What are the objectives/expectations of the International Affairs Board in this area?

What methods and resources are available to the IAB to work with the Mayor and the Council?

Speaker: Dr. Joel Day, Director of Boards and Commissions

- Dr. Joel Day presented his remarks to the Board:
 - (1) "In the City we have a challenge of seeing around corners," including addressing climate change and meeting the City's climate action plan commitments, determining a strategy for San Diego's military community as it rebalances towards the Pacific and expands its presence, and welcoming refugees and immigrants. How do we prepare and plan for the International Affairs Board to design a strategy for how the future Mayor and City Council members engage in international affairs and become a global city?
 - (2) There is a need to develop a strategy in order to address the imminent challenges facing the City. It will require addressing four pieces of the puzzle:
 - a. Board model
 - b. Internal v. external communications
 - c. Resources "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country." JFK
 - d. Audience
 - (3) How can we best leverage the talent in this room?
 - a. Need for a HUB model?
 - b. Elevate and create
 - c. List of priorities
 - i. 5-year v. 10-year plan
 - d. Structural questions and relevance to international affairs
 - i. 5 W's Who, what, when, where and why?
 - Footprint of city to follow. Size of investment from City Council to promote international affairs. Where is there a place in the bureaucracy? In the City or regional county-wide issues?
 - ii. Vision of making San Diego a global city (which has never been done)
 - Example: LA used the Olympic Games 2028 as a means of achieving their vision of being a Global City
 - iii. Enormous opportunity
