Call to Order

• Ms. Granowitz called the meeting to order at 9:07 a.m. with six Board members present (one member arrived later). Quorum was achieved at the same time.

Approval of Minutes

- Ms. Granowitz called for a motion for the approval of the minutes from the September 2014 meeting.
 - Mr. Thesing motioned to approve minutes, Ms. Brown seconded the motion. Minutes were then approved, 6-0.

Staff Announcements

• Ms. Sima Thakkar, HUD Programs Manager, noted the Fiscal Year 2016 Request for Qualifications (RFQ) would be released in late October and would be due sometime in mid-November. She stated that a tentative timeline of the anticipated RFQ schedule would be posted on the City's website as soon as feasible.

- Ms. Thakkar also mentioned that staff would present the revised scoring criteria for Fiscal Year 2016 CDBG Funding applications to the Public Safety & Livable Neighborhoods (PSLN) Committee on October 29 at 2:00 p.m.

Item 6.a.: Discussion Item and CPAB Action Item:

Designation of Chair and Vice Chair of CPAB

Ms. Gardner nominated Ms. Granowitz and Mr. Malbrough to continue to serve as chair and vice-chair on CPAB. Ms. Brown seconded. Motion passed unanimously 7-0.

• Ms. Granowitz also announced that the following CPAB members have been reappointed: Mr. Friberg, Ms. Granowitz, Mr. Thesing, Ms. Patel, and Ms. Gardner.

Item 6.b.: Discussion Item and Staff Presentation:

Geographic Targeting Considerations Staff Update: As outlined in the <u>FY 2015 – FY 2019</u> <u>Consolidated Plan</u>, Geographic Targeting is a way for the City to help stabilize and improve neighborhoods.

Staff member Mr. Joe Whitaker introduced the item and gave a brief presentation –he noted that a working group would be formed to work with staff for the identification of proper data, methodologies and subsequent development of the geographic targeting maps. Mr. Whitaker also noted that Board members would be part of the working group (the Board Chair and another volunteer). *Please see attached presentation for more information.*

• Ms. Granowitz asked for volunteers from the CPAB to be part of the working group. Mr. Malbrough and Ms. Brown volunteered. Ms. Granowitz will also be part of the working group.

Item 6.c.: Discussion Item:

City of San Diego Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) Update

Ms. Sima Thakkar, HUD Programs Manager, discussed the following handouts (attached) and discussed their context within the CDBG Program as noted below:

- o Handout 1: FY 2015 FY 2019 Consolidated Plan (Con Plan) Excerpts
- Handout 2: DRAFT Proposed Sidewalk, ADA and Traffic Calming Projects Transportation Engineering Operations

She noted that Handout 1 outlines the policies for the allocation of CDBG moneys to fund City of San Diego Capital Improvement Projects and noted that one of the 6 goals of the Con Plan is to "strengthen neighborhoods by investing in the City's critical public infrastructure needs" while working with the <u>City's Capital Improvements Program Review and Advisory Committee</u> (CIPRAC).

Ms. Thakkar noted that HUD Programs Administration Office staff has started to work with CIPRAC in accordance with the Con Plan strategy.

Ms. Thakkar then stated that Handout 2 identified the list of initial recommendations for projects (to fund with CDBG City CIP funds) from the Transportation Department. She noted those projects were identified by the Transportation Department as "ready to proceed" projects and also met certain CDBG requirements (such as being located in low-moderate income census blocks).

Ms. Thakkar explained that the City needs to move forward with projects in order to ensure the prompt allocation of CDBG available funds to ensure compliance with HUD's timeliness requirements (see 24 CFR §570.902). She stated the Transportation Department recommended list of projects for CDBG funds was being discussed at CIPRAC at the same time the CPAB meeting was taking place and she envisioned the list would then be forwarded to the City Council.

She also stated that the costs of the projects in Handout 1 amounted to approximately \$1.1M (out of approximately \$4M of CDBG moneys pending allocation) and that an additional \$3.1M was projected/estimated to be available for City CIP projects as part of the FY 2016 CDBG allocation).

- Ms. Gardner asked staff to explain the purpose of the "V-Calm Sign" identified in Handout 2. Ms. Granowitz stated that it is the sign that flashes identifying the speed of passing vehicles.
- Mr. Malbrough asked for clarification on the items on the Handout 2 and inquired why some of them had a CIP number and others did not. Ms. Thakkar stated that she was unable to answer the question given it was outside of her expertise (but proper staff would be reporting back to CPAB in order to answer such and related questions).
- Mr. Malbrough stated he was concerned given his experience working as a member of the City's Community Planning Groups given there are hundreds of sidewalk improvement requests in the Southeastern area of San Diego and he wanted to ensure the community had an opportunity to comment/participate in the decision-making process.

Geographic Targeting Introduction


- Year 1 Recommendation laid out in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan

- Incorporate into the CDBG application scoring process






CPAB October 8th, 2014 - City CIP Update

GOAL 2: Strengthen neighborhoods by investing in the City's critical public infrastructure needs.

FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan (page 187)

Capital Improvement Program - This program will strengthen neighborhoods by dedicating funds for:

Investing in the City's critical public infrastructure needs to support neighborhood safety and improved livability such as sidewalks, streetlights, and other community enhancements.

The City of San Diego's Capital Improvements Program Review and Advisory Committee (CIPRAC) advisory committee reviews proposed Capital Improvements Program (CIP) projects and develops budget and project prioritization recommendations to the Mayor. Citywide coordination of capital project planning can increase the cost effectiveness and lead to more efficient infrastructure investments.

Currently, CIPRAC is developing the inaugural five year CIP plan (FY2015 through 2019) to comprehensively assess City infrastructure needs, identify existing and new infrastructure needs, discuss service levels, provide a financial assessment, and provide a five year list of all capital projects based on the following prioritization factors:

- Risk to Health, Safety and Environment and Regulatory or Mandated Requirements
- Asset Condition, Annual Recurring Costs and Asset Longevity
- Community Investment and Economic Prosperity

- Level and Quality of Service
- Sustainability and Conservation
- Funding Availability
- Project Readiness
- Multiple Category Benefit and Bundling Opportunities

To capitalize on this work, a portion of CDBG funds will be allocated to projects on the CIP prioritization list in low and moderate income CDBG eligible census tracts, particularly those census tracts identified through geographic targeting of resources to the most underserved areas.

The City's CDBG Program annually reprograms funds from projects that complete with reduced budgets, withdraw, or are canceled due to ineligibility determinations. It is critical that these funds are redistributed to activities that can expend funds quickly, since by nature these funds have already been through one allocation cycle. At least annually, these funds will be reinvested in the City's CIP projects working with CIPRAC.

Year 1 Recommendation: HUD Programs Administration staff will work with CIPRAC to determine the most efficient and effective methods for collaboration, ensure regulatory compliance, support the Consolidated Plan Goals, and provide technical assistance and outreach to City departments and community groups. Capital Improvement Program activities will be funded through the competitive FY 2015 CDBG application process. The current balance of reprogrammed funds will be invested in the City CIP projects working with CIPRAC. The focus will be on critical public infrastructure needs to support neighborhood safety and improved livability such as sidewalks, streetlights, and other community enhancements.
