INTRODUCING THE STAR/PAL PROGRAM



Founded in 1988 and redefined in 1998, STAR/PAL is a San Diego-based nonprofit organization with a unique structure and programs that demonstrate a nationally recognized model of police and community collaboration. Sworn officers from the San Diego Police and County Probation Departments work side-by-side with civilian personnel and trained law enforcement volunteers. They provide the leadership and mentoring critical in promoting youth safety, positive life choices, and academic success. All STAR/PAL programs are led by law enforcement officers who educate youth about the dangers of juvenile crime and violence.

Initially two separate entities, the San Diego PAL(Police Athletic League) chapter was founded in 1988 and primarily served county areas, whereas the STAR (Sports Training, Academics, & Recreation) organization came into existence in 1993 to focus its programmatic efforts within city boundaries. The two organizations merged to form STAR/PAL in 1998, representing an alignment of city, county, and community efforts. The unification of programs, staff, volunteers, and the Board of Directors sought to ensure that all youth in the region have the opportunities to participate in and reap the benefits of youth programming with law enforcement/public safety officers, as well as community leaders.

The STAR/PAL U.S. Bank Center to Serve Youth is located at Colina Del Sol Park in the heart of Mid-City Division. The Center provides a safe corridor for hundreds of youth who walk to and from school. The Center consists of a facility which houses our STAR/PAL officers on-site as well as space for a variety of free, unique youth programs. The facility exemplifies STAR/PAL's police and community collaboration and serves as a safe-haven in an area historically plagued with crime issues. The presence of our facility, as well as law enforcement personnel available to deter and address juvenile crime activity (i.e. truancy, graffiti, gang activity, and assaults). This is resource for all youth and families that want to safely enjoy their community.

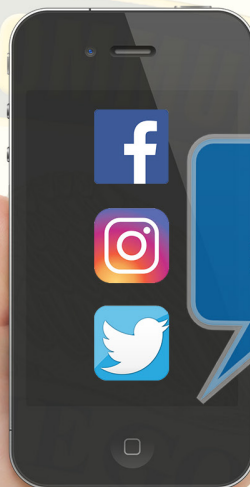

We accomplish our community policing strategy in a variety of ways but most can be put into four categories:

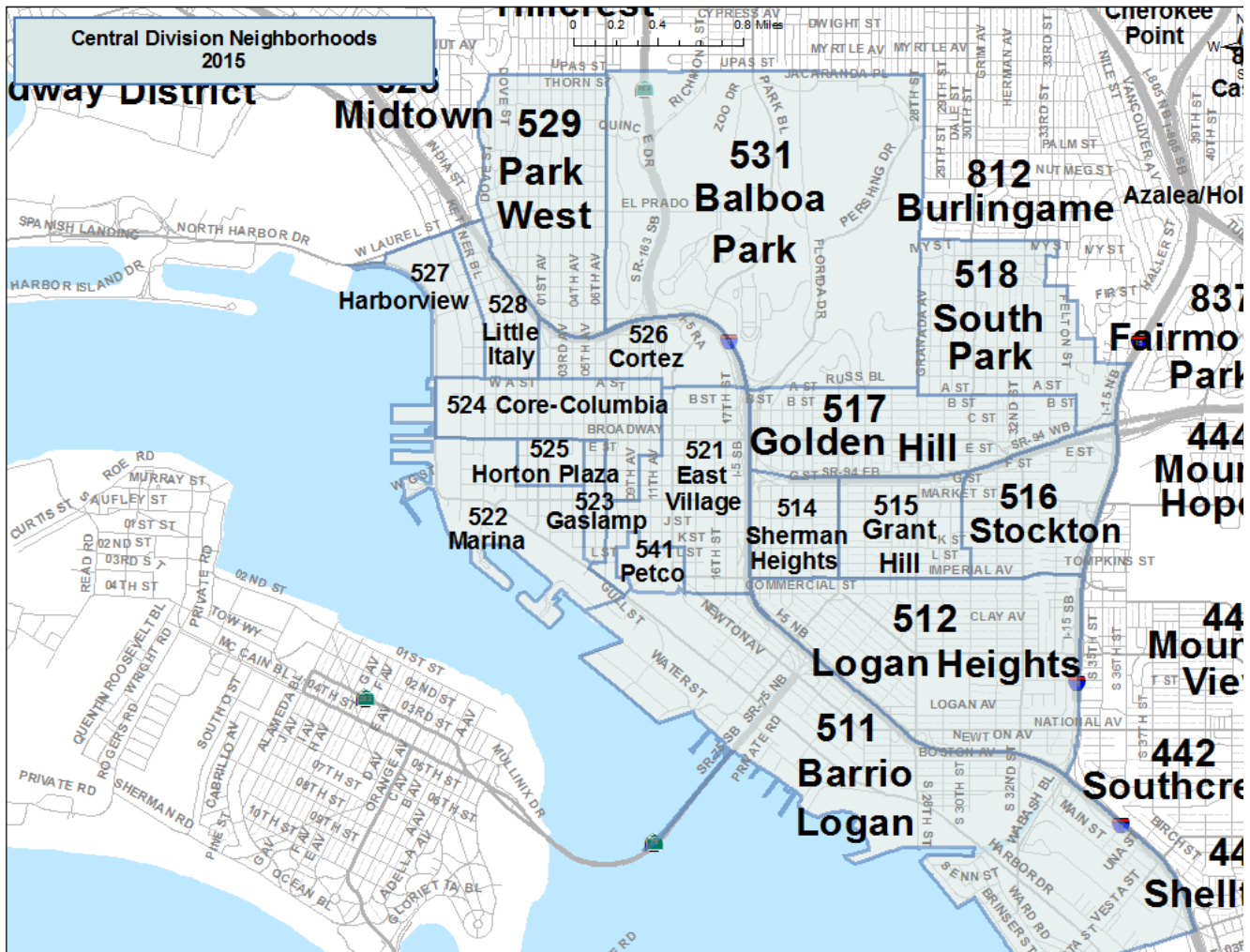
- I. **Community Partnerships** – The meetings we have to discuss public safety, crime statistics, and quality of life issues.

