**CITY REACHES MID-POINT
OF HISTORIC STREETS REPAVING PROJECT**

Workers will repave 59 more miles by end of FY '12

Mayor Jerry Sanders announced today that the city has reached the mid-way point of its historic street repaving project and is scheduled to perform a complete makeover of 59 miles of streets before the end of the fiscal year.

“Keeping streets in good condition is one of the most basic functions of city government,” the mayor said. “I’m proud of all the people who have been working so hard this past year to make sure San Diego drivers have as smooth a ride as possible.”

The city already has resurfaced roughly 53 miles of city streets with asphalt overlay as part of the massive project, which began in April 2010 and is funded with \$47 million in deferred-maintenance bond money.

By the time the project is finished, the city will have repaved more than 1,000 city blocks. The size and scope make this possibly the most comprehensive street-resurfacing project in city history. The city will have resurfaced nearly as many miles of streets as it did in the previous eight fiscal years combined.
