Goals of Realignment:


- Improve supervision services to wards and their families;


The Rationale for Change

Present Supervision Practices

- The Probation Department's commitment to Evidence Based Practices (EBP) initiated moving to realigning caseloads and subsequently implementing a Risk Based Supervision Model.
 - Working Definition of EBP in a nutshell is simply:


Creation or utilizing of programs that are researched based and proven to be effective in achieving desired outcomes.

- The Probation Department has long engaged in best practices principles and EBP approaches. This experience was translated to the Supervision Division, which supervises the majority of juveniles on probation.
 - The Supervision Division has moved to a Risk Based Supervision Model.
 - The model is based on a research based assessment tool known as the San Diego Regional Resiliency Checklist (SDRRC). The delinquency domain factor has been validated to best predict a juvenile's risk to recidivate.
 - Juveniles are now supervised in three levels of supervision (Regular Level, Mid Level & Compliance as formerly compared to two levels).


The Results

- Caseload sizes have fallen and become manageable.
- Officers are more effective in delivering services in accordance with our mission and vision. Officers are better equipped and empowered to provide a wide array of services noted below:
 - Referrals to community agencies
 - Educational Referrals & Monitoring
 - Substance Abuse Services
 - Mental Health Services
 - Mentoring Services
 - Work Readiness Services
- Probation contacts in the community are increasing.
- Supervisory staff are better positioned to insure quality assurance.
- Youth and their families are the beneficiaries of our increased efforts towards continuous improvement.

Future Supervision Goals

- Juvenile Field Services looks to continue and enhance successful partnerships with local law enforcement agencies.
 - Future Goals include increasing:
 - Curfew Operations with San Diego Police Department and other local agencies
 - Truancy Operations
 - Warrant Pick-Ups
 - Fourth Waiver Searches
- Explore grant or new funding opportunities and/or support law enforcement efforts to address gang suppression efforts.
- Continued commitment to educate officers about organizations that work with youth and parents to prevent gang involvement work with those juveniles who have committed themselves to a gang lifestyle.
 - Partner with new and established community based agencies.
 - Partner with the faith based community especially those with a social or community outreach focus.
 - Focus on school attendance and grade advancement through our partnerships with local school districts
 - Search out work readiness or job opportunities for working age juveniles.

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