- III. **Community Outreach** – The ways we provide awareness, education, and information to the community about public safety, crime trends, and crime prevention.
- IV. **Community Givebacks** – The volunteering and charity efforts we participate in inside and outside our normal work hours.

Community Partnerships

Balboa Park Safety Meeting (3) –Meets monthly to discuss Balboa Park operations and citizen safety concerns with park rangers and museum facility managers.

Barrio Logan Association Meeting (3) –Meets monthly with Barrio Logan community leaders to discuss criminal activity that is occurring in the Barrio Logan community and Chicano Park.

Greater Golden Hill Planning Meeting (3) –Meets monthly to discuss current events and criminal activity in the Golden Hill community

Memorial Recreation Meeting (3) –Meets monthly with recreation managers and community members to discuss current community recreation events, public safety concerns, and current criminal activity that are occurring around the park and recreation center.

South Park Business Group (2) –Meets monthly with small local businesses to discuss public safety concerns and criminal activity occurring in South Park.

Problem Solving Community Meeting (3) –A meeting held every other month as collaboration between Command Staff and the community to address community policing, public safety, and quality of life issues.

City Department Meeting (6) –Meets every other week to discuss working together on issues in the Downtown area. Meets with SDPD, City Council representatives, the City Attorney, Environmental Services (ESD), Park & Recreation, and Neighborhood Resource Team (NRT).

Cortez Hill Community Meeting –Meets quarterly with local residents to discuss current events and criminal activity occurring in the Cortez Hill community.

East Village Association (3) –Meets monthly to discuss criminal activity that is occurring around local businesses.

East Village Residents Group (3) –Meets every other month to discuss criminal activity that is occurring around residential buildings in the East Village area.

Gaslamp Quarter Association (3) –Meets monthly to discuss criminal activity that is occurring around local businesses.

Gaslamp Quarter Association Special Events (3) -Meets monthly to discuss how events impact the Gaslamp area.

Little Italy Association (3) -Meets monthly to discuss business owners and residents to discuss public safety concerns and current criminal activity that is occurring.

Little Italy Residents Association -Meets quarterly to discuss public safety concerns and current criminal activity that is occurring in the area.

Safety Network Meeting (3) -This meeting is hosted by Downtown Partnership. It meets quarterly to discuss public safety concerns and current criminal activity that is occurring on business properties.

Safety Taskforce Meeting (5) -This meeting is hosted by Downtown Partnership. It meets every other week to discuss public safety concerns and current criminal activity that is occurring in the area. This meeting is attended by: SDPD, Environmental Services (ESD), a Sheriff Deputy, MTS, a Deputy City Attorney, and Mental Health Services to share safety information especially regarding transients and the mentally ill.

Alvarado Estates HOA Meeting (3) - This is a monthly meeting held on the first Tuesday of every month at 7007 Mission Gorge Rd at 7:00 pm.

Community Relations Officer Meeting (3) -Once a month will meet at various commands within the Department to discuss various issues and community events.

Serra Mesa and Kearny Mesa Homeless – Meet with members of the community in regards to concerns about the rising homeless population and the efforts of SDPD.

Crime Free Multi Housing – Meeting with Navy Housing to talk about crime trends and public safety.

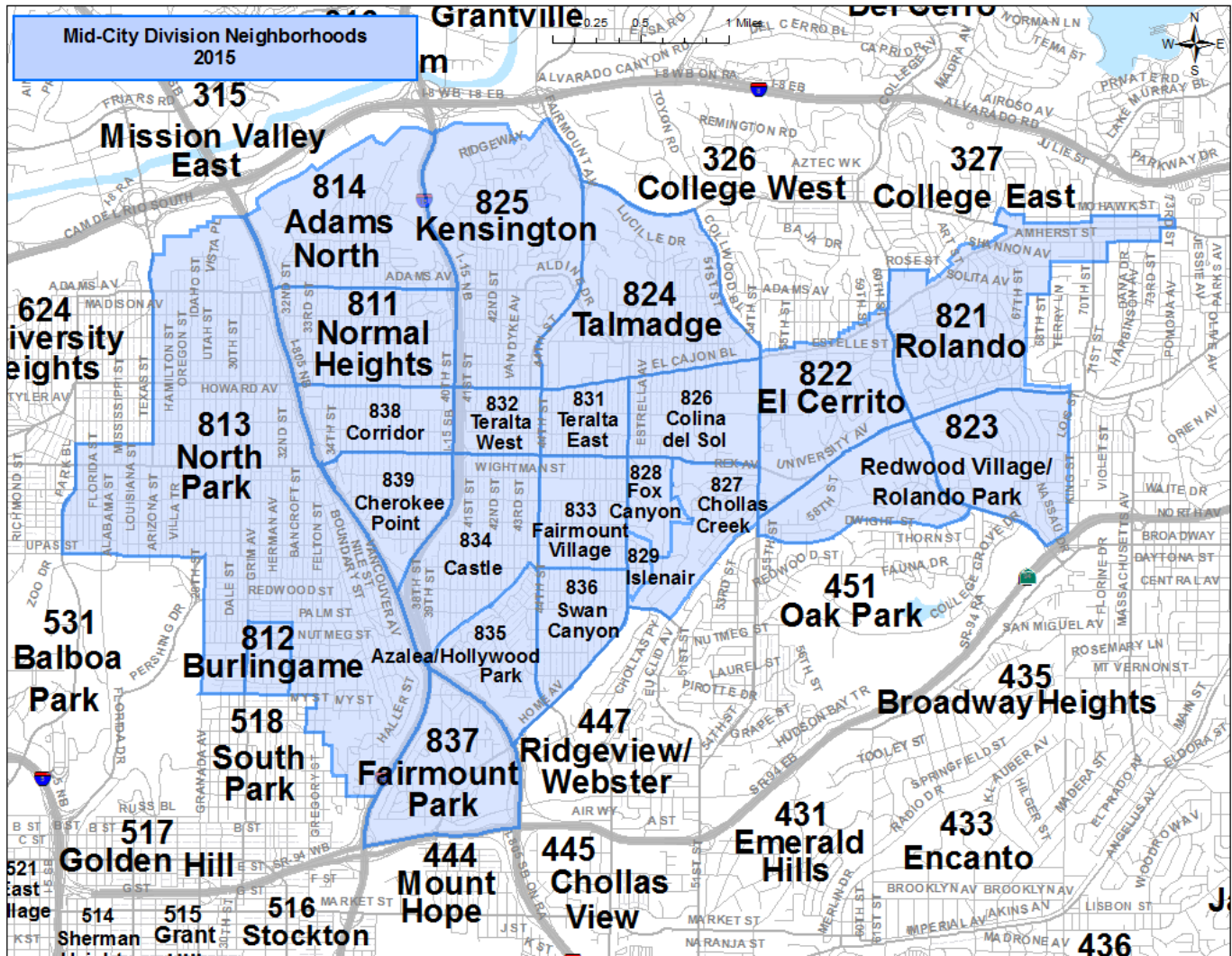
Neighborhood Walkthrough –Walk through of Allied Gardens neighborhood to meet with residents and discuss their issues.

