I am writing in opposition to Kilroy Realty's proposed One Paseo project.

The significant negative impacts that One Paseo will have on our traffic congestion and community character are very concerning. One Paseo is not appropriate to suburban Carmel Valley, with its 1.45 million square feet of development on just 23.6 acres of land, buildings as tall as 150 feet, and a density similar to Horton Plaza downtown.

This is NOT smart or transit-oriented development. It adds 24,000 new cars daily to our roads, without access to mass transit until at least 2035. One Paseo requires nearby streets to be widened, creating dangerous and unappealing conditions for cyclists and pedestrians. Thank you (again) for your email of Feb 20 with the link to the "Statement of Overriding Considerations" that is intended to justify your approval of the One Paseo project. Here is the stated basis for what YOU are accepting:

"EACH of these public benefits serves as an independent basis for overriding all significant and unavoidable impacts. ANY ONE of the reasons set forth below is sufficient to justify approval of the project."

In an earlier email today, I have argued that almost all of the twelve (12) listed benefits are minor, not directly related to One Paseo or questionable, and in no sense do these benefits rise to the level that they would, INDEPENDENTLY, justify approval. The statements above are indefensible. I challenge you to rebut that argument.

In this email I will address TRANSIT-SERVED GROWTH and how the One Paseo project addresses the three legal requirements and guidelines in the document.

- The City's General Plan requires that the "City of Villages strategy focuses growth into mixed use ... districts LINKED TO AN IMPROVED REGIONAL TRANSIT SYSTEM" [Overriding Considerations Finding 1, OCF.1].
- SANDAG's Regional comprehensive Plan (RCP) ... encourages ... increase [in] residential and employment concentrations in areas with the BEST EXISTING and FUTURE TRANSIT CONNECTIONS [OCF.1]
- The Strategic Framework Element of the General Plan states "the City of Villages strategy [directs] compact growth in limited areas SERVED BY TRANSIT. Compact, TRANSIT-SERVED growth is an efficient use of urban land." [OCF.5]

Those are the stated requirements for TRANSIT SERVING a village in the City of Villages strategy. The Overriding Considerations document states only three things about transit.

- Infrastructure improvements [are] required to mitigate the project's transportation impacts (these impacts are not specified in this document) [OCF.7]
- A SHUTTLE SERVICE is being offered as part of an enhanced Transportation Demand Management program (no reference or link is given to documentation on that program). It IS ANTICIPATED (that is not a firm commitment) that the shuttle system will be implemented in the FINAL STAGES of the Revised Project (no definition of 'final stages', so it could mean essentially never implemented.) [OCF.9]
- The Revised Project includes an ESSENTIAL SHUTTLE LINK between the Project site and the Sorrento Valley Coaster Station. [OCF.11] (It is significant that the General Plan EIR states that the shuttle link is ESSENTIAL.)

That's it!! That is all there in on TRANSIT-SERVED GROWTH.

- What "LINKED TO AN IMPROVED REGIONAL TRANSIT SYSTEM" means in the One Paseo project is a shuttle to a Coaster Station, with limited frequency, that may never be implemented.
- That is also what "SERVED BY TRANSIT" means in the One Paseo project.
- That is also what "BEST EXISTING and FUTURE TRANSIT CONNECTIONS" means in the One Paseo project.

That is ALL THE TRANSIT 'considerations' that "justify approval of the project." Justify to YOU, but not to me; not to anyone who understands the English language and the intended meaning of "served by transit," "linked to an improved," and "essential link." By approval you will be ignoring the intent and bypassing the legally specified transit requirements for the One Paseo project.

Why can't we stick to the RULE OF LAW in San Diego?

I am writing in opposition to Kilroy Realty's proposed One Paseo project.

The significant negative impacts that One Paseo will have on our traffic congestion and community character are very concerning. One Paseo is not appropriate to suburban Carmel Valley, with its 1.45 million square feet of development on just 23.6 acres of land, buildings as tall as 150 feet, and a density similar to Horton Plaza downtown.

This is NOT smart or transit-oriented development. It adds 24,000 new cars daily to our roads, without access to mass transit until at least 2035. One Paseo requires nearby streets to be widened, creating dangerous and unappealing conditions for cyclists and pedestrians. Even Caltrans has said it is unclear if the project fits the region's smart growth principles.

The San Diego Planning Commission couldn't approve this project. The Carmel Valley, Torrey Pines, Torrey Hills and Del Mar Mesa Community Planning Boards rejected this project outright. I'm standing with these groups in asking you to say "NO" to One Paseo.

I am gravely concerned about Kilroy Realty's proposed One Paseo project, and I'm writing today to share with you my concerns about the negative impacts this project will bring to Carmel Valley.

I am especially concerned about the impacts to traffic congestion in the area, given that One Paseo will increase traffic by 370 percent and add nearly 24,000 daily car trips to our roads. All of this will lead to gridlock, especially given that the effectiveness of the proposed traffic light synchronization system has not been proven, nor has Caltrans or the City committed to its implementation. In fact, the project's Environmental Impact Report shows significant, unmitigated impacts to eight intersections and road segments. Furthermore, traffic relief near the project site depends on new freeway connectors that will not be built until 2030, if ever.

The majority of our community believes that THIS One Paseo is too large for the neighborhood. The Carmel Valley, Torrey Pines, Torrey Hills and Del Mar Mesa Community Planning Boards, as well as the San Diego Planning Commission, have already rejected One Paseo. Development requires several different interconnected elements to truly be considered "smart growth." One Paseo is not smart growth development. Although it has been marketed as smart growth, an honest examination of the project shows that One Paseo is not the type of bikeable, walkable, transit-oriented development San Diego deserves.

One Paseo will add 24,000 new car trips daily on our roads, further deterring residents from biking and walking in the community. Expanding Del Mar Heights Road to nine lanes will mean faster-moving cars and dangerous conditions for both cyclists and pedestrians. The proposed "cycletrack" will offer inadequate protection to those cycling in the area, as it will run for just a few hundred yards on one side of Del Mar Heights Road. Bike San Diego, the group working to transform San Diego into the world's best city for bicycling, has called One Paseo "bad for bicycling."

One Paseo is not planned to have nearby mass transit until 2035, if ever. It is not located near accessible and convenient mass transit options, and is not currently served by mass transit. The truth is that, as proposed, people from Carmel Valley and the surrounding neighborhoods will have to drive to One Paseo. The developer has proposed quadrupling the average daily car trips allowed for the site because this project is a car-centric development.

I'm asking you to please reject One Paseo because it isn't true "smart growth development." We need to promote smart growth in San Diego, but One Paseo perpetuates urban sprawl and congestion in a suburban neighborhood. A smaller project that does not clog our streets, aligns with transit-oriented principles, and truly promotes walking and biking options in our community should be proposed for this site.
