Planning Continues for Balboa Park's 2015 Centennial Celebration

Councilmember Todd Gloria recently provided the latest update on the centennial celebration of the 1915 Panama-California Exposition, which will be recognized in Balboa Park in 2015.

A committee established and funded by the San Diego Tourism Marketing District (TMD) to kick-start the planning process for a centennial celebration of the 1915 Exposition has delivered its findings and recommendations. The document, titled "Planning Framework, 2010-2015" was presented to the Board of Directors of the Tourism Marketing District at its regular monthly meeting on Friday, November 19 at the Bahia Hotel.

"This document represents the critical next step necessary in planning for a 2015 celebration of the 1915 Exposition in Balboa Park," said

Lorin Stewart, executive director of the San Diego Tourism Marketing District. "This is a road map for those who will take up the task of actually planning the Celebration. It provides a clear mission, guiding principles, and specific objectives for the work that will come next."

The stated intent of the document is to provide a logical and integrated path to achieve the mission of the 2015 Centennial Celebration, and should serve *as a blueprint* for organizing the 2015 event. The Planning Framework is the result of the work of the TMD Steering

Committee for the 2015 Centennial Celebration and was funded by a \$50,000 grant from the TMD. The Steering Committee commissioned a study, conducted over the summer of 2010. The study attempted to amalgamate nearly a decade of ideas, opinions and documents addressing a long-anticipated centennial event in Balboa Park to celebrate the milestone 1915 Exposition: the event that many say put San Diego on the world map.

The final document is based on over 40, one-on-one interviews with Balboa Park stakeholders that "sought to capture aspirations, perceptions, ideas, concerns, challenges, and products, as well as planning, organizational and institutional histories relevant to 2015," as defined in methodology outlined in the document. San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders and City Councilmember Gloria were interviewed along

The original sign, which was created in 1952 by the San Diego Neon Sign Company, was taken down in 2008 because of electrical and other maintenance problems. The new sign was paid for by private donations and a \$40,000 grant from Supervisor Roberts.

The Kensington-Talmadge Community Association Board, particularly Harold Koenig, spearheaded the restoration and reestablishment of the sign.



with numerous other stakeholders who provided a broad representation of park organizations, institutions and tenants, as well as individuals involved in local government, the tourism industry, local philanthropic organizations, community groups, and local media.

"I sincerely appreciate the approach the TMD Steering Committee has taken relative to delivering an exciting event focused on Balboa Park," said Mike McDowell, a member of the committee and CEO of the San Diego Lodging Industry Association. "While the vision for 2015 includes a festival atmosphere that will appeal to locals, we were reminded that the original

Exposition in 1915 was to spur economic growth and we believe that to be a very worthy goal for this centennial event."

The study recommends several immediate next steps in order to meet the timeline necessary for a 2015 event. These next steps include identifying an Executive Director, establishing a Host Committee, securing preliminary funding significant enough to begin serious planning, and negotiating of an operating agreement (Memorandum of Understanding) with the City.

Additional specific findings and recommendations included in the Planning Framework:

• The formation of a separate not-for-profit corporation to serve as a Host Committee;

• The duration of the event should be one year, from December 31, 2014, through December 31, 2015;

- The financing should be 66% contributed (philanthropic, sponsorship) revenue, and 34% earned income;
- The core programming will be the principal responsibility of the Balboa Park cultural institutions;
- The geographic focus of the event(s) will be Balboa Park with selected other regional venues;

• The development and implementation of a comprehensive circulation, parking, bicycle/pedestrian access plan; That the visitor experience be "awesome."

The San Diego Tourism Marketing District is a nonprofit mutual benefit corporation dedicated to improving tourism and hotel room night consumption in the City of San Diego. The specific purpose of this private, non-profit corporation is to create a positive economic, fiscal, and employment impact on the lodging businesses in the City of San Diego through the effective and judicious allocation of its revenue and resources to measurably successful tourism promotion, marketing and advertising programs.

City of San Diego Secures Funding to Complete Home Avenue Park

On November 17, San Diego City Councilmember Todd Gloria proudly announced that the long-awaited Home Avenue Neighborhood Park will soon be complete thanks to a \$2,800,150 State grant to the City of San Diego.

"Mid-City neighbors will soon have a new park," said Councilmember Gloria. "I am grateful to the community for its dedication to this project, to City staff for its hard work securing the funds, and to the State for recognizing the benefit that will be provided by Home Avenue Neighborhood Park."

Councilmember Tony Young stated, "Despite the economic hardships this City is facing, I am very proud and pleased that we can continue to provide needed parks and recreational opportunities for families and communities in Districts like Councilman Gloria's and mine. This park serves both Districts that have long been deprived of new parks and recreational facilities." The approximately six acre site is in the parkdeficient community of City Heights and includes a portion of Auburn Creek, which is part of the Chollas Creek system. It will serve the neighborhoods of Council Districts 3 and 4 with two acres of park amenities like a comfort station, children's play area, off-leash dog area, half-court basketball area and an open lawn. The project will also include restoration of the degraded Auburn Creek habitat. Street safety improvements are also planned, and the Redevelopment Agency's City Heights Project Area Committee has recommended \$500,000 to fund them.