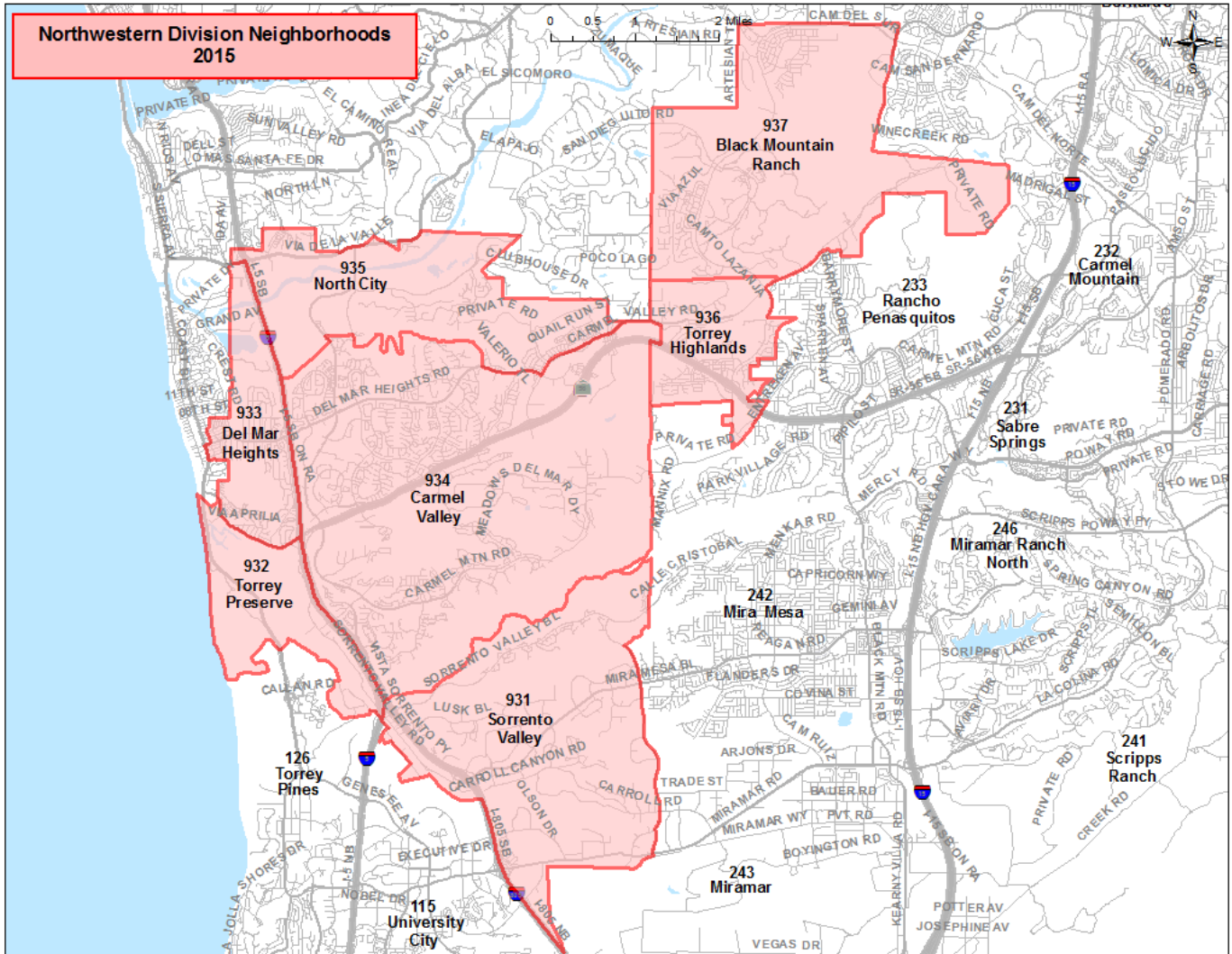

Community Partnerships

Captain's Advisory Board Meetings– Northwestern officers and command staff host a meeting held every month as a collaboration with the community to address community policing, public safety and quality of life issues. CAB members are selected from the community and give a well-rounded insight into Northwestern's community. Guest speakers and special presentations give the CAB members a greater understanding of the special tasks and skills the San Diego Police Department has to offer.

Neighborhood Watch Meeting – Meetings held in a residence and community rooms to discuss setting up a Neighborhood Watch groups and quality of life issues. Many neighborhood watch groups utilize Nextdoor.com as a conduit of communication to address crime awareness and prevention. Several neighborhoods in Northwestern Division are in the planning stages of starting new Neighborhood Watch groups.

Qualcomm Stockholder Meeting – Qualcomm annual stockholders meeting was held at the Morehouse campus headquarters. Northwestern and Traffic Division supported the event attended by hundreds of shareholders during a volatile political atmosphere in the company. With a possibility of protests or outbursts during the meeting, SDPD was on campus and on standby to help with any possible situation. The meeting was concluded without incident. Northwestern Division Command Staff and Officers strengthened the bond between Qualcomm and the San Diego Police Department during the planning stages and implementation of this incident.

Miscellaneous Meetings (5) – “As requested” meetings with community members, groups and organizations.

- Northwestern CRO attends four monthly community planning board meetings to keep a constant open line of communication open between active community members and the police department. During these meetings, members are able to address issues related with their specific communities.
- Northwestern investigators attended the Impact Meeting at the Sheriff's North County Coastal Station and discussed regional issues such as car prowls, burglaries, or other series-related events. Detectives have been able to link several North County cases together due to the information shared in these meetings.



