Call to Order

Ms. Vicki Granowitz called the meeting to order at 9:05 a.m. with seven board members present. Quorum was achieved at the same time, with two members joining soon thereafter.

Approval of Minutes

Ms. Granowitz called for a motion to approve the minutes from the March 2015 meeting. Richard Thesing motioned to approve the minutes – the motion was seconded by Mr. Ken Malbrough. Minutes were then approved, 7-0.

Staff Announcements

Ms. Thakkar provided the following staff announcement:

 As of March, the Economic Development Department now has a new Director, Mr. Erik Caldwell. Mr. Caldwell could not attend the April meeting but hopes to be in attendance for the May CPAB meeting. Mr. Caldwell previously was charged with Government Relations at Figtree (a clean-energy financing start-up) and had headed the City's Economic Growth Services under Mayor Sanders' administration.

 Ms. Granowitz extended thanks to staff on behalf of the board for the volunteer passes to the museums. Ms. Granowitz noted her invitation by Kris Michell to join the Downtown San Diego Partnership's task force on homeless issues.

Item 6.a.: Discussion and Action Item:

The City of San Diego's Draft Fiscal Year 2016 Annual Action Plan (FY 2016 AAP) was made available for a 30-day public review period from April 7, 2015 through May 6, 2015. The AAP is the yearly update to the City's FY 2015 – FY 2019 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and identifies the projects and programs proposed to be funded by the following federal programs: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program, and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) Program. HOME Investment Partnerships

Presentation on Draft Fiscal Year 2016 Annual Action Plan:

Ms. Eliana Barreiros presented the item and went over the purpose of the Annual Action Plan and its role within the administration of HUD-funded programs. She presented an overview of the programs and projects funded under the Action Plan. Mr. Leo Alarcon discussed CDBG programs and beneficiaries. *Please see attached presentation for more information*.

Ms. Kelly Salmons, with the County of San Diego, covered eligible activities for HOPWA, which is administered by the County through a Memorandum of Understanding. Since the *Requests for Qualifications and Proposals* process is currently in progress, the HOPWA projects for FY16 have yet to be finalized. Contracts will cover the term of one year with the option of two 1-year extensions, for a maximum of 3 years, before the next RFQ/P is released. *Please see attached presentation for more information*.

 Ms. Brown asked Ms. Salmons whether funds that carryover from previous years are specific to one program – her response was that carryover funds may be applied to different programs provided certain conditions are met. Ms. Melissa Peterman, staff with the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC), spoke of the SDHC's planned uses for the FY16 Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds. *Please see attached presentation for more information*.

- Ms. Abrams asked whether the shelters on slides 7-8 are open year-round and whether supportive services are offered, to which Ms. Peterman replied yes for both (excepting Rapid Re-housing due to its short-term nature).
- Mr. Thesing asked about the annual spending per capita for homeless individuals and whether interim housing funding includes meals. Ms. Peterman gave an approximation of \$500/person in funding (actually \$587), affirming that interim housing includes meals.

Ms. Tina Kessler with the San Diego Housing Commission discussed HOME activities in FY16. *Please see attached presentation for more information.*

- Upon inquiry from Dr. Maruta Gardner, Ms. Kessler specified the location of Comm22 as Commercial and 22nd Street.
- Ms. Valerie Brown asked Ms. Kessler about the impact of the \$1 million in homeownership assistance and Ms. Kessler noted it would allow assistance to 19-24 households.
- Ms. Patel was interested in the reason for the decline in HOME funds since 2004 Ms. Thakkar noted the cuts are congressionally-mandated.

Ms. Granowitz called for a motion to forward the FY2016 Annual Action Plan to the City Council for their consideration for approval. Mr. Ken Malbrough motioned and said motion was seconded by Mr. Thesing. The motion was carried unanimously, 9-0.

