencing homelessness while working to connect them with permanent housing. This level of care is prioritized for individuals who are homeless, chronically homeless, and/or deemed vulnerable or at-risk on the streets.

Through integrated street outreach efforts, PATH has provided on-the-street case management to line up more than 300 individuals for housing and services. Additional individuals interested in housing are encouraged to sign up on an interest list located at the Neil Good Day Center, 299 17th Street.

Some of the innovations that excite me most about Connections Housing are:

- Addresses the needs of the neighborhood by making sure both people on the streets are housed, and the neighborhood has reduced street homelessness and prioritizing the housing for people who are on the streets of the neighborhood;
- Provides a right-sized program model that can be replicated throughout the region;
- Links supportive services with permanent and interim housing;
- Links Section 8 housing vouchers to the 16 special needs units to provide a revenue source for services; and
- Links interim housing with the national rapid re-housing movement.

City Council Funds Critical Services with Budget Revisions

The San Diego City Council approved mid-year budget revisions on March 11 that included funding to extend the winter emergency homeless shelter for 90 days, install two public restroom facilities Downtown, and support the ongoing development of Balboa Park's 2015 Centennial. Funds were available due primarily to increased revenues.

Council President Todd Gloria, who also serves as the Budget and Finance Committee Chairman, applauded the unanimous decision of his colleagues.

"We have worked diligently to strengthen the City's finances for the past four years, and our action demonstrated continued discipline," said Council President Gloria. "I look forward to a more comprehensive evaluation of the City's ongoing funding needs through the Fiscal Year 2014 budget deliberations."

The notable items funded were: Emergency Winter Shelter Program: extended until July 1, 2013 – \$300,000; Downtown Public Restrooms – \$400,000; and Balboa Park 2015 Centennial Celebration – \$350,000.


Tracking Todd