- Northwestern officers attended a citizens' meeting and discussed crime prevention and home protection. Information was given out to several residences in the Northwestern Division to better help citizens protect their homes from burglary.
- CRO Philips attended a town hall forum within the Pacific Highlands Ranch North Community to address concerns and questions of the new community. Crime prevention tips were well received by the community during the meeting. Being able to meet with a newly constructed community is beneficial in creating a positive relationship with local law enforcement, spreading the crime prevention mission and helping the neighborhood stay pristine.
- CRO Philips and Northwestern Detectives hosted a meeting with representatives from Ring doorbell and security camera systems. The meeting helped just detectives a deeper understanding of the products and how they could be used during an investigation.

Community Involvement

San Diego Moms Blog Safety Fair- SD Moms Blog is a county wide group aimed at creating a supportive network for San Diego mothers. SD Moms Blog hosted a safety fair within Northwestern Division and was attended by CRO Philips and SDPD SWAT. Kids attending the event were given the opportunity to interact with law enforcement and create the positive memory for the future. Attendees were highly impressed with the SWAT vehicle and the event had a lasting impact on the community.

Santaluz Spring Fling – Santaluz has hundreds of homes within Northwestern Division. In partnership with the community HOA, Northwestern Division attended their annual Spring Fling community event. In addition to three other seasonal events, the community fundraisers have been supportive of several specialized units of SDPD.

O'Gara Cars and Coffee – Recruiting and CRO Philips attended an O'Gara Cars and Coffee show to promote SDPD and create positive interactions with hundreds of attendees. Traffic Division supported the unsafe vehicle traffic created on Sorrento Valley Road due to the high volume of attendees.



Qualcomm Workplace Violence Seminar -Northwestern CRO planned and participated in a workplace violence seminar at the Qualcomm Campus. This seminar was an interactive table top exercise with management leaders from several different departments. Together SDPD and Qualcomm hope to continue the seminar series for all of their campus buildings.

Community Outreach

Northwestern Station Tours -Northwestern Officers conducted five station tours for citizens living in the division's service area between January and March. Several groups included boy scouts and girl scouts eager to earn their public safety badges and learn about law enforcement.

Canine Unit Presentation and Town Hall -Officers from the Canine Unit, CRO Philips and A/Captain Phillips attended a presentation at the Del Mar Rotary Club. The focus was to educate the public on the use and diversity the canine unit offers. From drugs to flammable materials the presentation gave an in-depth look into the unit and how the public can help. With presentations and outreach, Northwestern Division is committed to assist the canine unit in funding additional dogs and supplies.

In-Home Security Meeting -Northwestern officers provided information on how to prevent residential burglaries. Each in-home security meeting is designed to address the needs of that specific community. Home inspections with residents help give a better understanding of the vulnerable areas of a home and how to protect against burglaries.

Juvenile Services -Northwestern officers assisted several of the area schools during spring break while the schools were vacant. In past years, burglaries to the schools during spring break has been an alarming issue for many Northwestern Division school administrators. During this year's spring break, due to the hard work of Northwestern officers none of our area schools experienced property crimes during their break.

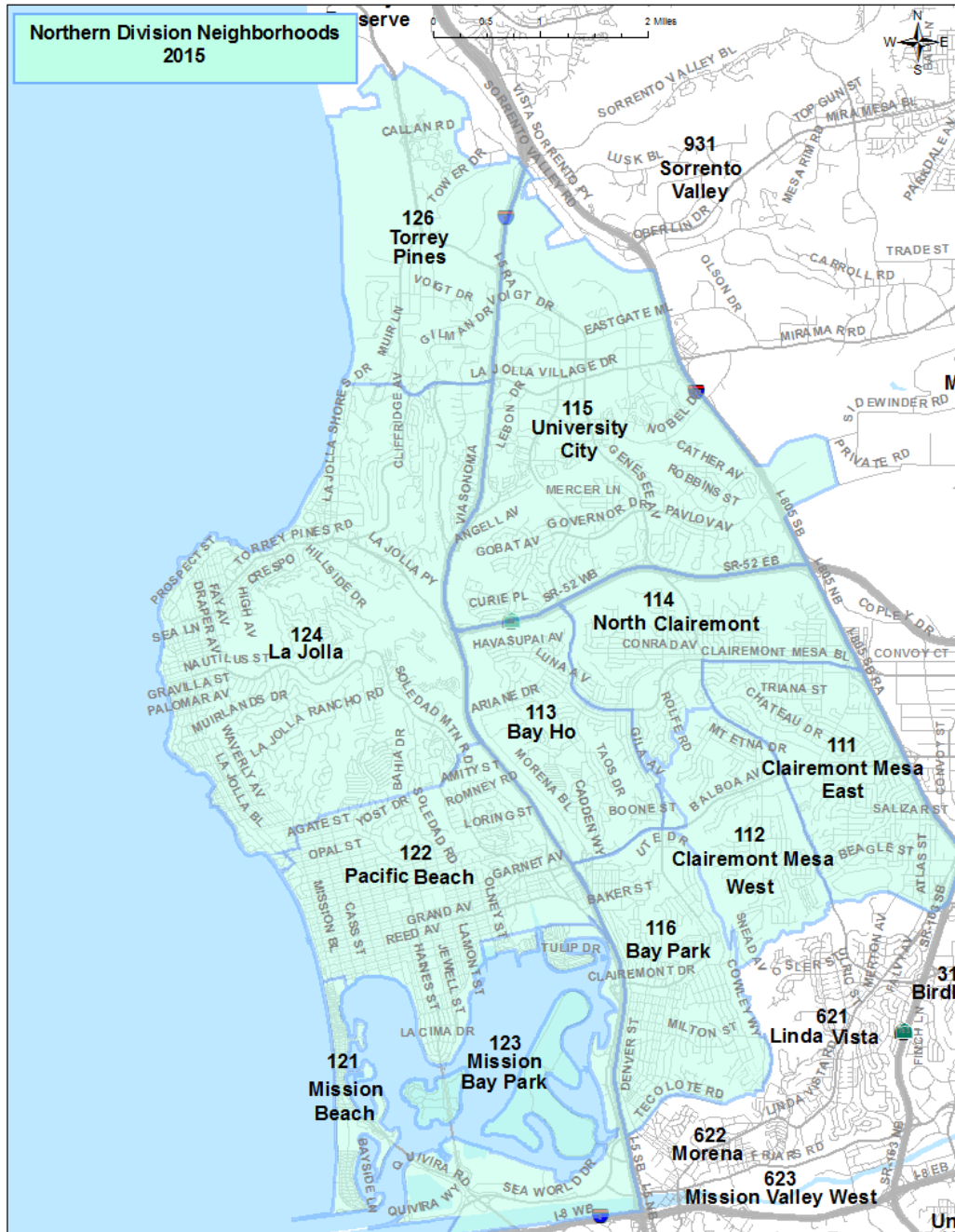
Crime Prevention Presentation -Officer Philips gave three hour-long presentations to citizens in the community about crime prevention and the neighborhood watch program.

