Course Goal: This course is intended to teach students how to respond, investigate, and process Traffic Collisions and the arrest of individuals for alcohol DUIs in San Diego County. Students will learn what is required for such investigations from the perspective of a Collision Investigations Bureau Sergeant and a Traffic Investigations Unit Detective. They will also receive an overview and refresher of the SFST battery tests and how to prepare DUI cases for trial in court.
