#### Most Interesting Person in District 8

This month's most interesting person in District 8 is Matt Jones. Matt is the General Manager of Innovative Cold Storage Enterprises' Otay Mesa Warehouse, a facility standing at 130,000+ sq ft while maintaining storage at zero degree temperatures. The warehouse's sheer efficiency measures have earned it the LEED certification it holds today.

Matt recently led Councilmember Alvarez in a tour of the facility, taking him aloft in an electric forklift which recharges its own batteries as it glides down the 5 story warehouse, explaining how their water system collects, stores, and reuses rainwater. Also, 73% of forced energy is produced with a one megawatt solar roof system, and ten one-kilowatt wind turbines. Councilmember Alvarez was impressed both by Matt and the facility, and its excited that District 8 has such innovating new business.

### San Ysidro Port of Entry

This border crossing is the busiest land port in the world

Daily, more than 50,000 vehicles and 25,000 pedestrians make the northbound crossing. Delays can easily be two hours or more during peak times. In 2007, SAN-DAG estimated that our economy lost \$7.2 billion and 62,000 jobs due to the delays in inspections.

On February 24, Councilmember David Alvarez joined leaders from both sides of the border at the groundbreaking for Phase 1 of the San Ysidro Port of Entry Expansion Project. Total project cost is estimated to be \$577 million over three phases.

Phase 1 will provide 34 northbound vehicle lanes with 64 inspections booths, and 20 northbound pedestrian lanes at a cost of \$292 million. Going forward, Councilmember Alvarez is working closely with the federal government to secure funding for Phases 2, and 3 and to make sure the public is kept informed as the project progresses.