Pacific Beach Town Council (3) -Meets once a month to provide a forum for the discussion of community issues; to communicate the views of the community to the appropriate governmental agencies; and to take action on community issues, specifically, but not limited to: the general betterment and beautification of the community of Pacific Beach; the promotion of the welfare of the residents of the community; the fostering of the cooperative efforts among the business people and residents of the community for the mutual benefit; and the continued improvement of Mission Bay Park.

Coffee With A Cop -Brings the community and police together to discuss current issues and learn more about each other.

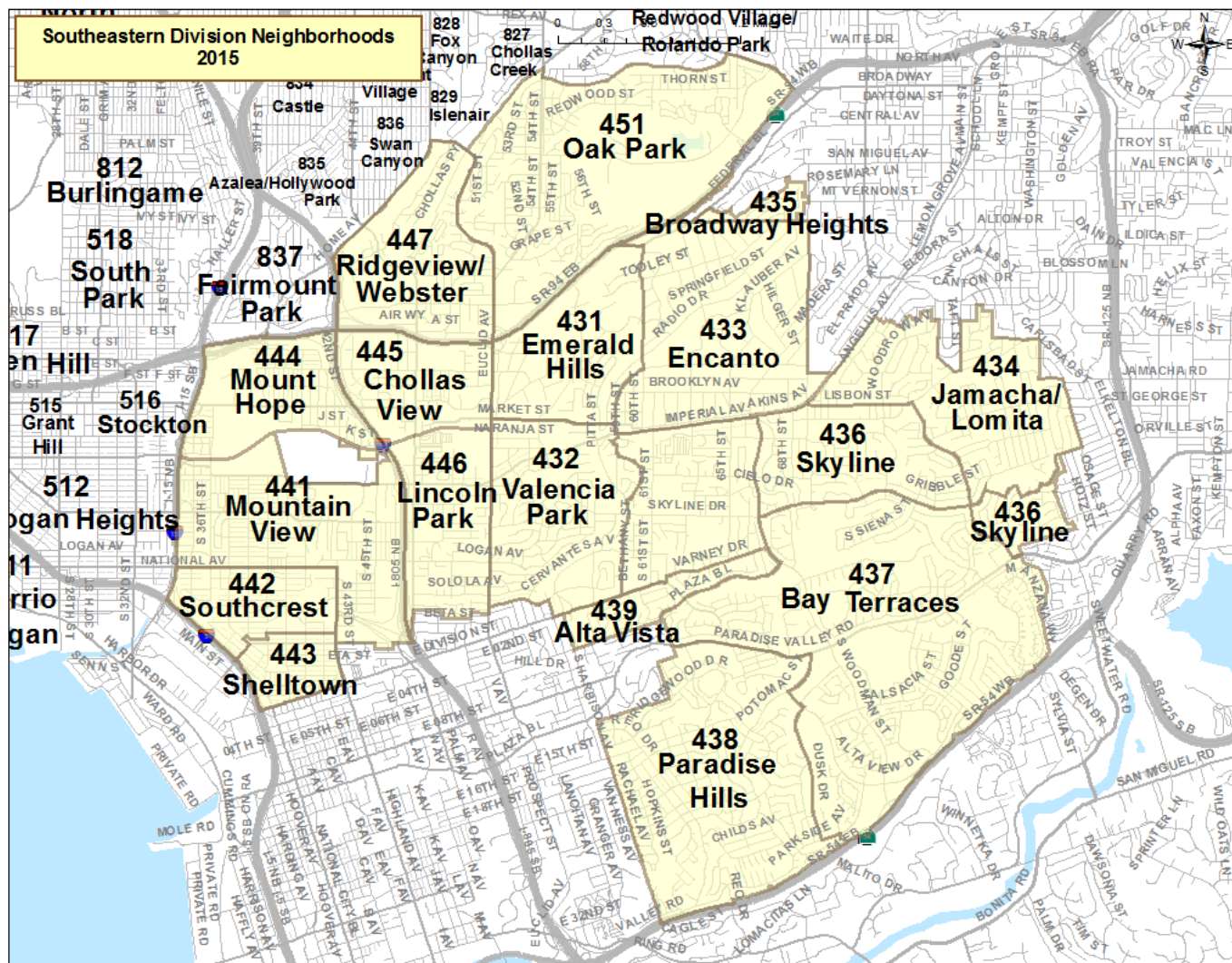

KIPP Career and College Day- Southeastern CROs attended this event at the school. CROs spoke about being a police officer and how to become a police officer.

