

## City of San Diego Weekly Immigrant Affairs Update

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) <u>announced</u> a new designation of Sudan and an extension/redesignation of South Sudan for Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for 18 months.

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) will hold a <u>listening session</u> on immigration <u>protections for stateless individuals</u> living in the U.S. on March 8.

The U.S. Census Bureau <u>will release the first set of results</u> from the 2020 Post-Enumeration Survey (PES) and Demographic Analysis (DA) estimates on March 10. The first release of PES results will provide national estimates of population coverage overall and by demographic groups, as well as age groups and sex.

The UN High Commissioner for Refugees/UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) published a position statement on returns to Ukraine.

**CITY PROGRAMS, SERVICES, & UPDATES** 

- Mayor Gloria <u>sent a letter</u> to the California Public Utilities Commission to quickly identify measures to provide relief to San Diego customers facing spikes in their SDG&E bills due to soaring natural gas prices and rate hikes.
- Assemblymember Brian Maienschein, in partnership with Mayor Gloria and City Attorney Mara W. Elliott, <u>announced legislation</u> to prevent individuals convicted of specified crimes from possessing a firearm in California.
- City Council <u>approved</u> the new <u>Street Vendor Ordinance</u> this week.
- City Council formally accepted <u>\$8.3 million in additional aid</u> to help lowincome tenants pay rent and utility bills during the pandemic.
- The City of San Diego Public Library kicked off its annual <u>Spring into STEAM</u> challenge, offering in-person and virtual workshops to strengthen students' STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) skills.

## **NEW DATA, REPORTS, & PODCASTS**

According to the Pew Research Center, around four-in-ten Latinos in the U.S. worry that they or someone close to them could be deported. About half of immigrant Latinos (51%) say they worry a lot or some that they or someone they know could be deported – a higher share than among U.S.-born Latinos, 28% of whom say they have the same concerns.

## FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

• <u>We Are All America's</u> *Opportunity For All Table (OFA)* is launching the <u>Ethnic Based Community Organization (ECBO) pilot program</u>. The \$3,000 minigrants will be awarded to 3 projects and will support ECBOs that are involved in local refugee and immigrant advocacy and policy efforts. Proposals will be accepted until March 15, and awardees will be notified on March 31.
