To the Honorable City Council:


Gentlemen:

There are thousands of young folks in this city who are under the biological necessity of expending their surplus physical and emotional energies by dancing. Saloons and other more or less respectable dives cater very profitably and exploit this necessity by furnishing dancing floors. These floors are only incidentally for the pleasure of the dancers but they give the saloonkeepers an opportunity and excuse for increasing traffic hazards by selling bad whisky and worse cocktails to those young folks.

Your body should be interested in any suggestion that promised to reduce traffic hazards and I suggest that you should devote some of your time and energy in providing dancing floors where young folks could dance without being under any obligation to a more or less respectable saloonkeeper to get drunk and increase traffic hazards.

Those twenty-eight thousand workers in this city who are looking for jobs could be put to work in carrying out this plan and it would be in the interest of social well-being and traffic safety. "Where there is a will there is a way."
