City

Rent and Utility Assistance Application Opens March 15

Beginning March 15, City of San Diego residents may apply for COVID-19 rental and utility assistance through the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) Housing Stability Assistance Program.

Small-Business Outdoor Dining Fund GRANT-ed

The City of San Diego is now offering \$3,000 grants to help build decks and platforms that comply with standards outlined in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA.) Additionally, businesses located in low- and moderate-income areas and/or are owned by low- and moderate-income persons can be eligible for up to \$5,000 in funding and expedited grant processing.

The grants may be used to cover the cost of labor and materials including ramps, framing materials, railings, and hiring a civil or structural engineer to produce plans, among other allowable uses. The City will cover permitting fees until funds are depleted.

City Outlines Stimulus Priorities

With the passage of the American Rescue Plan, the City of San Diego will receive an estimate \$300 million in federal aid. In a statement, Mayor Gloria outlined the following funding priorities:

- Defeat COVID-19 support vaccination efforts in communities of concern to create a more equitable recovery;
- Protect cores service and jobs address the City's immediate budget crisis; closing these gaps will preserve jobs, avoid salary cuts and ensure employees will continue to provide vital services residents deserve;
- Equip San Diegans for a better tomorrow use funds to create a foundation for long-term stability for the City and its residents.

Let the Games Begin Again – City Resumed Permits for Outdoor Sports Programs

The City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department resumed issuing permits for outdoor sports programs per the CDPH guidelines.

To ensure proper protocols are being followed, sports organizations must provide <u>reopening plans</u> based on the CDPH Youth and Adult Sports Guidance.

Operation Shelter to Home to Wind Down

Operation Shelter to Home, which has enabled the Convention Center to serve as a homeless shelter since April 2020, will begin relocating residents to the City's reconfigured shelters. Move-out begins the week of March 22.

County

Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 Vaccine Arrives in San Diego

On March 8, the County received its first shipment of Johnson & Johnson vaccine, which will be distributed at local vaccination sites, the same way as Moderna and Pfizer vaccines. Unlike other vaccines, this one can be completed in a single dose.

State

\$6.6 Billion for the Kids

On March 5, Governor Newsom signed a \$6.6 billion package to accelerate the safe return to in-person instruction across California. This additional funding supports safety measures for in-person instruction and expands learning opportunities such as summer school, tutoring, and mental health services.

This legislation also codified allocating 10 percent of the State's vaccine supply to education workers and strengthening school data reporting requirements.

State Taking Equitable Vaccination Actions

On March 4, the Newsom Administration announced that the State set aside 40 percent of vaccine doses for the hardest-hit communities. They also announced a vaccine equity metric – which seeks to increase vaccinations in those communities – to be incorporated in the <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u>, which governs the conditions under which California's economy can safely operate during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Local Power Granted to Halt Commercial Evictions

On March 4, Governor Newsom signed an executive order extending authorization for local governments to halt evictions for commercial renters impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic through June 30, 2021.

Federal

\$1.9 Trillion in Aid is on the Way

On March 11, the federal government passed the \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act. This act includes the following:

- \$1,400 stimulus checks for individuals making less than \$75,000 a year and for married couples earning under \$150,000;
- An extension of a \$300 federal supplement to state unemployment benefits;
- \$14 billion for accelerating vaccine distribution;
- \$130 billion to help schools reopen safely by providing for improved ventilation, hiring extra janitors, and distributing more personal protective equipment;
- \$7.25 billion for the PPP small-business loan program;
- \$350 billion to state and local governments (San Diego is expected to receive an estimated \$280 – 306 million);
- \$4.5 billion for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program;
- \$25 billion for a new grant program for "restaurants and other food and drinking establishments" administered by the Small Business Association;
- \$25 billion for emergency rental assistance, including \$5 billion for emergency housing vouchers for people experiencing homelessness, survivors of domestic violence and victims of human trafficking;
- \$34 billion to temporarily strengthen provisions of the Affordable Care Act, including significant increases to subsidies for middle-income Americans who buy private health insurance on the exchange marketplace;
- Provisions to increase the annual Child Tax Credit to \$3,000 for children ages 6 to 17 and \$3,600 for children under age 6.

News from City Hall

City Council Unanimously Passes Climate Equity Fund

On Tuesday, March 9, City Council voted unanimously to create the Climate Equity Fund (CEF) - a fund to accelerate the implementation of projects that advance climate justice, resilience, and adaptation in disadvantaged communities through supplemented resources.

I was happy to support this item.

Infrastructure investments are needed citywide, but we have to approach this problem equitably if we are serious about reversing the decades of neglect to too many communities in this city.

I want to ensure that this funding is truly supplemental and the Council and Mayor find ways to leverage these dollars for the greatest impact. As a civil engineer who has seen a lot of projects come through the City, I've seen underfunded projects lag, only to become more expensive and years behind schedule. This happens everywhere, but when it happens in a neighborhood with a low Climate Equity score, it prolongs exposure to pollution, increases urban heat, or puts people at risk on a busy street.

The Climate Equity Fund will help mitigate this risk and allow climate infrastructure projects to be funded more frequently and with greater urgency.
