

Department Description

The San Diego Public Library System serves a population of over 1.3 million residents of the City of San Diego which encompasses an area of 342 square miles. The Library System consists of the Central Library, 35 branch libraries, and the adult literacy program (READ/San Diego). The Department serves the educational, cultural, business, and recreational needs of San Diego's diverse communities through its collection of more than 4.2 million books, including e-books and audio-visual materials, 3,888 periodical subscriptions, 1.6 million government documents, and over 291,000 books in 25 languages other than English. The library catalog and many index and full-text databases can be accessed electronically in all library facilities and via the Internet.

The Department's mission is:

To inspire lifelong learning through connections to knowledge and each other

Goals and Objectives

The following goals and objectives represent the action plan for the Department:

Goal 1: Create inspiring places that are accessible, safe, and a source of pride

Creating and maintaining facilities that are valued for their accessibility, comfort, and beauty is a high priority for the Department. The Department wants all libraries to have a welcoming environment that encourages use by all members of the community. The Department will move towards accomplishing this goal by focusing on the following objectives:

- Provide an appropriately-sized library system
- Improve library facilities and their accessibility

Goal 2: Effectively manage library collections

Having a well-managed library collection ensures that a diverse range of books and other media are readily available to patrons. The Department will move towards accomplishing this goal by focusing on the following objectives:

- Assure collection meets the needs of customers
- Improve access to library materials

Goal 3: Provide high quality library programs and services

Providing quality programs and services allows the Library to meet the various needs of its patrons. The Department will move towards accomplishing this goal by focusing on the following objectives:

- Develop and offer programs that address the needs and interests of the community
- Improve the delivery of information and reader advisory services
- Preserve total operating hours and facilities

Goal 4: Develop and sustain a thriving library system

Maintaining the necessary funding and resources is essential to the operation of a library system capable of supporting one of the largest cities in the United States. The Department will move towards accomplishing this goal by focusing on the following objectives:

- Maintain and expand external revenue sources through the San Diego Library Foundation and other sources
- Incorporate state-of-the-art technology to optimize efficiency

Goal 5: Provide a trained, skilled, and responsive workforce

Building and developing a trained and skilled workforce is essential to the success of the Department. Ensuring that its employees are trained and have access to the necessary resources the Library needs will create a higher performing organization that operates more efficiently and effectively. The Department will move towards accomplishing this goal by focusing on the following objectives:

- Create a learning organization structure for the Department
- Encourage career development and advancement

Service Efforts and Accomplishments

In Fiscal Year 2010, Library circulation reached an all time high with 7.7 million items loaned, and an additional 1.2 million items used in libraries. Over 1.6 million reference questions were answered by library staff, more than 1.7 million customers signed up to use the Internet on a library workstation, and over 1.9 million online database searches were conducted. More than 79,000 adults and 172,000 juveniles attended programs and the San Diego libraries attracted more than 6.3 million visitors overall, which exceeds the attendance at San Diego Padres and Chargers home games combined. There were also 6.1 million virtual visits through the Library website.

In March 2010 the Library reduced its overall operating hours. As a result, in Fiscal Year 2011 library use decreased from the previous year: there were 7.1 million items loaned (a 7.5 percent decrease), almost 1.4 million reference questions answered (a 12.5 percent decrease), 1.6 million Internet signups (a 3.1 percent decrease), almost 1.8 million online database searches conducted (a 5.7 percent decrease), and 5.6 million visitors (a 6.0 percent decrease). Overall library operating hours decreased by 15.4 percent.

Despite the reduced operating hours, in Fiscal Year 2011 there were significant increases in program attendance and online resources. More than 91,000 adults attended programs (a 14.9 percent increase), more than 191,000 juveniles attended programs (an 11.2 percent increase), and there were 6.3 million virtual visits through the Library website (a 2.5 percent increase).

Even though there were some decreases during these challenging economic times, the Library remains heavily used and a popular destination due to the variety of innovative and stimulating programs and services offered.

READ/San Diego

In San Diego County, approximately 450,000 adults cannot read or write well enough to cope with daily and workrelated challenges. READ/San Diego Adult Literacy Program, which serves as a model for the country, is transforming the lives of adult learners by giving them the skills and love of reading that will serve them for a lifetime. In Fiscal Year 2011, the program had 314 volunteers serving 419 adult learners, 94 families, and 99 children.

With generous support from a 2010 Qualcomm grant READ/San Diego's Families for Literacy Program (FFL) gave families in the Logan Heights, City Heights, Valencia Park and Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa communities 6,180 books.

