Cheryl Parry Art Exhibition "The Cloths of Heaven" Looks at Little Known Chapter of Irish History *Free Exhibition will be on Display Nov. 19 through Feb. 28 at Mission Valley Branch Library*

SAN DIEGO – The Visual Arts Program of the San Diego Public Library will present "Cheryl Parry – The Cloths of Heaven," an installation with paintings, video and performance art at the Mission Valley Branch Library from Nov. 19, 2006, through Feb. 28, 2007. The exhibition is free and open to the public and will include a special program on opening day.

"The Cloths of Heaven" is the culmination of artist Cheryl Parry's four-year exploration of one of the most shocking and, until recently, hidden chapters in the history of the Catholic Church in Ireland. Between 1850 and 1996, 30,000 girls and women fell victim to the excessively puritanical, Church-dominated mores of the times. Judged unfit to live in Irish society for infractions as minor as being too pretty or flirtatious, they were banished to the convent-run Magdalene Laundries where many of them endured a lifetime of isolation, enslavement and suffering. Many Magdalens who were unwed mothers were forced to give up their children up for adoption to Irish Catholic families in the United States. The discovery of the unmarked graves of 133 women on the convent grounds at the Magdalene Laundry in Dublin in the mid-1990s inspired wide-spread outrage and focused attention on this little-known period in Irish history.

Parry's exhibition re-interprets Irish poet W.B. Yeats' love poem, "The Cloths of Heaven," in the context of the Magdalene Laundries and includes oil paintings of faces and cloth, a video by the artist, and a performance art/dance developed with choreographer Patricia Maldonado and musician Robert Edwards. An artist's reception will be held Sunday, Nov. 19 from 1 to 4 p.m. As part of the event, the 15-minute video will be shown at 1:30 and 2:45 p.m. In addition, the performance art/dance will be conducted at 2 and 3:15 p.m. Like the exhibition, these programs are free and open to the public.
