Branch Library Unveils Creative Education Space for Kids and Families

San Diego – Mayor Jerry Sanders was on hand at the Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa Branch Library (District Six) to cut the ribbon at San Diego’s newest learning and education space. Young students from Soille San Diego Hebrew Day School were among the first to run, jump, play...and learn at “Fairy Tail Mesa,” an innovative education space created especially for children 5 and younger and their families.

“This unique partnership between the City Commission for Arts and Culture, the First 5 Commission of San Diego and the San Diego Public Library has brought this very special place to life for San Diego families,” explained Mayor Jerry Sanders. “It is just the kind of collaborative project the City looks for to leverage limited resources and develop long lasting, creative solutions for our community.”

Fairy Tail Mesa, created by artists Kipp Kobayashi and Noel Karten in collaboration with child development expert Donna Beveridge, is a place where children can learn through art, exploration and play. The education space takes its cue from the natural environment of the mesa as well as the proximity to the airport and vernal pools.

“We are very pleased with the results of this project,” said Supervisor Ron Roberts from the County of San Diego Board of Supervisors. “Children learn by exploring their environment. It was a natural fit to pair libraries with this interactive and educational space for kids.”

The First 5 Commission of San Diego provided the funding for this worthwhile project. “This preschool area will have a lasting benefit for the young children of San Diego County,” stated Nick Macchione, First 5 San Diego Commissioner.

“This children’s learning place will enhance the already distinctive design and appeal of the Serra Mesa-Kearny Mesa Branch that opened in December 2006,” said District 6 Councilmember Donna Frye. “It is exciting to know that Fairy Tail Mesa will be part of this new generation’s childhood memories of their community library.”
