Overview

Open Space Division provides land and resource management for over 27,000 acres of open space parkland Citywide. Approximately 21,000 acres of these lands are within the Multi-Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) and are managed in accordance with the 1996 Implementing Agreement.

As the largest custodian of lands in the Parks and Recreation Department, Open Space Division offers a myriad of programs and operates and maintains multiple parks and facilities. Open Space Division manages lands across all nine Council Districts.

Park Overview: The Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve provides for the protection and enhancement of the natural features of Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve while providing for passive recreation in accordance with the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Master Plan and Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve Natural Resource Management Plan. The preserve is jointly managed by the City of San Diego and the County of San Diego.

Park Boundaries (Geographic Area) (Size: 4,059 Acres): Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve (LPCP) is located in the City of San Diego between the I-5 and I-15 freeways and south of the 56 freeway, approximately twelve miles north of the City's urban center. The Preserve is composed of two large coastal canyons, Los Peñasquitos Canyon, and Lopez Canyon.

Additional areas of responsibility include Carmel Mountain Ranch Open Space, Sabre Springs Open Space and weekend emergency response in Scripps Ranch Maintenance Assessment District Open Space, Sabre Springs Maintenance Assessment District Open Space, and Miramar Ranch North Maintenance Assessment District Open Space.

Park Overview: Mission Trails Regional Park is operated and maintained by the City of San Diego in partnership with the Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation. Park Rangers and volunteer docents provide a wide range of interpretive programming, including tours and hikes, as well as video and slide presentations. A joint exercise of powers agreement identifies roles and responsibilities between the City of San Diego and County of San Diego. Mission Trails is one of the largest urban parks in the country. It is also home to Cowles Mountain, East Elliott, East Fortuna Equestrian (Multiuse) Staging Area, Kumeyaay Campground, and West Sycamore Canyon.

Park Boundaries (Geographic Area) (Size: approximately 8,000 Acres): Mission Trails Regional Park (MTRP) is centrally located eight miles northeast of downtown San Diego, both north and south of the State Route 52 freeway. Cowles Mountain, the Visitors Center, Old Mission Dam, and Kumeyaay Campground just north of Mission Gorge Road. East Elliott is generally north of State Route 52. West Sycamore Canyon is located east of Stonebridge Estates and north of MCAS Miramar. Park rangers at MTRP also assist with Tierrasanta Open Space (Shepherd Canyon).

Park Overview:

A Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement with the City of Chula Vista, City of San Diego, and County of San Diego (adopted in 1990, amended in 2012) establishes a Citizen Advisory Committee and Policy Committee to coordinate Property acquisition, planning, design, and maintenance of the Otay Valley Regional Park (OVRP). OVRP serves South Bay residents and visitors by providing a mix of recreation opportunities ranging from playing fields and picnic areas to hiking, biking, and horse trails while protecting open space, environmentally sensitive areas wildlife, culture, historic, agriculture, archaeological, and scenic resources.

Park Boundaries (Geographic Area) (Size: 2,029 Acres): From the Southeastern edge of lower San Diego Bay, east about 13 miles to the Otay Lakes Reservoir, generally south of Main Street in Chula Vista and north of the State Route 905 freeway. The OVRP is divided into three sub-areas for purposes of management and maintenance:

- Upper and Lower Otay Reservoirs are owned by the City of San Diego Public Utilities Department
- West of Otay Reservoir and east of Heritage Road is generally managed by the County of San Diego
- West of Heritage Road is generally managed by the City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department

Additional areas of responsibility include Otay Mesa Open Space and weekend emergency response in Otay Mesa Maintenance Assessment District Open Space.

Marian Bear Memorial Park

Park Overview: Marian Bear Memorial Park is a dedicated natural park that includes finger canyons and mesas and has a rich and diverse history. The park provides a natural setting in the midst of a bustling urban area. Park Rangers assigned to the park area provide interpretive programs, public assistance, guidance, enforcement, and protection. Volunteers are utilized to assist staff in the maintenance and operation of the park.

Park Boundaries (Geographic Area) (Size: 467 acres): Marian Bear Memorial Park is located in San Clemente Canyon stretching from Interstate 5 to Interstate 805 running parallel along the south side of State Route 52.

Park Overview: Rose Canyon Open Space Park has a rich history that brought the California Southern Railroad to this region in 1882. Rose Canyon has a very active Friends of group that uses volunteers to participate in projects that enhance the park experience.

Tecolote Canyon Natural Park

Park Overview: Tecolote Canyon Natural Park and Nature Center offers its visitors a variety of educational and recreational opportunities. The Canyon has approximately 6.5 miles of trails that can be used for jogging walking and mountain biking. Also available to visitors is the Nature Center which offers a host of exhibits on the animal and plant life of the Canyon. The Nature Center is also available for meetings, workshops, classes, and special events.

