General Goals of Proposed Map:

1. To comply with the San Diego City Charter, the Voting Rights Act and Constitutional requirements.
2. To fairly protect the rights of all the people of the City of San Diego.
3. Have equal populations in each District of 144,624 people. This proposed map has a small population deviation of about 1.5%.
4. Create Compact and Contiguous Districts.
5. Use Natural boundaries, such as freeways, highways, major roads, canyons, and mountains to divide Districts.
6. Keep communities of interest together based on public testimony, the San Diego Neighborhood Map, San Diego Planning Districts, geography, common interests, and knowledge of the City.
7. While race and ethnicity was not the predominate reason for where Districts were drawn, the proposed map was reviewed to ensure that racial and ethnic groups were treated fairly.

Factors Considered in Drawing Specific Districts

District 1:

1. Keeps the similar Coast and Canyon communities together.
2. Keeps North and South University City together.
3. Keeps La Jolla and University City together.
4. Common Community interests include UCSD, high tech business community, Pacific Ocean influence and beaches.
5. Natural boundaries include 805 Fwy, Hwy 52, Rancho Peñasquitos Canyon and Mount Soledad.
6. Population: 144,564. Deviation: -56 people, or - 0.04%.

District 2:

1. Brings together the beach communities with common interest such as Point Loma, Ocean Beach, Mission Beach and Pacific Beach.
2. Common interests include the Pacific Ocean, beaches, San Diego Bay, Mission Bay, San Diego International Airport - Lindberg Field, environmental issues, and Tecolote Canyon Natural Park.
3. Included the surrounding neighborhoods of Bay Ho, Bay Park and Morena that look down on Mission Bay.
4. Includes Old Town, Midway District and the Juan Hill/Presidio Park section of Mission Hills which are impacted by San Diego Bay and Lindberg Field.
5. Population: 144,968. Deviation: 344 people, or 0.24%.

District 3:

1. Major Common Interest in Balboa Park.
2. Unites the older communities of character which surround Balboa Park, including Hillcrest, Downtown, North Park, South Park and Golden Hills.
3. Natural Boundaries include Interstate 8, 805 and 15 freeways, the 94 Fwy.
4. Respects the LGBT Community.
5. Population: 145,091. Deviation 467 people, or 0.32%.

District 4:

1. Largely respects the lines of current District 4, with adjustments to reduce the population consistent with the creation of a 9th District.
2. Attempts to keep the African-American community together with a 19.32% African-American population, which is consistent with the previous percentages.
3. The District also celebrates the diversity of San Diego with significant Hispanic and Asian populations.
4. Adds the community of Southcrest with directly adjoins the communities of Mount Hope and Mountain View.
5. Natural Boundaries include the San Diego City limits, 15 Fwy and 94 Fwy.
6. Population: 144,750. Deviation 126 people, or 0.09%.

District 5:

1. Attempts to keep the Poway Unified School District Communities of Rancho Peñasquitos, Rancho Bernardo, Carmel Mountain Ranch, Sabre Springs and Torrey Highlands together.
2. Common interests including the Wildland Urban Interface High Five Hazard Zone, Palomar Pomerado Health District and Penasquitos Canyon.
3. Reunites the Rancho Encantada neighborhood with Scripps Ranch.
4. Natural Boundaries include 15 Fwy, Miramar Air Station, City borders and Hwy 56.
5. Population 145,255. Deviation 631 people, or 0.44%.

District 6:

1. Unites the center San Diego City communities north of Interstate 8.
2. Common interests include the Interstate 8 corridor, traffic, noise and pollution concerns and the San Diego River Basin.
3. Keeps the communities of Allied Gardens, San Carlos, Lake Murray and Del Cerro together.
4. Keeps Linda Vista, Serra Mesa and Clairemont Mesa West and East together.
5. Natural Boundaries include Mission Trails Regional Park, Interstate 8 and Tecolote Canyon Natural Park.
6. Population 144,551. Deviation -73 people or -0.05%.

District 7:


1. Creates a rich and diverse District by reuniting the City Heights Communities, such as Cherokee Point, Corridor, Castle, Fairmont Village, Teralta West and Teralta East.
2. Joins City Heights with the geographically adjacent neighborhoods of Kensington, Talmage, College West and College East.
3. Common Interests include education, cultural ties and San Diego State University.
4. Creates a diverse District with a large Hispanic population as well as significant African-American and Asian populations.
5. Natural Boundaries include Interstate 8, 15 Fwy, 805 Fwy, 94 Fwy, and El Cajon Blvd.
6. Population 143,061. Deviation: -1,563 people, or -1.08%.

District 8:

1. Keeps the South Bay communities of San Ysidro, Otay Mesa, Tijuana River Valley, Nestor and Ocean Crest together.
2. Joins the South Bay with the Historic Barrio District including the communities of Barrio Logan, Sherman Heights, Logan Heights, Grant Hill, Stockton and Shelltown.
3. Respects the current District 8's common interests and cultural ties and continues District 8 as a District with a majority Hispanic community.
4. Natural Boundaries include 15 Fwy, 94 Fwy and natural city boundaries in the South Bay.
5. Population 144,830. Deviation: 206 people, or 0.14%.

District 9:

1. Unites the Center City North communities surrounding Miramar Marine Corps Air Station.
2. Keeps Mira Mesa and Sorrento Mesa together. Also, joins these communities with the Kearny Mesa.
3. Respect Tierrasanta communities common interests and request to join with Kearny Mesa.
4. Joins North Clairemont with Kearny Mesa with common interests, such as Hickman Field.
5. Common Interests included Miramar Marine Corps Air Station, Mission Trails Regional Park, Rancho Penasquitos Canyon and Hickman Field.
6. Natural Boundaries include 15 Fwy, 805 Fwy, Rancho Penasquitos Canyon, Mission Trails Regional Park, Balboa and Genesee Avenues.
7. District has a significant Asian population.
8. Population 144,543. Deviation: -81 people, or -0.06%.
