Call to Order

- 1. Ms. Valerie Brown called the meeting to order at 10:02 am. Ms. Brown requested each board member announce their participation in the meeting. 6 board members announced their presence and a quorum was achieved at the same time.

- 4. Staff announcements:
 - Mr. Alarcon announced the Fair Housing conference will go virtual and will be held as a webinar on May, 19 from 1 pm 4 pm. The Keynote speaker was Lisa Rice, the president and CEO of the National Fair Housing Alliance. (The webinar can viewed by clicking <u>here</u>.)
 - b. Mr. Alarcon also announced that the Nonprofit Academy, which is sponsored by the City of San Diego, will hold their annual Academy on June 10 virtually as well. (The virtual City of San Diego Nonprofit Academy sessions can be viewed by clicking <u>here</u>.)
 - c. Ms. Angela Nazareno Clark and Ms. Christina Bibler gave the CPAB an update on how the Economic Development Department is administering the Small Business Relief Fund (SBRF). The SBRF, which is funded partially by CDBG funding, is providing small loans and grants (up to \$10,000) to small businesses affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. Clark also announced the addition of Monica Hardman as the new Assistant Deputy Director to the Community Development Division. Ms. Hardman was previously with the City of Dallas and the Department is pleased to have her join the team.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the CARES Act, the City of San Diego received additional CDBG-CV, ESG-CV and HOPWA-CV funding. This required an amendment to previously approved documents to adhere to the new guidelines for the CARES Act funding.

Comments and/or questions from the CPAB:

Ms. Sara Berns asked of the \$284 million the City received from the CARES Act, how much was going to CDBG. Ms. Marano responded that there we different sources of funds for allocations to the City under the CARES Act and that \$7 million was for CDBG. Ms. Berns also asked how can the nonprofit organizations apply for the additional funding. Ms. Marano stated that staff is still planning on how to release the funds and that a new Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) may be released.

Ms. Eileen Gonzales asked what would determine the qualifications to submit a proposal related to the CARES Act funding. Ms. Marano reiterated that staff is still in the planning phase of how to disburse the funds, but all activities would have to be directly tied to services related to the prevention, preparation for, or response to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Mr. Rich Thesing stated that he was uncomfortable in approving the \$1 million dollars for operations to the Navigation Center in Public Services. Mr. Thesing stated that the CPAB has asked for more information on the operations of the Navigation Center in the past but it was not provided.

Ms. Brown asked for a motion, Mr. Thesing motioned to approve the requested actions with the exception of not allocating \$1 million of CDBG funding to the Navigation Center, allocating \$1 million of CARES Act funding to the Navigation Center in the FY 21 Annual Action Plan and funding additional FY 21 Public Service projects with the \$1 million of CDBG entitlement funding. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dennehy. 6 members voted yes on the motion, motion passed unanimously.

Adjournment
Ms. Brown adjourned the meeting at 11:05 am.

- Lists eligible activities in response to COVID-19



Substantial Amendment | FY 2020 – FY 2024 Consolidated Plan

- Incorporates CBDG-CV, ESG-CV and HOPWA-CV funds
- Confirms the County as the HOPWA Alternative Grantee starting in FY 2021
- Updates the FY 2021 budgetary priorities to incorporate regulatory waivers from the CARES Act
 - Suspension of 15% Public Services Cap for CDBG

FY 2021 Emergency Solutions Grant

- ESG Proposed Activities
 - Interim Shelter Operations
 - Three shelters Operated by nonprofit organizations
 - Provide safe and low-barrier interim housing; stabilization and supportive services
 - Basic needs: beds and residential furnishings, meals, access to showers and restrooms, laundry facilities, belongings storage
 - Rapid Rehousing
 - Permanent housing for households experiencing homelessness
 - Security deposits; utility deposits and arrears; rental and utility assistance for up to 24 months