Adult Programming

The San Diego Public Library offers a variety of stimulating and thought-provoking programs for adults. For the last five years the Library has partnered with KPBS on One Book, One San Diego which encourages residents to join others in the shared experience of reading the same book. In 2011, the One Book selection *The Gangster We Are All Looking For* by lê thi diem thúy, a young Vietnamese-American woman who grew up in the Linda Vista area, had 570 attendees at three author talks. Almost 5,800 people attended 49 other related programs, lectures, and exhibits. There were also over 1,500 books circulated.

The Library commemorated the 90th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage in the United States, which honored the long road to passage of the U.S. Constitution's Nineteenth Amendment granting rights of citizenship to women. The commemorative events included films, an exhibit, and a feminist book discussion series. In partnership with San Diego Writers, Ink, multiple award-winning British author, China Mieville, spoke about his newest urban fantasy novel, *Kraken*. The event was held in conjunction with the extremely popular International Comic-Con Convention. In honor of the Irish writer James Joyce and his monumental novel *Ulysses*, the Library and 125 participants joined in the global cultural celebration of "Bloomsday" festivities that included music, dance, film, a drama performance, and a lecture discussion. The 45th Annual Local Authors Exhibit and Reception, which showcases, celebrates, and nurtures local writers, had its largest turnout with 266 authors and 83 co-authors furnishing 320 titles reflecting the diversity of San Diego's population and equally diverse scope of interest. The featured speaker was Rae Armantrout, 2010 Pulitzer Prize Winner for Poetry, who is this year's recipient of the Local Author Literary Achievement Award (LOLA).

Employment and Career Resources

San Diego Public Library is a key source for employment and career resources. The Library's Job Start website provides links to local employment resources, job search tools, job training, links to job fairs, employment agencies, unemployment and workplace rights, career guidance information, and numerous circulating and reference books to support job seekers. The Library sponsored several job fairs including at Valencia Park/Malcolm X Branch Library, Serra Mesa/Kearny Mesa Branch Library, Mission Valley, and North University Community Branch Library. There is also a Workforce Partnership Career Center in the Serra Mesa-Kearny Branch Library and through this individual assistance and workshops are provided. In 2011, libraries throughout the City provided 888 computers as well as free wireless Internet access, both of which are increasingly important as more employers require that employment applications be submitted online.

Historical and Educational Exhibits

San Diego Public Library continued its proud tradition of bringing outstanding educational exhibits to our City. In Fiscal Year 2011 there were six exhibits including "Fantography" Baseball Photography Exhibition with fan photographs assembled by local baseball historian and author Andy Strasberg, and the "Freedom Riders" Exhibit depicting the original Freedom Riders civil rights protest group that successfully challenged segregated public facilities in the South in 1961.

Conference Exhibits and Participation

The Library participated in two major conferences in Fiscal Year 2011. The Library had a booth at the extremely popular 2010 International Comic-Con Convention, which served to remind the crowds attending of the ways that library service complements and nurtures popular culture. The Library was the host library for the 2011 American Library Association (ALA) Midwinter Conference in San Diego, which had over 10,000 participants. The Library had an exhibit booth promoting library services and featuring the new Central Library. Five ALA related events were held at the current Central Library and Valencia Park/Malcolm X Branch Library. In honor of ALA, the Central Library also held a special "MegaMonday" series of events open to the public, which was featured that day on the KUSI morning show.

Films and Documentaries

As a gathering place for people from all walks of life, the San Diego Public Library has developed a reputation as a premier location for movie lovers to come together to watch popular and cutting-edge films and documentaries. Specific highlights for Fiscal Year 2011 included nine compelling award-winning documentaries, which were part of the "Community Cinema" Series and presented free to the public in conjunction with the prestigious PBS series, Independent Lens; the screening of the 2010 Soccer World Cup South Africa qualifying and final games, which were screened at Central Library and several branches; the screening of all 20 stages of the Tour de France, the best known and most prestigious bicycle race in the world; the screening of "California of the Past" digital stories, which were followed by a question and answer session with the veterans and project partners from the Japanese American Historical Society of San Diego and Media Arts Center San Diego; and "Schlockfest" Monthly Film Series, an homage to the classic B movies from Hollywood's Golden Age.

Music Series

The San Diego Public Library has a well established music program that the community has responded to with enthusiasm and ongoing support, as evidenced by the steadily growing attendance by musicians, music lovers, music appreciation students and San Diego residents. The Library has two Concert Series, a Fall Concert Series and a Winter/Spring Concert Series, each consisting of approximately six concerts. A total of 1,805 music lovers attended the concert series in Fiscal Year 2011. The Opera Insights Series offers free preview presentations about the four productions in San Diego Opera's season. The series prepares operagoers with enjoyable, informative, and engaging sessions that integrate historical and cultural background, music analysis, plot synopsis, and CD and DVD selections.

