Why was our office created?



- Financial and other problems within the City led voters to approve Prop F in 2004:
- Beginning in January 2006, the City switched from City Manager form of government to Strong Mayor -Strong Council for a five-year trial period.
- The City Council was also given authority to create our Office.
- Voters passed Proposition C in June 2008 which made both the form of government and our office permanent.

Difference in Forms of City Government

City Manager - The City Manager implements City policies and runs day to day operations and the Mayor sits on Council with other Council members, setting policy direction.

Strong Mayor-Strong
Council - The Mayor is
now the Chief
Executive of the City,
similar to the President
or the Governor.

Council is the legislative body providing checks and balances to the Mayor's authority.

Difference in Forms of City Government

Mayor-Council

Mayor Elected Position

In a strong-mayor variation, the mayor holds almost all administrative authority. The council and public have limited oversight. New York City uses this variation, as do most major US cities.

Council Member Elected Position

In a strong-council variation, the council holds almost all the administrative authority, leaving only ceremonial duties to the mayor. This variation is most common in small towns.

Council-Manager

Mayor Elected Position

The mayor typically serves as chairman of the council, serving a largely ceremonial role.

Council Member Elected Position


There are usually multiple council members elected. The number and distribution depends on the city.

City Manager Hired Position


City managers are appointed or hired by the council to implement municipal policy and sometimes supervise city government.

Why our office's role is important...

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It is important to have checks and balances between the Executive Branch (Mayor) and the Legislative Branch (City Council).

- ♣ To help ensure the City Council is coequal to the Mayor, Council needs its own executive-level position to:
 - serve as independent advisor on proposals from the Mayor, and
 - raise issues and propose oversight processes.

Our Mission...



To provide <u>clear</u>, <u>objective</u> and <u>unbiased</u> analysis and advice to the City Council and the public on important financial and policy issues.

➤ In order for us to provide clear, objective, and unbiased analysis and advice, we have to be <u>independent</u>.

What makes us independent.

- Independent from Mayor by definition of position.
- Independent from Council as a result of establishing ground rules and protocols.
- Function independently of Council on a day-today basis.
- City Council and its Committees may direct which topics to address, but they do not tell the IBA what to recommend or what position to take.

What makes us independent.

- We rely on objective research and analysis to support our conclusions and recommendations.
- We do not discuss positions or reports with Council Members as they are developed—Council sees our reports at the same time as the public.
- Recommendations may not match Council Members' positions.

Even if individual Council members may not agree with our position, the City Council as a whole is relying on our office to objective and unbiased, so they respect our objectivity and independence.



About the IBA...




- The IBA is not elected, but appointed by the City Council and can only be removed by a majority vote of Council.
- **4** The IBA:
 - manages and leads the direction of our office, and
 - hires all staff in our office.

What we do...



Each analyst in our office has responsibility to monitor certain departments and issues. We review analyze, develop reports, and present on:



- Annual budget
- Financial reports
- Budget monitoring reports
- Legislative items (going to Committee or full Council)
- Proactive reports on issues we believe are important and deserve attention






Informing the public...
