WELCOMING SAN DIEGO

City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

<u>Federal Update</u>: On Aug. 5, the <u>White House announced</u> a designation of Deferred Enforced Departure, DED, for Hong Kong for 18 months. DED provides protection from removal as well as work authorization. Unlike Temporary Protected Status, there is no registration process for DED protection, but you must still apply for work authorization—beware of fraud and scams.

CITY PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- On July 19, the City of San Diego announced a new citywide initiative called Homes for All of Us. The initiative includes the <u>Homes for All of Us</u> <u>Implementation Proposal</u>, as well as a citywide community plan update framework called <u>Blueprint San Diego</u> and the creation of a Middle Income Housing Working Group. Through updates to the Land Development Code, the initiative aims to incentivize and promote new housing opportunities that San Diegans of all income levels can afford. See <u>here</u> for more.
- The <u>City of San Diego</u> and <u>County</u> COVID-19 emergency housing assistance programs can pay **100% of unpaid and future rent** to landlords and tenants for eligible households, <u>regardless of immigration status</u>.

NEW DATA, REPORTS, & PODCASTS

- The <u>Centre for Migration Studies of New York (CMS)</u> released <u>estimates of the US undocumented and eligible-to-naturalize populations</u> and updated its Democratizing Data mapping tools. CMS estimates that **10.35 million** undocumented immigrants and **8.1 million immigrants who are eligible to** naturalize reside in the United States. Based on sub-state level data for the City of San Diego, we have **63,000 undocumented neighbors** and over **74,000** residents who are eligible to be naturalized.
