In honor of Martin Luther King Jr. Day this week, read this piece on how the civil rights movement opened the door to immigrants of color, and this series from 11 San Diegans reflecting on his legacy. May we honor that legacy every day.

The Biden administration is requiring health insurance companies to cover the cost of at-home COVID-19 tests; offering 4 free tests per household; and will be distributing free masks nationwide. You can find County testing locations here.

A group of Senators <u>have formally requested</u> that the Biden administration grant Temporary Protected Status (TPS) re-designations for El Salvador, Honduras and Nicaragua, and issue a new designation for Guatemala.

Natural catastrophes and other extreme situations can affect the processing of a USCIS application, petition, or immigration request. A reminder that USCIS has discretion to take the following measures on a case-by-case basis.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

EDA encourages efforts to reach historically underserved populations and areas, communities of color, women, and other groups facing labor market barriers. Application deadline is January 26, 2022.
