City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

A new U.S Customs and Border Protection (CBP) memo <u>aims to increase oversight</u> of "critical incident teams" (CITs), issuing new standards while consolidating internal investigative power in the Office of Professional Responsibility (OPR).

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) announced <u>guidance</u> recognizing that a spousal relationship may exist for the purpose of obtaining derivative refugee or asylee status, in certain circumstances, if there is evidence of an informal marriage. - The block of Third Avenue between Market St. and Island Ave. has been officially named "<u>Tom Hom Avenue</u>" in honor of <u>the first person of color to</u> <u>serve on the City Council in 1963</u>, Tom Hom.
- <u>Mayor Gloria joined</u> Baja California Governor Marina del Pilar, U.S. Ambassador Ken Salazar, and other officials to discuss the new Otay Mesa border crossing, <u>which may open ahead of schedule</u>.
- <u>Mayor Gloria met with</u> U.S. Customs & Border Protection's new Director of Field Operations for San Diego, Sidney Aki.
