What is a Seed Library?

A seed library is an establishment which lends or shares seeds. Similar to checking out books, patrons are able to check out seeds for personal use. A seed library is an educational tool often equipped with robust programming, workshops and community events. Seed libraries allow access to health and education for all. **How It Works**

- 1) Take a Seed.
- 2) Grow a Seed.
- 3) Return a Seed.

Core Values

A seed library preserves agricultural biodiversity by focusing on rare, local, and heirloom seed varieties. By stocking our seed library with non-GMO, organic, open-pollinated and heirloom seeds, we reflect community values and promote health and wellness.

- food literacy/nutrition
- urban farming/gardening
- food sovereignty and sustainability



These programs can come in the form of lectures, book talks, guest speakers, or interactive workshops. Programs can be both at the library or elsewhere in the community.