The park was designed using City funds, and the environmental review process has begun. The City of San Diego applied for State Proposition 84 funds to construct the park. The statewide park grant program was intensely competitive. Home Avenue Park was one of the 62 selected for funding from a pool of almost 500 applicants. The City will need to complete construction 24-30 months from the funding date. Maintenance costs of approximately \$24,011 would be requested in future City budgets based on the park's estimated completion date of Fiscal Year 2014.

Traffic Improvements Completed Throughout District Three



An all-way stop sign was installed at Wilson Ave. and Landis St.

No Left Turn and U-Turn sign was installed facing westbound traffic on Park Blvd. at Howard. Golf Course guide signs were

installed facing northbound and southbound traffic at Pershing Dr. and Florida Dr.

- A sign stating For Balboa Golf Course, Use Pershing Drive was installed near Pershing Dr., 28th St., and Upas St.
- A Not a Through Street sign was replaced with a No Outlet sign in Golden Hill.
- Signs noting parking restrictions on school days were replaced on Redwood St. and Felton St. near McKinley Elementary School.
- A two-hour parking sign was installed in the 2900 block of Lincoln Ave.
- A No Outlet sign was installed facing westbound traffic on Nutmeg St. at Boundary St.
- A Dead End sign was installed on Kew Terrace at Nutmeg St.

"It is appropriate that it be selected as the first Garden of the Month to help fulfill its mission to raise awareness of water-efficient landscaping options."

More Water News: Learn More about Rebates and Winter Rules

Winter Watering Rules Now in Effect

Under the City's mandatory water-savings rules, residents can water their lawns only seven minutes per watering station from November 1 to May 31, with certain exceptions for owners of water-efficient sprinkler systems.

- Residents can water their lawns before 10 a.m. and after 4 p.m.
- The number of days residents can water their lawns per week remains at three.
- Homes with odd-numbered addresses can water Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays.
- Homes with even-numbered addresses can water Saturdays, Mondays and Wednesdays.
- Apartments, condos and businesses can water Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

- Sustainable Landscape Turf replacement Rebates: \$1.25 or \$1.50 / sq. ft. up to \$2000 (front yard only)

Infrastructure Improvements

City of San Diego Recycling Rate Increases to Record 66 Percent City Now Accepting More Plastics in the Blue Recycling Bins

The City of San Diego celebrated America Recycles Day, November 15, by announcing two recycling milestones: the waste diversion rate reached a record 66 percent and San Diegans could immediately begin recycling additional plastics.

"San Diegans understand the importance of recycling," said Councilmember Todd Gloria. "I share their excitement that we are now able to recycle even more."

The 66 percent diversion rate, calculated by the Environmental Services Department, is the City's highest achievement to date. The previous best rate was 64 percent in 2008.

This increase is due in large part to the City Recycling and Construction & Demolition (C&D) ordinances that took effect in 2008. The ordinances aim to reduce recyclables from entering landfills to meet California recycling mandates and to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Along with this new record recycling rate, the Cty's curbside recycling program is expanding to accept new and additional types of plastics.

City residents can now recycle most plastic food containers and non-food plastics.

Recycling markets are continually developing and the markets for these additional plastics have now matured to the point that we can add them to the city's curbside recycling program.

The service expansion is in addition to the plastic bottles, jugs and jars already accepted in the blue recycling cart.

New acceptable plastic food packaging containers include round yogurt and dairy tubs, clear PET #1 clamshell plastic, drink cups, deli trays, and berry baskets. All containers must be clean and contain no food waste or trash.

New acceptable non-food plastics include plant pots and garden trays, along with rigid plastics such as buckets, toys, and containersthat held non-hazardous household products such as detergent or pet litter.

Other non-food plastics include large items such as plastic crates, totes, laundry baskets, pallets, and lawn furniture. These types of items must usually be broken down to fit into the blue recycling carts. If they are jammed into the carts or protruding out of the carts, the recycling truck may not be able to empty residences' recycling cart.

Plastic containers that held toxic materials such as motor oil, antifreeze, pesticides, solvents, chemicals, etc. are not recyclable. If the containers are empty, place in the trash. If the containers are not empty, call 858-694-7000 for safe disposal options for hazardous wastes.

Plastics not accepted for recycling:

- · Compostable plastics (usually have the letters "PLA" stamped on them)
- Plastic utensils
- Plastic film or bags
- · Hazardous materials containers
 - Styrofoam products, such as egg containers or packaging material (foam peanuts)