Visual Arts Program

The Visual Arts Program is a unique, nationally recognized program of museum quality art exhibitions held in libraries that are part of the San Diego Public Library system. This program is the only endeavor in San Diego dedicated to exhibiting art created by the City's serious, mid-career, and older contemporary artists. There were five major exhibitions in Fiscal Year 2011. The prominent role that the Visual Arts Program played in the careers of two well-known artists who died in 2010, William Gambini and Beth King, was also acknowledged in their Union-Tribune obituaries.

Special Collections

Special Collections encompass many of the treasures of our community including Southern California and Baja California history, subscriptions to major newspapers, genealogy records, and a rare book collection. In 2009, the staff and volunteers in Special Collections completed an important tool for genealogy research: an index of deaths and obituaries from the San Diego Union, 1868-1915 and San Diego Herald, 1851-1860. In 2010 and 2011, the staff continue to index the San Diego Union from 1916 to 1929. PDF versions of these records are accessible in the Digital Library Collection. The Wangenheim Room Rare Book Collection also had two major exhibits in Fiscal Year 2011.

Children's Programming

The San Diego Public Library offers a wide array of services and programming for children, teens, and young adults. The Summer Reading Program, which is one of the most anticipated programs each year for youth, is designed to help students retain and build their reading skills over the summer months. In 2010, there were 5,250 juvenile programs and attendance at these events grew by 10 percent from the previous year, to 151,733 attendees. The San Diego Padres were a major sponsor of the 2010 Summer Reading Program, providing 20,000 free tickets to youngsters who met their Summer Reading goals. The San Diego Zoo was also a major sponsor, providing 16,000 free admission tickets for children and 2,000 for teens who read 10 books and 1/2 off for Day Passes for up to six family members or friends.

Other major events in Fiscal Year 2011 included Grammy Award Winning Singer Patti Austin, in partnership with the San Diego State Circle of Education Program, who performed a family-oriented sing-along concert at City Heights/Weingart Library & Performance Annex to more than 250 attendees. Nationally-Recognized Children's Author Pamela Muñoz Ryan, spoke to more than 300 fans about her new books, including her latest award winning title, *Esperanza Rising*. Each child who attending received a free copy of her book, courtesy of the publisher, Scholastic, Inc., the Friends of Logan Heights Library, and Point Loma/Hervey Library Partnership.

Special Partnerships

In Fiscal Year 2011 the San Diego Public Library strengthened community partnership to leverage resources and better serve the community. The Library partnered with Computers 2 San Diego Kids (C2SDK) to improve computer literacy and provide computers to children and families in need through participating branch libraries. Each computer is loaded with Microsoft Windows and Office Suite software and C2SDK provides free computer and software support through its partnership with the library.

The new Logan Heights Branch Library that opened in December 2009, has developed several new collaborative community partnerships in the last year to serve the needs of their predominantly Hispanic and low income community. San Diego Community College District Continuing Education provides English as a Second Language (ESL) and Citizenship Classes at the Logan Heights Branch Library. A Reason to Survive, a non-profit organization in Point Loma that caters to at risk youth, is working closely with the Logan Heights Branch Library and the Friends of the Library to provide music and art programs to youth in the Logan Heights area. University of California San Diego (UCSD) eTutorial and Mentorship Program is the first program of this type to work with the Library. The program provides online and face-to-face tutoring for students at the Logan Heights Branch Library and encourages them to go to college. San Diego Children's Choir is collaborating with the Logan Heights Branch Library to provide free uniforms, music sheets, and two music instructors for children in grades K-5. Workforce Partnership South Metro Career Center is working with the Logan Heights Branch Library to offer adults free Career Workshops such as resume and cover letter writing, job searching, and improving interview skills.

Grants

The San Diego Public Library received several grants in Fiscal Year 2011 that are stretching department resources and allowing the Library to better reach customers in selected demographics. Mobile Stories: Teen Citizen Journalists in Action is a Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) Grant for \$76,988, which will engage 60 underserved teens and young adults from diverse backgrounds to become digital reporters/citizen journalists using cell phone technology. The participants will target specific populations of underserved and at-risk youth with motivating and empowering messages to "get the word out" about the treasures offered thorough the library system. The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) Grant designated \$25,000 in federal funds to the City of San Diego for books, technology, education, and outreach programs for the Skyline Hills Branch Library. The Eureka! Leadership Program, sponsored by the California State Library in partnership with Infopeople, accepted 32 applicants from across the state to participate in a professional development initiative. Two of San Diego Public Library applicants were selected to participate and they received \$5,000 for each their projects. One project, Cuddle Up & Read, teaches parenting teens how to read to their babies, select age appropriate materials, and help foster early literacy skills in their children. The other project, Connections after 50 in the Greater Clairemont Area, provides programming and

volunteer opportunities to this target population through five participating branch libraries in the area. This project built on a previous fellowship program, "Transforming Life after 50," through the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). It also received a supplemental grant from the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) in the amount of \$15,000, which will allow for greater outreach to this age group in the Clairemont area.

