

City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

Court-ordered re-implementation of the Migration Protection Protocols (MPP) program will begin on or around Dec.6. Once fully operational, MPP enrollments will take place across the Southwest Border, and returns to Mexico will take place at seven ports of entry, including San Diego.

The City of San Diego <u>submitted a written public comment</u> in support of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program in response to the Department of Homeland Security's <u>notice of proposed rulemaking</u>.

The Department of Labor announced their final rule that will <u>raise the hourly</u> <u>minimum wage to \$15/hour for employees on federal contracts</u> beginning on January 30, 2022.

CITY PROGRAMS, SERVICES, & UPDATES

- The City of San Diego released its annual <u>Five-Year Financial Outlook</u> for fiscal years (FY) 2023 to 2027. The report forecasts that the City's General Fund revenues will reach pre-pandemic levels by FY2023.
- The City is looking to fill hundreds of <u>paid internships and entry-level positions</u> with the potential for career advancement.

NEW DATA, REPORTS, & PODCASTS

This week's highlighted reports honor the <u>16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence</u>. 2021 marks the <u>30th anniversary</u> of this annual event.

- Gender-Based Violence against Women: Both Cause for Migration and Risk along the Journey from the Migration Policy Institute explores the rates of gender violence among refugee, asylee, and migrant women; avenues of immigration available to survivors in the United States; and supports offered once women are lawfully admitted. Between 60-80% of female migrants traveling through Mexico are raped along the way, according to estimates from a study by Amnesty International and reporting by Fusion.
- An <u>analysis in The New Humanitarian</u> explores the long, uneven path to gender-based asylum in the United States.
