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## How can I advocate for projects in my District?

#### ✓ Reach Out To Your City Councilmember

Council offices submit their CIP priorities in early October and also submit their Budget Priorities Memos to the IBA in mid-January each year. Each of these is an opportunity to request projects in your neighborhood.

#### ✓ Reach Out To Your Community Planning Groups

Community Planning Groups submit their CIP priorities in early October every other year. Giving them your feedback helps them to decide and prioritize which projects to request.

### Attend Budget Hearings to Speak or Submit Public Comment

The City Council hosts Budget Review hearings each year in May following the release of the Mayors Budget in April. These hearings represent the opportunity to make revisions to the budget, and the City Council makes recommendations based off public comments.

## What is Capital Improvements Program (CIP)?

- It's the City's long-term plan for projects and funding sources.
- It helps deliver vital services to improve the health, safety and prosperity of the citizens.

✓ It enhances overall quality-of-life.



## **SD** CIP Overview: Five-Year Outlook

## **>**Purpose

The Five-Year CIP Outlook is a planning tool, and not a budget document; it assists in long term infrastructure planning and allocation of resources.

## **SD** CIP Overview: Five-Year Outlook

#### Fiscal Years 23-27: Total Needs Breakdown by Asset Type

- Water & Wastewater: \$1.97 Billion
- Pure Water: \$916.8 Million
- Stormwater: \$1.80 Billion
- Transportation/Mobility: \$1.58 Billion
- Emergency Shelters: \$122.5 Million
- New Fire & Lifeguard Stations: \$347.9 Million
- > New Libraries: 51.9 Million
- Parks: \$801.7 Million

## Other Facilities

- Airports: \$31Million
- Existing Facilities: \$617.7 Million
- Fleet: \$182.5 Million
- Landfills: \$23.8 Million

## Purpose

This policy's goal is to establish a capital-planning process to optimize the use of available resources for projects. As there are more capital improvement needs across the City than available budget.



## Prioritizing CIP Projects: Existing Council Policy 800-14

# Methodology

- ✓Total Score of 100 points using the eight factors.
- Every CIP Project is scored at the beginning of the project.
- Prioritization score helps to drive funding decisions by Mayor and Council.
- CIP Projects are rescored if additional funding is needed.

## 4. Level and Quality of Service

a) Meets or exceeds established service levels

#### **5.** Sustainability and Conservation

- a) Greener neighborhoods
- b) Improves health of community and natural environment

## 6. Funding Availability

a) Grant funds

#### 7. Project Readiness

a) Project phase; planning/design/construction

## 8. Multiple Category Benefit and Bundling Opportunities

a) Multiple improvements in one contract