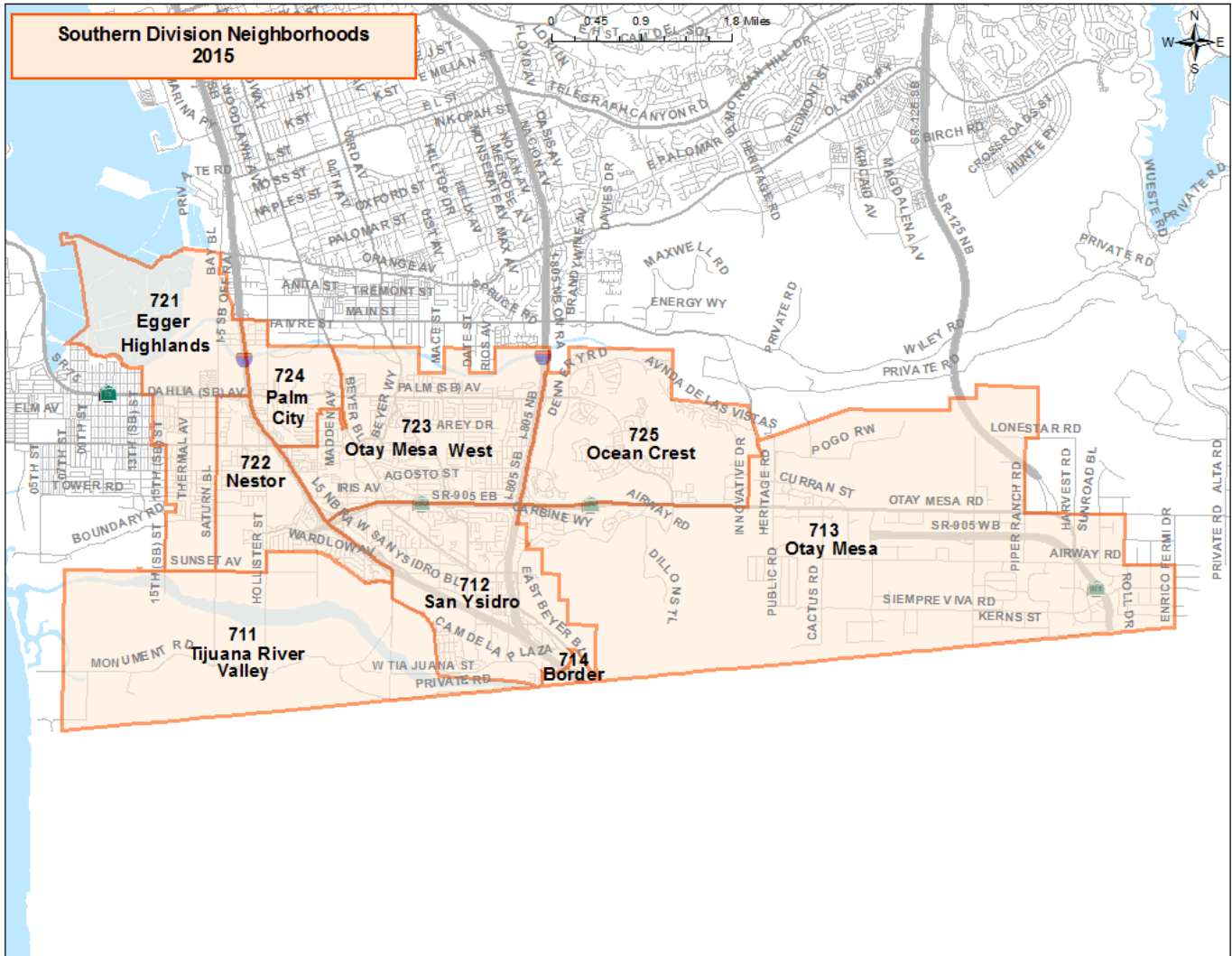

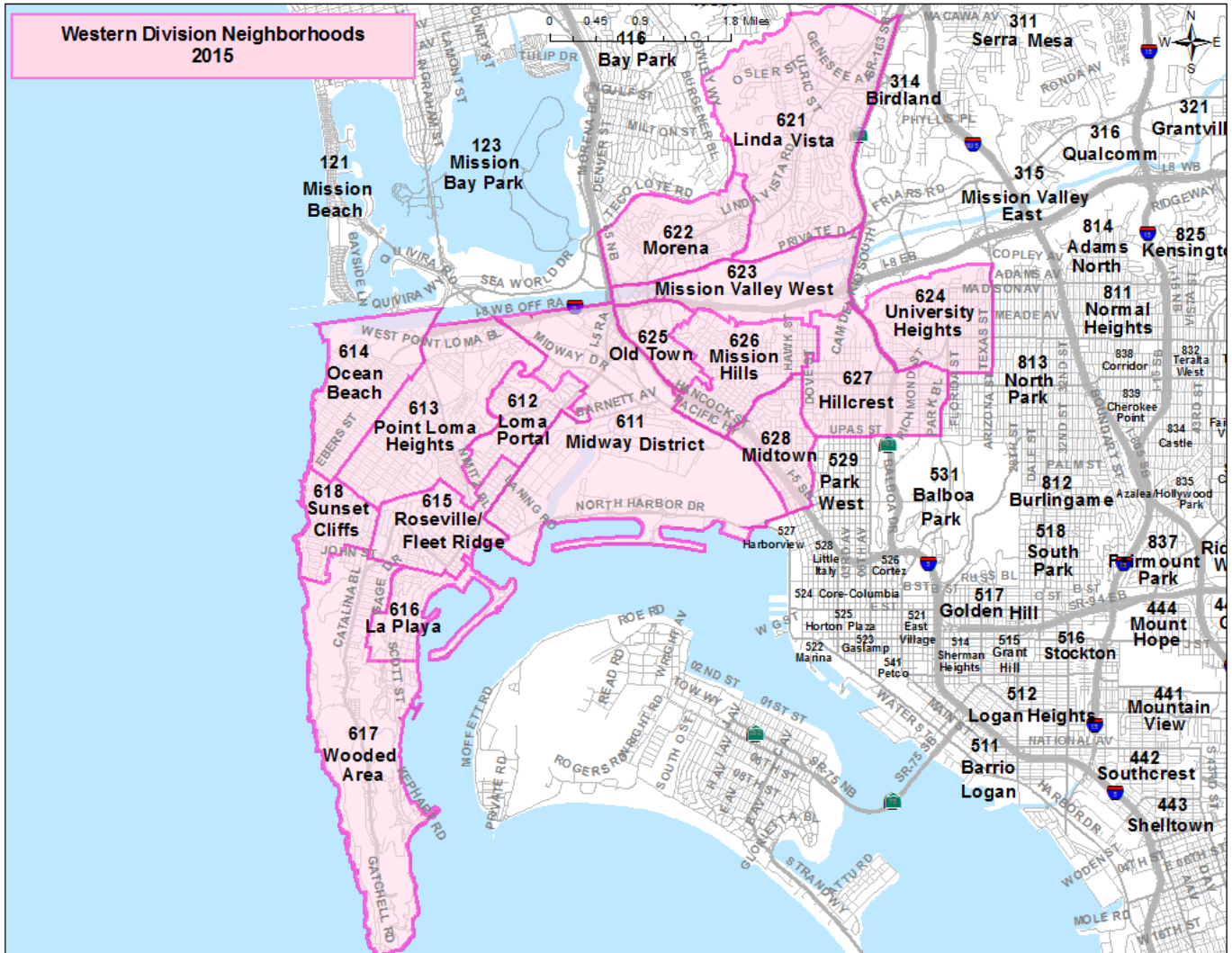

Community Partnerships

Shop with a Cop Committee (2) – A monthly meeting with countywide agency representatives for the planning of the 2017 Shop with a Cop event. STAR/PAL is responsible for working with school counselors and officers from throughout the county to identify the 300+ youth that participate in the program.

Community Involvement

We Can (2) – A program where high school students are encouraged to be effective leaders within their schools and communities. Additionally, the program works to better relationships between the students and law enforcement. Topics covered include self-awareness, public speaking, consequences of substance abuse and dangers of social media.

Mentoring Youth for Tomorrow (36) – Mentoring Youth for Tomorrow (MYT) is a program that enables inner-city youth the opportunity to take part in a mentoring program with volunteers, law enforcement officers, and students from SDSU and UCSD. It includes homework assistance, athletic activities, educational field trips, and recreational opportunities, all with positive mentorship that includes law enforcement officers working directly with the youth. This program is held on-site at the STAR/PAL Center to serve youth in Mid-City Division.

Making Changes (20) – The Making Changes program is a year-round, 40-session program, that brings youth, law enforcement, and volunteer mentors together for a civic engagement based curriculum. It is designed to educate high school teens about the importance of making positive life decisions and how these choices can impact their lives and their communities. This program hopes to promote awareness about the importance of one's actions and the potential these actions have to make positive change. This program is held on-site at the STAR/PAL Center to serve youth in Mid-City Division.



Teen LEAP (Leadership, Empowerment, Awareness Program) (15) – Teen LEAP is led by STAR/PAL officers and staff and encourages youth participants to develop as effective leaders within their schools and communities. By engaging teens in new experiences including volunteering at retirement homes, community revitalization projects, and various outdoor excursions, the program strives to promote awareness about community issues. This program is currently taught on campus at Gompers Preparatory Academy in Southeastern Division and Crawford High School located in the Colina Del Sol neighborhood of San Diego.

InterACTION (5) – InterACTION is a 10-session program that brings law enforcement officers and teaching artists from the La Jolla Playhouse together inside the classroom to address pressing issues such as crime, gang violence, self-expression, and the dangers of drugs with high school teens in a unique and non-threatening way. Through a partnership with the San Diego Unified School District, the program is currently taught at Crawford High School in City Heights, and is designed to assist students in learning the necessary tools to make positive life choices, using theater as a medium to communicate about the struggles they face each day.

Chargers Camp – STAR/PAL and the Los Angeles Chargers collaborated to host these camps. The camps are part of the NFL Play 60 program, which is a national youth health and fitness campaign, focused on increasing the wellness of young fans by encouraging them to be active for at least 60 minutes a day.