Awards

The San Diego Public Library has been recognized through the years for its outstanding services, programs and leadership. In Fiscal Year 2011, the new Logan Heights Branch Library received the Best of 2010 Construction Award by the California Construction News in the Cultural Category. The West Coast Drawing named the San Diego Public Library Visual Arts Curator as the recipient of its 2010 Platinum Pencil Award for his contribution to promoting the art of drawing in the region. READ/San Diego – Families for Literacy Program won a \$10,000 National Better World Books/NCFL Libraries and Families Award. Logan Heights Branch Library Teens "Project Unknown" Team won 2nd runner up (third place) and \$1,000 in the highly competitive American Library Association Teen Video Contest. The Special Collections Librarian won the Historical Resources Board History Award of Excellence for the creation of the Union-Tribune's "The Way We Were" weekly column detailing the history of the San Diego Family Magazine awarded Mission Valley Branch Library and Scripps Miramar Ranch Branch Library Best Children's Libraries, based on reader votes for their favorite things to do, places to go, and local hotspots in San Diego.

Library Facility Projects

In Fiscal Year 2011 there have been three branch library refurbishment projects that have upgraded facilities, so that they can better serve their communities. Lloyd and Caroline de Llamas donated \$35,000 to the San Ysidro Branch Library for additional computers and furnishings. Allied Gardens/Benjamin and Mira Mesa Branch Libraries both received new reader lounge chairs.

In an historic decision on June 28, 2010, the City Council approved construction of the New Central Library located downtown at 11th Avenue and J Street, one block east of PETCO Park. On July 28, 2010 the project broke ground and construction is progressing on schedule, with the opening scheduled for July 2013. As a prime community gathering place and a technologically advanced center for learning and literacy, the new Central Library will embody San Diego's commitment to the future.

Technology

Use of technology continues to contribute to the Library's ability to meet the increased demands of the public and improve efficiencies. In 2011, 1.6 million customers signed up to use the Internet and almost 1.8 million database searches were conducted in the library's 80 plus databases.

The library continues to expand its e-Collection of downloadable media. In partnership with OverDrive®, the Library's online collection includes over 150 eVideos in categories including animation and cartoons, children's, comedy, documentary, drama, feature, foreign, horror, instructional, and travel. The Library has more than 700 titles in the Library's eBook collection thanks to a \$10,000 donation from Sony Electronics, Inc. Sony also donated 17 eReaders that are being circulated at five participating San Diego Public Library locations.

Online Payment of Library Fines and Fees, a new feature that streamlines the bill paying process, was added in Fiscal Year 2011. It gives patrons a new self-service option that allows them to manage their account 24 hours per day and seven days per week. With their library card and PIN (personal identification number), patrons can now view their library bills and make payments in just a few quick clicks from home or from the Library's Internet stations. Payments can be made with MasterCard and Visa credit cards, and debit cards displaying the MasterCard or Visa symbol.

Volunteers

The Library has a long history of using volunteers to leverage limited resources and the volunteers are an integral part of the library's operations. Dedicated volunteers help free library staff members to provide direct service to library patrons. The volunteers play crucial roles as literacy tutors, computer lab assistants, storytime readers, docents, book shelvers, homework assistants, arts and crafts instructors, library gifts processors, display coordinators, book detailers, general program assistants, and more. In Fiscal Year 2011 there were 2,530 volunteers who donated 116,792 hours of service to the Central Library, branch libraries, and the READ/San Diego Literacy Program with a total value of \$2.5 million to the City. At the time of publication, the volunteer hours for Library Boards, Commissions, and Councils were not yet available. Adding these hours would make the value to the City substantially higher.

Community

As a community hub for literacy, education, and culture, the San Diego Public Library connects this diverse community to a vast array of free resources that enrich the lives of visitors and residents alike. Especially during these challenging economic times, the community recognizes the great value of their libraries and the staff that that deliver these services; in the last customer survey the Library received a 92 percent satisfaction rating with staff's delivery of customer service in the last customer survey. Regardless of the challenges ahead, the Library will continue to offer quality and essential services with as much efficiency and effectiveness as possible.
