WELCOMING SAN DIEGO

City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

The Department of State seeks <u>public comments identifying barriers that impede</u> access to, and fair, efficient adjudication of, immigration benefits, and recommendations on how to remove those barriers, and identifying any

Department actions that fail to promote access to the legal immigration system. Written comments must be received on or before October 18, 2021.

A pathway to citizenship for Dreamers, TPS holders, farm workers, and other essential workers <u>will not be included through the budget reconciliation process</u>, as determined by the Senate Parliamentarian. Other options are on the table.

CITY PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The California Department of Housing and Community Development <u>approved</u> the updated **Housing Element** of San Diego's General Plan, part of Mayor Gloria efforts to provide **homes that all San Diegans can afford**.
- In case you missed it, the City of San Diego joined communities across the country to <u>celebrate Welcoming Week Sept. 10-19</u>, and <u>Citizenship Day on Sept. 17</u>. This included <u>lighting up Balboa Park</u>, passing a <u>Welcoming Week proclamation</u>, and initiatives through the <u>San Diego Public Library</u>.
- Mayor Gloria proclaimed Hispanic Heritage Month in the City of San Diego.
- San Diego <u>has joined states and cities</u> across the country to **welcome Afghan newcomers** through the <u>Welcome.Us</u> initiative.

NEW DATA, REPORTS, & PODCASTS

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, New American Economy partnered with UnidosUS to take a look at the most recent data from the 2020 Census and the American Community Survey to shed more light on the economic impact of Hispanic Americans — the largest ethnic group in the United States. <u>The Power of the Purse: The Contributions of Hispanic Americans</u> finds that Hispanic households hold considerable earning and consumer power — in 2019, Hispanic households earned more than \$1.2 trillion. Hispanic immigrants are significantly more likely to be entrepreneurs than the general U.S. population — more than 12 percent of all Hispanic immigrant workers worked for their own business, making them 30.6 percent more likely to have their own business than the overall U.S. population. And between 2010 and 2019, the number of eligible Hispanic voters increased by more than 8.2 million.