Padres Fan Fest – STAR/PAL hosted a booth at the San Diego Padres Fan Fest that took place on January 13, 2018.

Market Creek Anniversary – STAR/PAL hosted booth at the 10th anniversary event at the Market Creek Plaza.

Crime Stoppers – San Diego County Crime Stoppers Inc. provides three ways that the public can submit tips anonymously to report on felony crimes; they can call a tip line (888) 580-8477, submit a tip via the website or send a text tip from their phone. Crime Stoppers combats the three major problems law enforcement faces in gathering information; fear of reprisal, apathy, and a reluctance to get involved. San Diego County Crime Stoppers Inc. overcomes these challenges by providing citizens a safe way to anonymously report crime and rewards citizens for tips leading to a felony arrest.

Community Partnerships

Crime Stoppers Information Meetings (3) – An “as requested” meeting to define the role of Crime Stoppers in crime prevention strategies.

Students Speaking Out Program – A quarterly meeting for schools throughout the County on the benefits and uses of both the Crime Stoppers and Students Speaking Out Programs.

Students Speaking Out Program – In addition to quarterly meetings, we also presented at informational meetings to various other schools including Sweetwater Unified, Coronado Unified, Poway Unified, Grossmont Unified, and the Learning Choice Academy Charter Schools.

Community Outreach

8th Annual Freedom Breakfast– Crime Stoppers attended this event which raises funds and awareness for human trafficking.



Speaker's Bureau (10) - The Speaker's Bureau is a shining example of community outreach. The Speakers Bureau program has been in existence for approximately twenty years. Department employees are trained to make presentations to various community groups, private businesses, and academic organizations such as the Boy Scouts, Qualcomm, and San Diego State University. Speakers provide the Department with positive visibility and citizens with important information, making them better informed and safer. Volunteer employees at each division are trained to present quality speeches on various crime prevention topics to community groups and organizations. By educating the community on crime prevention techniques we can reduce the number of crimes in San Diego and increase the quality of life for its citizens. The topics include, but are not limited to: auto theft, burglary, domestic violence, firearm safety, graffiti vandalism, holiday safety tips, internal theft, identity theft, forgery, fraud, juveniles, landlord/tenant issues, narcotics, personal safety, Police communications, SDPD history, robbery, school safety, senior safety, sexual assault, shoplifting, stranger danger, traffic, transients and violence at work.

Crime Free Multi-Housing Program - In 2010, the San Diego Police Department entered into a collaborative partnership with the Institute for Public Strategies (IPS) and the managers/owners of San Diego multi-housing communities dedicated to crime prevention and the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program. In 2012, Say San Diego resumed the program from IPS and to date, **247** properties have been certified. The program illustrates the success of communities, non-profit organizations, and law enforcement working to keep illegal activity out of the city's rental properties.

