

City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

In mid-December, the Senate Parliamentarian issued a third <u>negative decision</u> on the inclusion of immigration provisions in the Build Back Better (BBB) package. Senate passage of BBB is currently uncertain.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced its commitment to adopt a definition of statelessness for immigration purposes and <u>enhance protections</u> <u>for stateless individuals</u> living in the United States.

DHS plans to make available an additional 20,000 H-2B temporary nonagricultural worker visas for FY2022. The additional 13,500 visas will be available only to returning workers who received an H-2B visa/were granted H-2B status during one of the last three fiscal years (FY 2019, 2020, or 2021). The remaining 6,500 visas are reserved for nationals of Honduras, Guatemala, El Salvador, and Haiti.

The Department of Health & Human Services, Office of Refugee Resettlement has published a <u>Dear Colleague Letter</u> describing changes to the public charge rule.
