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CITY OF SAN DIEGO COMPLETES CONSERVATION WORK ON THE PUBLIC ARTWORK JOURNEY TO AZTLÁN BY THE ARTISTS EINAR AND JAMEX DE LA TORRE

San Diego, CA— The City of San Diego through the Commission for Arts and Culture (Commission) recently completed the conservation of a local City-owned mural titled *Journey to Aztlán*. Created by contemporary Mexican American artists Einar and Jamex de la Torre, the mural is located on the north and south retaining walls along Harbor Drive in front of the Convention Center in downtown San Diego.

In 2000, the de la Torres completed the mural which pictorially illustrates a surreal dreamscape composed of six colors, studded with mirrored glass masks adapted from the enigmatic grinning and laughing masks of the Pre-Columbian Veracruz period.

The Commission contracted with ConservArt Associates, Inc. and the artists to restore and stabilize the mural. The main objective of the treatment was to prevent further deterioration of the mural and achieve an overall integrated visual restoration. "After stabilization and cleaning, the mural is more radiant and one can see details, which were unrevealed before," said Victoria L. Hamilton, Executive Director of the Commission.

"We are so grateful to the Commission and National Endowment for the Arts for supporting this project," said Jamex de la Torre. "We will now be able to give even more people living and traveling through San Diego the chance to view our work."
