Lake Hodges Reopens for Windsurfing

After more than 10 years, Lake Hodges Reservoir is once again open to the general public for wind-

surfing. After hearing complaints from the windsurfing community, I worked closely with the City of San Diego Public Utilities Department to help bring back this recreational activity to San Diego. It had previously been allowed but was stopped during the construction of a pump station in 2003.

Windsurfing, or boardsailing as it is also known, is now allowed on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays from a half-hour before sunrise to sunset. Lake Hodges is the only city reservoir to allow windsurfing. It is also available for fishing and other recreational activities.

The City worked with the State of California De-

partment of Public Health to ensure all activities which may impact the reservoir's water quality are thoroughly evaluated and proper measures to protect it are in place. For safety and water quality protection purposes, certain new rules are in place that did not apply when it was previously allowed. Complete rules and regulations for recreational use of the reservoir are posted online at www.sandiego.gov/water.

Our reservoirs are an integral part of our water management system but I believe they should also serve as a recreational asset for our communities and the Mayor agrees.

Mayor Kevin Faulconer said "We commend Councilmember Kersey and city staff for their leadership on this issue. The new safety rules that are in place will allow for adequate protection of the public, wildlife and water quality at Lake Hodges Reservoir, while returning one of San Diego's most unique recreation activities."

I am so pleased we're able to bring windsurfing back and look forward to seeing the local enthusiasts enjoying Lake Hodges once again.