Item 6.b.: Discussion and Action Item:

Presentation on the San Diego Regional Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI)

Ms. Michele Marano, HUD Programs Coordinator, provided an overview on the purpose, processes, and function of the Al. *Please see attached presentation for more information*.

A motion was made to forward the FY2016-FY2020 Analysis of Impediments to City Council for their approval. Mr. Thesing motioned and said motion was seconded by Ms. Abrams. The motion passed unanimously, 9-0.

Ms. Granowitz mentioned that feedback on the FY16 application process and an update on the Geographic Targeting working group are due for May's meeting.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)

- The HOPWA program is an entitlement grant program funded through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- Although the City of San Diego is the grantee for these regional funds, the County of San Diego Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) has been administering the program on behalf of the City since 1998.

Program Overview

- The purpose of the HOPWA program is to assist local communities develop affordable housing opportunities and related supportive services for low-income person(s) living with HIV and AIDS.
- HOPWA funds are granted to the largest jurisdiction within a county and are available for use in the entire region.
- Fiscal Year 2015-2016 funding: \$2,826,474

Eligible HOPWA Activities

- Housing information and referral services
- Housing operating costs
- Project or tenant-based rental assistance
- Supportive services
- Resource identification
- Short-term rent, mortgage payment or utility payments
- Acquisition/rehabilitation and new construction
- Technical assistance
- Administrative expenses





- Connections Housing Downtown (150 interim beds)
- Cortez Hill Family Center (45 units)
- Rapid Re-Housing (339 households in 2014)

SDHC – We're About People

City of San Diego's Homeless Shelters and Service Programs (Cont.)

ESG

- Formula-based grant from HUD;
- Granted annually to jurisdictions, states, and urban counties to provide funding for homeless activities;
- Plans for use must be included in the Consolidated Plan Action Plan and reported in the CAPER;
- ESG activities must be coordinated with the local homeless Continuum of Care;
- Funds can be used for:
 - Outreach and Engagement
 - Shelter Operations
 - Homeless Prevention
 - Rapid Re-housing
 - Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)

CDBG

- Formula-based grant from HUD;
- Allocated annually to to cities and urban counties to develop viable communities;
- Plans for use must be included in the Consolidated Plan Action Plan and reported in the CAPER;
- Funds are targeted to low- and moderateincome persons and can be used for provision of:
 - Decent housing
 - A suitable living environment
 - Expansion of economic opportunities





SDHC – We're About People Interim Housing Program

- Assist as many as 2,835 homeless individuals;
- Operated by St. Vincent de Paul Village, Inc. (St. Vincent);
- Located at Paul Mirabile Center at St. Vincent's Downtown San Diego campus;
- Minimum 350 beds for homeless men and women (ages 18 and up); and
- Budget totals \$1,894,650
 - City General Funds: \$1,470,000
 - CDBG: \$267,352ESG: \$157,298

- Operated by People Assisting the Homeless (PATH);
- Located at the Connections Housing facility in Downtown San Diego;
- Minimum 150 beds for homeless men and women (ages 18 and up); and
- Budget totals \$716,776

- Operated by the YWCA of San Diego County (YWCA);
- Located in the Cortez Hill neighborhood; and
- Minimum 45 units for homeless families with children;
- Budget totals \$711,852
 - CDBG: \$205,902 - ESG: \$305,950
 - Housing Trust Fund: \$200,000



SDHC - HOME Investment Partnerships Program Contract Administrator

The HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) was created in 1990. This program provides federal funds from U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the following housing activities:

- Construction of affordable housing
- Acquisition and rehabilitation of affordable housing
- Owner-occupied housing rehabilitation
- Homebuyer down payment assistance and counseling
- Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)

HUD HOME funds are granted to the City of San Diego and administered by the San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC).

In Fiscal Year 2016, SDHC is proposing to allocate HOME funds to produce affordable rental housing units and provide first-time homebuyer assistance.





New Entitlement Allocation & Program Income