Community Involvement

Crime Free Multi-Housing Final Certification (11) - Final Certification is when an apartment communities completes all 3 Phases: an 8 hour manager's class, passed the CPTED inspection, and participated in a resident engagement meeting receiving a Crime Free Multi-Housing certification certificate.

Annual Recertification - Every year the properties get their recertification from their previous year certification if they choose to continue the program.

Community Outreach

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design Inspections CPTED (12) - Rental property inspections to assess physical security and general appearance of property to deter criminal activity.



Safety Meetings (25) - Meetings held with property owners, managers and residents to discuss the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program, CPTED, reporting guidelines, and general safety information.

Social Media - Social media is designed to enhance our communication outreach with the community. The San Diego Police Department currently uses three primary forms of social media that include Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor.com. These platforms allow the Department to provide meaningful and timely information to our public on a variety of topics including community events, notification of crime issues, news stories and major incidents occurring in the City.

Members of the San Diego Police Department Speakers Bureau are trained to provide quality presentations on various crime prevention topics to community groups and organizations. By providing outreach education on crime prevention techniques we can reduce the number of crimes in San Diego and increase the quality of life for our communities. Members spoke at 5 events during this quarter.

Community Involvement

Volunteer Services – No police department is large enough to keep a community safe on its own. Effective crime prevention requires the active support of citizens and a partnership between police and the community. Community policing is an important foundation of the San Diego Police Department. What makes San Diego's approach to community policing unique is the extent to which the police department has made volunteers an integral component of its program.

The San Diego Police Department is viewed as a leading force in law enforcement innovations occurring across North America. The Department's adult and youth volunteer workforce has approximately 700 members. These volunteers play a vital role in the department's vision to engage the community in a problem solving partnership that will reduce crime and positively affect the quality of life in all communities.

The San Diego Police Department has used volunteers for a wide variety of job assignments for many years. Programs throughout the Department are considered models in volunteerism in the public sector. Volunteers are essential to Department operations. They help provide a level of customer service that could not be achieved by the Department's staff alone. Volunteers represent all segments of society. The variety of functions performed by this police department affords opportunities for people with varied interests and skills. The San Diego Police Department's Volunteers in Policing (VIP) program offers a unique opportunity for citizen volunteers to become actively involved in providing efficient, effective, and responsive service to our community.

The use of volunteers includes Crisis Interventionists, Retired Senior Volunteer Patrols, Volunteers in Policing, Reserve Officers, Police Cadets, and various support staff positions that enhance the organization's effectiveness. This is a result of two decades of change in policing philosophy that has heralded San Diego as a pioneer in many areas of law enforcement.



The San Diego Police Department has a significant resource available in the San Diego community: individuals who are ready, willing, and able to serve as volunteers. In a time of limited financial resources and increasing demands for services, it is important that volunteer opportunities continue to be identified and this resource increasingly utilized.

Currently, The San Diego Police Department has 91 active Crisis Interventionists, 280 RSVPs, 18 Reserve Officers, 74 VIPs, and 54 Cadets. Our Cadets contributed 442 hours this quarter. Our RSVPs contributed 23,096 hours this quarter. Crisis Interventionists responded to 165 callouts assisting 888 people, worked 3,158.5 hours, and were on call and prepared to respond for an additional 3,062.5 hours; our Reserve Officers worked a total of 1,394.5 hours and our VIPs contributed 3,820 hours.

Ride Along Program (202) – The Ride Along Program is a powerful community involvement tool that enables an officer to showcase to citizens who live, work, or go to school in the officer's area of responsibility the daily duties of a police officer. It enables citizens to get a first-hand look at policing and to better understand the role of the police. It increases the opportunity for more effective problem solving, and it enhances mutual understanding and cooperation and leads to an improved police/community relationship.

Community Outreach

Community Recruiting Events (53) – The Recruiting Unit gave presentations on career opportunities as a police officer and dispatcher at 50 community events throughout the City and County.

Community Partnerships

San Diego Juvenile Interagency Group (2) – A monthly meeting aimed at dispersing up to date information related to juveniles and the law across San Diego law enforcement agencies.

Alternatives to Detention (2) – ATD is for the placement of juvenile misdemeanor offenders into an alternative location other than Juvenile Hall (i.e. cool bed). Representatives are available to respond to the officers' location to conduct an assessment of the juvenile for placement. With parental consent, the juvenile is placed in a home. Juvenile Administration and JST Officers attend these meetings to discuss juvenile issues, placements and laws.

Joint Interagency Meeting (3) – Monthly meetings presented by the Juvenile District Attorney's office. Multiple county law enforcement agencies attend this meeting in order to receive updates on laws regarding juveniles and training on various programs.

Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council – In an effort to ensure coordination and collaboration among the various local agencies serving at-risk youth and young offenders, the JJCPA legislation requires the county Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) to develop and modify the plan. The JJCC is chaired by the county's chief probation officer and its members include representatives of law enforcement and criminal justice agencies, the board of supervisors, social services, education, mental health, and community-based organizations. The JJCC meets periodically to review program progress and evaluation data.

Juvenile Diversion – The Juvenile Administration unit works in an ongoing effort with multiple Community Based Organizations. It is designed to bring the latest and most updated Diversion programs to the San Diego Police Department. Diversion is set up for low level offenders to be an alternative to the juvenile justice system.

Community Involvement

Shop with a Cop (2) – The California Highway Patrol and Chula Vista Police Department are the host agencies for this year's annual charity event. SDPD's Juvenile Administration Unit is representing our department during monthly planning meetings with other county law enforcement agencies in preparation for this event. The annual Shop with a Cop event will take place in December 2018.

Teddy Bear Drive – The Teddy Bear Drive is an annual countywide law enforcement event designed to bring stuffed animals to children admitted at Rady Children's Hospital. SDPD's Juvenile Administration Unit is representing our department during monthly planning meetings and fund raising events throughout year. This year's event took place on December 5, 2017.

School Safety Patrol – Juvenile Administration coordinates the School Safety Patrol for the City of San Diego. Seventy-nine elementary schools with approximately 1,800 SSP members participate in this program. We hosted the annual Holiday Party and Awards ceremony on December 9, 2017.

Community Outreach

School visits (20) – Juvenile Administration officers conduct school visits and SSP inspections regarding the safe crossing of thousands of students and adults at elementary schools throughout the city.