Park Boundaries (Geographic Area) (Size: 912 acres): Tecolote Canyon Natural Park divides, by its southern half, the communities of Clairemont and Linda Vista and, by its northern half, the west and east areas of Clairemont. The mouth of the canyon is located a mile north of the San Diego River and is crossed by Interstate 5 at the intersection with Tecolote Road. Its northern tip nearly reaches Clairemont Mesa Boulevard. Genesee Avenue forms the Tecolote Canyon Natural Park eastern boundary. The western park boundary runs parallel to Clairemont Drive and Cowley Way.

Program Overview: The Parks and Recreation Department maintains over 80 street medians as part of the Gas Tax-funded Street Median Maintenance Program. These medians are scattered throughout the City. The program provides for the landscape maintenance of median improvements along City streets within the public rights-of-way. The required maintenance includes cleaning, sweeping, litter and weed removal, tree maintenance, irrigation installations and repairs, planting, and edging of curbs and sidewalks.

Park Overview: Black Mountain Open Space Park is made up of a series of chaparral and sage covered hills, ridges, and canyons. The center piece of the park is the 1,554-foot summit of Black Mountain which provides 360-degree views of the surrounding area. Access to the summit is provided by a 2.5-mile hike or bike ride up a dirt road that is near Hilltop Community Park.

Park Overview: As a reservoir built in 1901, Chollas Lake helped serve early San Diego's water supply. In 1966, it was turned over to the Parks and Recreation Department. In 1971, it was designated a youth fishing lake (for children ages 15 and under only). A 16-acre lake for free youth fishing (age 15 and under ONLY); an 8/10-of-a-mile dirt path around the lake for walking, jogging, and bicycling; picnic tables with barbecue grills; children's play equipment; a small basketball court; hiking trails; and a multi-purpose ball field in North Chollas Canyon.

This group also manages South Chollas Landfill, areas surrounding the Chollas Yard, the special use permit with Chollas Little League, and parks along Chollas Creek watershed (including Imperial Marketplace, Southcrest, Southcrest Trails, and Willie Henderson Sports Complex).

Park Overview: The newly created San Diego River Park Program started with the hiring of one Senior Park Ranger in 2018. The position is responsible for collaborating and coordinating management of City owned lands inside and outside the City limits within the San Diego River corridor and its tributaries. The position is funded 50/50 between the Public Utilities Department and the Park and Recreation Department to begin implementation of the San Diego River Master Plan and coordinate efforts of the San Diego River Foundation and other volunteer groups interested in enhancing the San Diego River and its tributaries. The Senior Park Ranger takes the lead in coordinating with these groups and provides guidance and oversight for river related activities including enforcement, litter pickup, non-native plant control, trail planning and maintenance, small scale native re-vegetation projects, and environmental education programs.

Park Overview: The Open Space Division is required to thin brush on 921 acres of city-owned open space at the urban/wildland interface. This acreage is within brush management "Zone 2" and is comprised of land between 35 and 100 feet from adjacent structures. All brush management acreage is scheduled to be thinned on an average of every 21 months. Current staffing consists of 20.00 budgeted positions and contractual crews, capable of thinning about 10 acres per week. Contract workers include for-profit vendors and local non-profit organizations. Residents who do not want to wait for City staff can obtain a Right of Entry permit to perform brush management on City land.

Overview: Responsible for implementation of the Multiple Species Conservation Program on over 27,000 acres of conserved open space, including a long-term rare species monitoring program and development of natural resource management plans.

In 1997, the San Diego City Council adopted the MSCP (R-28455) and entered into a 50-year MSCP Implementing Agreement (I.A.) with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). Through this agreement, the City received its federal Endangered Species Act Section 10 (a) incidental take permit (PRT-830421). To comply with the MSCP requirements, Natural Resource Management staff conducts annual biological monitoring of up to 35 species, develops and/or updates management plans for conserved lands and performs adaptive land management on over 36,000 acres. Natural resource staff also manages the Vernal Pool Habitat Conservation Plan, implemented in 2019 as a subset of the City of San Diego MSCP Sub Area Plan. The vernal pool resources managed by Natural Resource Section include over 20 preserves and over 960 individual pools. Additional projects, such as habitat restoration, are implemented in coordination with the regional habitat conservation strategy. Natural resource team also researches, develops, and applies for resource management grant programs. Collaborates directly with the MSCP Planning Department to coordinate responses to development projects and property acquisitions and transfers. In addition to the management of open space, natural resource staff also administer the Open Space Divisions Right of Entry Permit (ROE) program.
