City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

Chris Magnus—former Police Chief of Tucson, Arizona—was sworn in as the <u>new</u> <u>Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection</u> (CBP).

During the first-ever White House Maternal Health Day of Action, the Biden administration <u>announced new commitments</u> to support safe pregnancies and childbirth, and reduce complications and mortality in the year following birth. The U.S. <u>maternal mortality rate</u> is the highest among industrialized countries, and there are vast racial/ethnic, socioeconomic, and urban-rural <u>inequities</u>.

The Biden administration released an updated <u>National Action Plan to Combat</u> <u>Human Trafficking</u> that focuses on addressing the needs of underserved individuals, families, and communities.

- <u>Here</u> is an overview of Mayor Gloria's accomplishments during his first 100 days in office.
- Last week, Secretary Mayorkas of the Department of Homeland Security visited San Diego to celebrate the border reopening with Mayor Gloria.
- Also last week, Mayor Gloria, Councilmember Moreno, and other leaders met with <u>Secretary Haaland</u> of the Department of the Interior to announce <u>grant</u> <u>funding for new parks and environmental conservation</u>; \$25 million will go toward disadvantaged communities throughout San Diego County.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

 Through the <u>Good Jobs Challenge</u>, the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) is allocating \$500 million to collaborative skills training systems and programs. EDA encourages efforts to reach historically underserved populations and areas, communities of color, women, and other groups facing labor market barriers. Application deadline is January 26, 2022.
