Call to Order

Ms. Vicki Granowitz called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. with eight board members present —a member joined briefly after meeting started. Quorum was achieved at the same time.

Approval of Minutes

Ms. Granowitz called for a motion to approve the minutes from the January 2015 meeting. Dr. Maruta Gardner motioned to approve the minutes – the motion was seconded by Mr. Ken Malbrough. Minutes were then approved, 8-0.

Staff Announcements

Mr. Alarcon provided the following staff announcement:

 FY 2016 CDBG Request for Proposals Update: CPAB reviewed 49 responses to the City's Request for Proposals (RFPs), consisting of 8 Community and Economic Development (CED) projects, 19 non-profit Capital Improvement Projects (CIP), and 22 Public Service

- (PS) projects. The HUD Programs Administration (HPA) office conducted 22 technical assistance meetings in and answered 43 RFP-related questions during the RFP period.
- Two emergency homeless shelters are scheduled to close by March 31st. An announcement from the San Diego Housing Commission regarding a proposed year-round interim housing program for homeless adults was expected on or about March 13th.
- The City issued an RFP for Fair Housing service providers –responses are due March 24th. Through this process, the City will determine service providers for Fiscal Years (FY) 2016-2020.

Non-Agenda and Agenda Public Comment

- Mr. James Floros, with the Jacobs and Cushman San Diego Food Bank (SDFB), thanked the Board members for their service and their support (the SFFB applied for a \$400,000 CIP to fund improvements to their warehouse –said project was recommended for funding by the Board). Mr. Floros stated that his organization serves about 275,000 (78%) of the 380,000 food-insecure residents in San Diego county and funding of SDFB indirectly supports the 330 other non-profits partnering with SDFB.
- Mr. Daniel Hernandez of La Maestra thanked the Board members for their support in their program (La Maestra applied for \$847,963 CIP to fund improvements to their City Heights clinic –said project was recommended for funding by the Board). Mr. Hernandez mentioned being able to expand health care services (e.g., introducing a mobile mammography unit) as a result of being funded for FY16.
- Ms. Ann Kern of the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) spoke in favor of
 consolidating the remaining monies across all the project categories so that projects not
 fully fundable have the possibility of moving forward. She requested that the Board
 consider recommending funding the SDHC Direct Homeownership Assistance project
 which falls below the line of projects recommended for funding (CED Project, \$500,000
 CDBG funds requested).
 - Ms. Granowitz confirmed with Ms. Thakkar that in any related funding considerations, the Board needs to keep in mind that no more than 15% of the entitlement funds may be allocated to PS project due to a 15% cap set by HUD.
- Ms. Krista Stellmacher, with Community HousingWorks (CHW), thanked City staff and the Board members for their service in the RFP process (CHW applied for \$250,000 in order to fund a direct lending service program to facilitate acquisition of housing for families with lower income levels). Ms. Stellmacher noted that although CDBG funding helps the needlest of San Diego's families, funding also supports homeowner activities for those around 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI). Ms. Stellmacher noted that the application process had gone more smoothly this fiscal year.

- Mr. Thomas Lovell of St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP Management) thanked the Board for their hard work in this process. Mr. Lovell requested partial funding of their project, which scored below the recommended funding line (SVDP Management sought \$330,000 in CIP funding in order to carry out capital improvements in their Paul Mirabile Center facility).
- Mr. Ahmed Sahid of Somali Family Services of San Diego (SFS) thanked the staff for their assistance during the improved RFP application process. Mr. Sahid requested the Board consider recommending funding for their project with the leftover balance funds as their project (SFS applied for \$91,610 in CDBG PS funds for a Family Strengthening Program that supports educational services for refugees).

Ms. Thakkar gave a brief presentation regarding the FY16 CDBG application process. *Please view the attached presentation for more information.*

Following public comments, Mr. Malbrough motioned to merge balance monies for CIP and CED projects, in the interest of increasing the number of projects recommended for funding. Motion was seconded by Ms. Gardner. Motion passed unanimously, 9-0.

After some discussion among Board members and in response to information provided by Ms. Thakkar regarding the use of the balance of any CDBG funds allocated to the selective RFQ/P process (she noted such monies would be used to fund City CIP projects in accordance with the FY 2015 – FY 2019 Consolidated Plan), a motion was made to recommend combining the balance of the funds allocated to CED and CIP projects (\$415,926 and \$297,595, respectively) and include the SDHC project (CED Direct Homeownership Assistance, \$500,000 sought) and the San Diego Center for Children project (Campus Facility Upgrades, \$106,000 sought) in the lists of projects recommended for funding as those projects could be fully funded while consideration was still being given to ranking order. Motion was made by Mr. Malbrough and seconded by Mr. Thesing. Motion passed unanimously, 9-0.

A motion was made to incorporate the SDHC and the San Diego Center for Children projects affected by the previous motion in the list of projects recommended for funding (above the funding line) and incorporate them into the City's Fiscal Year 2016 Annual Action Plan. The motion was introduced by Mr. Thesing and seconded by Ms. Abrams. Motion passed unanimously, 9-0.

CONSOLIDATED PLAN ADVISORY BOARD MARCH 11, 2015 MEETING NOTES

The Board members briefly discussed the CPAB review/scoring process and staff noted that a debriefing of the overall FY 2016 RFQ/P competitive process, inclusive of the criteria and CPAB review/score steps would be scheduled for a CPAB meeting following submission of the FY 2016 Annual Plan to HUD.
