Individuals who participate in Bike to Work 2013 have the chance to get fit, save time and money, and receive great freebies.

As a proud member of SANDAG and as Chair of the SANDAG Transportation Committee, I encourage you to visit www.SANDAG.org to register for Bike to Work Day, and log your bike trips in TripTracker to be automatically entered to win one of many great prizes.

SANDAG's website also features a map to help plan your route and includes almost 90 pit stop locations throughout the region which offer fun breaks for new and experienced cyclists on Bike to Work Day. Pit stops are places where riders can rest and pick up free t-shirts, snacks, and encouragement.

Don't wait until May 17 to commute by bike though, because every time you bike to work and log your trips online, you will be entered into weekly prize drawings throughout the month.

All Parties Agree on Tourism Marketing District Amendments

On April 15, the San Diego City Council approved an amended agreement with the Tourism Marketing District (TMD) which resolved disputed language and moved the TMD far closer to restarting the promotion of San Diego. Amendments strengthen indemnification for the City, increase transparency, and heighten

Council President Gloria Secures \$77,000 for The Center

Recognizing its continuous work and value to the greater San Diego community, Council President Todd Gloria and his colleagues allocated \$77,000 of Community Projects, Programs, and Services (CPPS) funds to The San Diego LGBT Center. CPPS funds are the result of savings in the office budgets of Councilmembers which each can spend on qualified organizations and projects.

The Center houses over 40 programs and services that reach out to the LGBT, HIV/AIDS, and allied communities. The CPPS funding provided will support core programs such as Sunburst Youth Housing Project, Hillcrest Youth Center, Behavioral Health Sciences, HIV Services, Latino Services, and Family Matters, Senior Services. The funds provided by Council President Gloria and six of his colleagues will help ensure the aforementioned programs and services continue. He is grateful that Councilmembers see The Center as the true citywide resource it is.

Council Demonstrates Collaboration with Immigration Reform Action

The San Diego City Council voted unanimously in April to ask Congress to pass comprehensive immigration reform that maintains border security while providing a pathway to citizenship. The unanimous action by the four Democrats and four Republicans signaled the will of the nation's largest border city and marked a dramatic change since an earlier proposed immigration-related resolution was discussed along clear party lines at a City Council committee meeting.

"The San Diego City Council's action demonstrate our ability to work collaboratively and productively on issues as controversial as immigration reform," said Council President Todd Gloria. "San Diego knows firsthand how our nation's broken immigration system is hurting our economy and millions of families. I am proud of my colleagues for putting aside partisan politics in favor of a strong recommendation of immigration reforms that are appropriate for the San Diego region and the nation. I hope our leaders in Washington take a lesson from our collaborative approach and prioritize action over arguing."

Council President Gloria also wrote to members of the local Congressional delegation thanking them for or requesting their support of the Uniting American Families Act, ensuring the inclusion of LGBT families in comprehensive immigration reform. the importance of funding for the 2015 Centennial of the Panama-California Exposition in Balboa Park. The amendments were agreed to by the Mayor and the TMD earlier in the day.

"Today's action again demonstrates the City Council's pragmatic, collaborative approach to achieving compromise," said Council President Todd Gloria. "Understanding the critical importance of the tourism industry gave us confidence that all stakeholders could work together on an agreement that is both beneficial and responsible, and that time was well used."

The Council approved the First Amendment to the operating agreement which included a provision to release some previously collected funds to the TMD for promotional purposes. The final step in the process was for the Mayor to sign the operating agreement, which the City Council directed him to do in a previous action. The Mayor signed the operating agreement a couple of weeks later.

"The amended agreement is good for San Diego, and we need to focus on other critical issues now," said Council President Gloria.

The City's budget and the regional economy are greatly impacted by tourism. The more people who know about San Diego through the TMD's promotional efforts, the better the chances of them traveling to the city. When people travel to San Diego, transient occupancy tax is generated, which is a key component of the City's General Fund, paying for core services like fire-rescue, police, and libraries. Further, 160,000 jobs in the region are dependent on

Civic San Diego Receives \$35 Million of New Market Tax Credit Allocation

Civic San Diego received an award in April of \$35 million of New Market Tax Credit (NMTC) funds from the Community Development Financial Institutions Fund, a division of the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

"This funding award demonstrates the critical work being done in San Diego to address real needs in many of our communities," said Council President Todd Gloria.

The NMTC Program was established by Congress is 2000 to drive investment in operating businesses and real estate projects in lowincome communities. The program attracts investment capital to these communities by allowing corporations and individuals to receive a credit against their Federal income taxes in exchange for making direct equity investments in entities like the Civic San Diego Economic Growth and Neighborhood Investment Fund.

According to Civic San Diego President Jeff Graham, "San Diego's neighborhoods will be the direct beneficiaries of this funding which goes towards projects that create jobs and provide services to low-income and highly distressed neighborhoods."

Strengthening Public Safety

- The City is working to procure a new contractor to complete work on the Vermont Street Bridge. Construction is expected to begin in June.
- A contract has been awarded to complete the long awaited Juniper Dip sidewalk, which is expected to proceed in the coming months following resolution of items related to a bird survey and utility relocations.
- The water billing concerns of seven constituents were resolved.
- The streets signs for Blaine Avenue were removed, marking the competed transition to Harvey Milk Street.
- Homeless encampments along India Street between Palm Avenue and Washington Street were addressed by Environmental Services and the San Diego Police Department.
- An abandoned couch was removed from the alley behind Hawley Boulevard.
- Clean up has begun at an abandoned house in the 4800 block of Circle Drive thanks to action by the Neighborhood Code Compliance team.
- The logistics for construction activity blocking a driveway in the 600 block of B Street were changed to allow easier access for building residents nearby.

The project is currently in the planning and design phase and will replace old cast iron water mains and upgrade the water delivery system servicing your community. The project will help bring the existing water system up to current standards, improve system reliability, and reduce maintenance needs and costs.
