What's the latest? Why the increases?

- Increased cost to buy water from our suppliers
 - MWD and CWA already approved rate hikes
- New desalinated water supply coming online
 - Higher costs to pay for water effective January 2016
- Investments to create new local water supply
 - Pure Water San Diego
- Repair and replace aging infrastructure
 - Replace 35 miles of aging pipeline every year
- Credit worthiness
 - Retain good credit to reduce borrowing costs



- 1.) Reliance on Purchased Water
- San Diego purchases between 85-90% of the water our customers use
 - Owns and operates nine local reservoirs low water supply levels
- Metropolitan Water District (MWD) and San Diego County Water Authority (CWA) price increases:
 - Imported water costs
 - Desalination

2.) Desalination & Pure Water - New Water Resources

- Carlsbad Desalination Plant completion (regional)
- The City's Pure Water Program is a phased, multi-year program that:
 - Uses proven technology to produce a safe, sustainable and high quality water supply
 - Is drought-proof and locally-controlled to significantly improve our water reliability

Conduct Review of Funds

The County Water Authority (CWA) Rate Increase that must be passed through to the City is projected to be 2.5% in 2017 and 2018, and 3.0% in 2019. The City will only pass through to its customers the actual CWA pass through rate increase impact between 2.5% and 7%. The CWA pass through will not exceed 7% annually through 2019.

Use of \$32M from the Rate Stabilization Reserve (January 2016).

Impact of No Rate Increases

Impact to our operations

- Reduction in infrastructure maintenance and repair
- Inability to purchase water to deliver to customers
- No funding to develop water supply reliability
- Not meeting the required debt coverage
 - Ineligible for grants and loans
 - Inability to obtain financing
 - Default on the existing debt
 - The bond holder could **force** a rate increase
 - Demand full **payment** of debt



Proposition 218 – Notice of Public Hearing

- Every customer will be mailed a Notice of Public Hearing
- Detailed information about the proposed rate adjustment
- Includes protest instructions

Proposition 218 – Know Your Rights

- California Constitution prohibits implementing the new rates if a majority of the affected property owners file written protests opposing the rates
- Each protest must identify the affected property and include an authorized signature
- California law permits only written protests
 - No email or faxed protests

July 20, 2015	Independent Rates Oversight Committee Approval on Potable Rates Proposal
July 2015	Stakeholder Outreach
August 5, 2015	Environment Committee
September 15, 2015	Council set public hearing
September 2015	Mail public notices
September - November	Community and Stakeholder Outreach
November 17, 2015	Public Hearing at City Council
January 1, 2016	Rate increase effective if adopted



Next Steps

- Mail the Notice of Public Hearing to all customers:
 - Potable water base fee and commodity charge
 - Recycled water
 - Protest opportunity
- City Council Hearing on November 17
 - Receive public testimony
 - Certify ballot count
 - Deliberate on rate proposal
