INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the San Ysidro Community Plan Update Advisory Committee (Update Committee) was for staff to provide a summary of the October charrette, conduct a wayfinding exercise to identify pedestrian routes, signage needs, and community gateways and have the audience select their preferred library sites. The second half of the meeting was dedicated to

presentations on public facility financing and the role of public health in creating healthy communities.

The meeting was called to order by Michael Freedman, Vice Chair of the San Ysidro Community Planning Group and a member of the San Ysidro Community Plan Update Advisory Committee.

AGENDA ITEMS

Charrette Recap

Sara Lyons, staff project manager, summarized the topics covered during the October charrette. The charrette was organized into a series of three meetings and interactive exercises, with each night building on the previous meeting. The primary intention was to translate ideas, community identity and goals into visual imagery and graphically represent the opportunities within the community. The charrette included a discussion on existing conditions, a hosted walk audit through the village and eastern border commercial area, photo survey of the community and evening meetings where the public provided comments on four key area (Border Commercial, Community at Large, Pilot Village, and Mobility). The concepts and input received during this intensive outreach effort will be further analyzed and refined upon additional agency coordination and economic and environmental input. All the information gathered at the charrette and these meetings will ultimately help guide future land use recommendations that will be brought back to this group.

Next steps for the Plan Update include continuing to gather input and analyze feasibility The December meeting will focus on Parks, Open Space, Trails and Historic Context and in the Spring we will review Market Conditions Report, present Land Use Alternatives, begin traffic modeling

Pedestrian Routes & Wayfinding Exercise

The audience spent approximately 30 minutes on the wayfinding exercise. The audience was asked to split up into a few tables and comment on two maps, a community wide map and a pilot village area map. The purpose of the exercise was to identify existing and potential community gateways, directional signage needs, and every day pedestrian travel routes. Community members identified the following on the maps:

- Key Destinations
- Community Gateways
- Directional Signage Location
- Primary Pedestrian / Bicycle Paths of Travel
- Primary roadways used for pedestrian connectivity
- Alleys
- Bridge Connections
- Needed links

A legend for the maps and the maps themselves are included as an attachment to these minutes.

Future Library Sites Survey

The Redevelopment Agency is in the process of selecting sites to analyze for a new library location. A map of the nine library sites discussed at the Project Area Committee was posted at the side of the room. Each audience member was given two dot stickers. The audience was instructed to place the blue next to their first choice location and the orange for their second choice location. The results of the room survey are attached. The Beyer Elementary School location had overwhelming support.

Public Facilities

Tim Nguyen, facilities financing planner, and Tom Tomlinson, facilities financing manager for the City Planning & Community Investment Department presented facilities financing. The presentation included an overview:

- Of how facilities financing ties into the community plan update process;
- The General Plan policies that sets the framework for facilities financing;
- The existing public facilities inventory serving San Ysidro and Development Impact Fees; and
- The timeline and process for updating San Ysidro facilities financing plan.

Public Facilities Financing Plans (PFFP) are documents that identify future public facilities, construction costs, funding sources, and schedules for building projects. The San Ysidro PFFP will be updated with the community plan update. San Ysidro's financing plan was last updated in 2007/2008 fiscal year. Facilities Financing's goal is to update financing plans in conjunction with the community plan updates.

Public comment received following the presentation on Public Facilities:

- San Ysidro's DIF seemed high for a community that has a below average household income
- Roadways in San Ysidro need special attention
- Impacts by Custom Border Protection and other border related traffic wears down the roads
- Need to charge Federal agencies for use of city roads, a maintenance fee
- Need outside assistance for ongoing capital improvements or maintenance funds
- Investigate whether there is funding available for border communities through NAFTA or World Bank.
- Pursue joint use agreements with neighboring cities like Chula Vista and Imperial Beach for parks

Creating Healthy Communities (Elena Quintanar, County of San Diego - Health and Human Services Agency)

Elena Quintanar from the County of San Diego gave a presentation on creating healthy communities. She shared a great deal of information on public health and the role of public health in developing healthy communities. The County of San Diego received a federal grant for approx. \$16 million to promote healthy communities. Part of the money will be awarded through SANDAG. The County has concentrated efforts in four key areas:

- Tobacco Use
- Poor Diet
- Lack of Exercise
- School Age Wellness

Elena mentioned San Ysidro was one of the most "walked" communities, meaning, there is a high concentration of pedestrian activity, but because of poor accessibility and connections and the need to maintain existing infrastructure the community's walkablity is hindered. Elena reached out to the community and discussed possible funding opportunities to achieve a healthier community and her role in helping the plan update achieve and reflect these goals.

Public comment received following the presentation on Healthy Communities:

- Would like a more accurate measure of walkability
- Funding for street improvements are a long time coming
- Walk up to San Ysidro High School on Otay Mesa road is dangerous
- Classes offered by Park and Recreation are no longer being offered
- When air quality is bad, we need some kind of green belt around San Ysidro to collect, clean very fine dust, very high particulate matter. There is dust from Truck tires breaking. There is dust from the border
- Plant more trees; suggested the Bougainvillea
- Use siren or public alert system to indicated bad air quality conditions, some kind of "smog alert" to let people know about air quality conditions

- In 1943 and "the vegetation was beautiful, the river ran free", now it is all compromised by "dirt roads built by immigration and border patrol"
- There is a lack of agency coordination between the Border Patrol, City, County, and Immigration, the whole area near the border is dotted with jurisdiction issues.
- Meet ADA requirements on Calle Primera all the way to Dairy Mart.
- More Focus on Travel Paths that are accessible to people w/ disabilities.
- Lack space for gathering, need more gathering spots
